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

<b>esteemed</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>We dined in my <b>esteemed</b> friend s little room.</i>
<b>exhilarated</b>	Very happy, animated, or elated. <i>All this hustle and bustle makes me feel <b>exhilarated</b>.</i>
<b>exuberant</b>	Joyously unrestrained. <i>A noisy bunch of <b>exuberant</b> youngsters.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b><u>gleeful</u></b>	Exuberantly or triumphantly joyful. <i>She gave a <b>gleeful</b> chuckle.</i>
<b>grand</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>A <b>grand</b> purpose.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Used in greetings. <i>A <b>happy</b> smile.</i>

<b>high</b>	Being at or having a relatively great or specific elevation or upward extension sometimes used in combinations like knee high. <i>She had no very <b>high</b> opinion of men.</i>
<b>high-flown</b>	Pretentious (especially with regard to language or ideals).
<b>high-minded</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>high-ranking</b>	At an elevated level in rank or importance.
<b>ideal</b>	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>In an <b>ideal</b> world we might have made a different decision.</i>
<b>idealistic</b>	Characterized by idealism; unrealistically aiming for perfection. <i><b>Idealistic</b> young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>
<b>illustrious</b>	Well known, respected, and admired for past achievements. <i>An <b>illustrious</b> judge.</i>
<b>intellectual</b>	Of or associated with or requiring the use of the mind. <i>Sort of the <b>intellectual</b> type.</i>
<b>joyful</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>A <b>joyful</b> heart.</i>
<b>joyous</b>	Full of happiness and joy. <i>Felt a <b>joyous</b> abandon.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>lofty</b>	Of a noble or elevated nature. <i>A noble and <b>lofty</b> concept.</i>
<b>noble</b>	Of or belonging to or constituting the hereditary aristocracy especially as derived from feudal times. <i>Chardonnay is the <b>noble</b> grape from which some of the finest white wines are produced.</i>
<b>noble-minded</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>prestigious</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> academic post.</i>
<b>prominent</b>	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>The new housing estates are <b>prominent</b> landmarks.</i>
<b>rapturous</b>	Feeling great rapture or delight. <i>He was greeted with <b>rapturous</b> applause.</i>

<b>rarefied</b>	(of air, especially that at high altitudes) of lower pressure than usual; thin. <i><b>Rarefied</b> scholarly pursuits.</i>
<b>rarified</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks.
<b>rhapsodic</b>	Feeling great rapture or delight.
<b><u>sublime</u></b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style- Oliver Franks. <i>Their hearts were jocund and <b>sublime</b>.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>A <b>superior</b> ruler.</i>
<b><u>triumphant</u></b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A comic fairy tale about innocence <b>triumphant</b>.</i>
<b>venerable</b>	Impressive by reason of age. <i>A <b>venerable</b> sage with white hair and beard.</i>

<u><b>pinnacle</b></u>	Surmount with a pinnacle. <i>Catapulted Einstein to the <b>pinnacle</b> of fame.</i>
<u><b>plateau</b></u>	Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé. <i>The peace process had reached a <b>plateau</b>.</i>

<b>predominant</b>	Having or exerting control or power. <i>The <b>predominant</b> mood among policy makers is optimism.</i>
<b>preponderant</b>	Having superior power and influence. <i>The <b>preponderant</b> influence of the US within the alliance.</i>
<b>raised</b>	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>The lord and his family ate on a <b>raised</b> platform at one end of the hall.</i>
<u><b>sublime</b></u>	Cause a substance to sublime. <i><b>Sublime</b> iodine.</i>
<u><b>summit</b></u>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>In 2013 658 climbers <b>summited</b> Everest.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>A <b>superior</b> ruler.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>The critics ran out of <b>superlatives</b> to describe him.</i>
<b>supreme</b>	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i><b>Supreme</b> among musicians.</i>
<b>tall</b>	A garment size for a tall person. <i>A <b>tall</b> order.</i>
<b>top</b>	Provide with a top or topping. <i>She bought a couple of new <b>tops</b>.</i>
<b>towering</b>	Of great intensity. <i><b>Towering</b> icebergs.</i>
<u><b>unsurpassed</b></u>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>The quality of workmanship is <b>unsurpassed</b>.</i>
