examination	The action or process of conducting an examination. <i>An examination of marketing behaviour.</i>
<u>oral</u>	A spoken examination or test. <i>A French oral.</i>
paper	A business firm that publishes newspapers. <i>The notion of an office running without paper is absurd.</i>
<u>practical</u>	An examination or lesson in which theories and procedures learned are applied to the actual making or doing of something.
question paper	A formal proposal for action made to a deliberative assembly for discussion and vote.
test	The act of undergoing testing. <i>The test was standardized on a large sample of students.</i>

analytical	Using or skilled in using analysis (i.e., separating a whole-intellectual or substantial-into its elemental parts or basic principles. <i>Analytical reasoning.</i>
applicant	A person who makes a formal application for something, especially a job. <i>Applicants for the degree course.</i>
apply	Apply oneself to. <i>I apply this rule to get good results.</i>
assessment	The market value set on assets. <i>Assessments of market value.</i>

assignment	The act of putting a person into a non-elective position. <i>The assignment of individuals to particular social positions.</i>
breathalyzer	A device that measures chemicals (especially the alcohol content) in a person's expired breath.
college	The body of faculty and students of a college. <i>I m at college studying graphic design.</i>
<u>contest</u>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>A contest between traditional and liberal views.</i>
<u>demographic</u>	Of or relating to demography. <i>The drink is popular with a young demographic.</i>
duty	The measure of an engine's effectiveness in units of work done per unit of fuel. <i>Juliet reported for duty.</i>
entitle	Give (something) a particular title. <i>Employees are normally entitled to redundancy pay.</i>
essay	Make an effort or attempt. <i>A misjudged essay in job preservation.</i>
exempt	Grant relief or an exemption from a rule or requirement to. <i>A beauty somehow exempt from the aging process.</i>
<u>experimental</u>	Based on experience as opposed to authority or conjecture. <i>Experimental music.</i>
flunk	Fail to get a passing grade. <i>Tip flunked out of Caltech and moved back home.</i>
homework	Work or study done in preparation for an event or situation. <i>He always helps his daughter with her homework.</i>
inquiry	An official investigation. <i>New areas of inquiry emerged in the course of the conference.</i>
lesson	An experience or event that serves as a warning or encouragement. <i>He did the lesson for today.</i>
matriculate	A person who has matriculated. <i>The arms have been matriculated by the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Edinburgh.</i>
matriculation	An examination to qualify for enrolment at a college or university. <i>Matriculation requirements.</i>
<u>ordeal</u>	A very unpleasant and prolonged experience. <i>Ordeal by fire.</i>

probe	Examine physically with or as if with a probe. <i>There was a congressional probe into the scandal.</i>
proctor	Someone who supervises (an examination). <i>18 of the faculty reported that graduate assistants frequently proctored exams.</i>
qualify	Add a modifier to a constituent. <i>A pensioner who does not qualify for income support.</i>
question	Pose a question. <i>Her loyalty is really beyond question.</i>
quiz	Give (a student or class) an informal written test or examination. <i>We got quizzed on French irregular verbs.</i>
semester	A half-year term in a school or university, especially in North America, typically lasting for fifteen to eighteen weeks. <i>The opening week of Harvard's autumn semester.</i>
test	Show a certain characteristic when tested. <i>Researchers developed a test for the virus.</i>
