delighted	Greatly pleased. <i>We were delighted to see her.</i>
dignified	Having or expressing dignity; especially formality or stateliness in bearing or appearance. <i>The director of the school was a dignified white haired gentleman.</i>
distinguished	Standing above others in character or attainment or reputation. <i>His distinguished bearing.</i>
<u>ecstatic</u>	Feeling or expressing overwhelming happiness or joyful excitement. <i>Ecstatic fans filled the stadium.</i>
elated	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>After the concert I felt elated.</i>
elevated	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style Oliver Franks. <i>These parish gentry were conscious of their elevated status.</i>
eminent	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i>An eminent peak.</i>
esteemed	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>We dined in my esteemed friend s little room.</i>
exhilarated	Very happy, animated, or elated. <i>All this hustle and bustle makes me feel exhilarated.</i>
exuberant	Joyously unrestrained. <i>A noisy bunch of exuberant youngsters.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
<u>gleeful</u>	Exuberantly or triumphantly joyful. <i>She gave a gleeful chuckle.</i>
grand	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>A grand purpose.</i>
happy	Used in greetings. <i>A happy smile.</i>

high	Being at or having a relatively great or specific elevation or upward extension sometimes used in combinations like knee high. <i>She had no very high opinion of men.</i>
high-flown	Pretentious (especially with regard to language or ideals).
high-minded	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
high-ranking	At an elevated level in rank or importance.
ideal	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>In an ideal world we might have made a different decision.</i>
idealistic	Characterized by idealism; unrealistically aiming for perfection. <i>Idealistic young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
illustrious	Well known, respected, and admired for past achievements. <i>An illustrious judge.</i>
intellectual	Of or associated with or requiring the use of the mind. <i>Sort of the intellectual type.</i>
joyful	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>A joyful heart.</i>
joyous	Full of happiness and joy. <i>Felt a joyous abandon.</i>
jubilant	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
lofty	Of a noble or elevated nature. <i>A noble and lofty concept.</i>
noble	Of or belonging to or constituting the hereditary aristocracy especially as derived from feudal times. <i>Chardonnay is the noble grape from which some of the finest white wines are produced.</i>
noble-minded	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
prestigious	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A prestigious academic post.</i>
prominent	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>The new housing estates are prominent landmarks.</i>
rapturous	Feeling great rapture or delight. <i>He was greeted with rapturous applause.</i>

rarefied	(of air, especially that at high altitudes) of lower pressure than usual; thin. Rarefied scholarly pursuits.
rarified	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
rhapsodic	Feeling great rapture or delight.
sublime	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks. <i>Their hearts were jocund and sublime.</i>
superior	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>A superior ruler.</i>
triumphant	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A comic fairy tale about innocence triumphant.</i>
venerable	Impressive by reason of age. <i>A venerable sage with white hair and beard.</i>

<u>acme</u>	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>Physics is the acme of scientific knowledge.</i>
altitude	Elevation especially above sea level or above the earth's surface. <i>The altitude gave her a headache.</i>
best	(comparative and superlative of `well') wiser or more advantageous and hence advisable. <i>Some of the best times of my life.</i>
caliber	A degree or grade of excellence or worth. <i>An executive of low caliber.</i>
calibre	The diameter of a body of circular section, such as a tube, blood vessel, or fibre. <i>A small calibre revolver.</i>

<u>lofty</u>	Having or displaying great dignity or nobility. <i>The elegant square was shaded by lofty palms.</i>
minaret	Slender tower with balconies.
<u>peak</u>	The narrow part of a ship's hold at the bow or stern. <i>The peak halyard.</i>
<u>pinnacle</u>	Summit with a pinnacle. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the pinnacle of fame.</i>
<u>plateau</u>	Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé. <i>The peace process had reached a plateau.</i>

predominant	Having or exerting control or power. <i>The predominant mood among policy makers is optimism.</i>
preponderant	Having superior power and influence. <i>The preponderant influence of the US within the alliance.</i>
raised	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>The lord and his family ate on a raised platform at one end of the hall.</i>
<u>sublime</u>	Cause a substance to sublime. <i>Sublime iodine.</i>
<u>summit</u>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>In 2013 658 climbers summited Everest.</i>
superior	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>A superior ruler.</i>
superlative	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>The critics ran out of superlatives to describe him.</i>
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>Supreme among musicians.</i>
tall	A garment size for a tall person. <i>A tall order.</i>
top	Provide with a top or topping. <i>She bought a couple of new tops.</i>
towering	Of great intensity. <i>Towering icebergs.</i>
<u>unsurpassed</u>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>The quality of workmanship is unsurpassed.</i>
<u>up</u>	Used as a command to a soldier or an animal to stand up and be ready to move or attack. <i>From childhood upward.</i>
<u>upper</u>	Superior in rank or accomplishment. <i>His upper arm.</i>
