- *Be superior or better than some standard.*
- *Be greater in scope or size than some standard.*
- *Be or do something to a greater degree.*
- *Be better than; surpass.*
- *Go beyond what is allowed or stipulated by (a set limit).*
- *Be greater in number or size than (a quantity, number, or other measurable thing).*

be superior to	Occupy a certain position or area.
beat	Shape by beating. <i>Reading beats watching television.</i>

cap	Place a limit or restriction on (prices, expenditure, or borrowing). <i>Snow capped the mountains.</i>
<u>eclipse</u>	Cause an eclipse of a celestial body by intervention. <i>The Sun eclipses the moon today.</i>

go beyond	Follow a certain course.
go one better than	Be ranked or compare.
go over	Pass, fare, or elapse; of a certain state of affairs or action.
go past	Follow a certain course.
outclass	Be far superior to. <i>Villa totally outclassed us in the first half.</i>
outdo	Get the better of. <i>Not to be outdone Vicky and Laura reached the same standard.</i>
outgo	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>He on horseback outgoes him on foot.</i>
outmatch	Be superior to (an opponent or rival). <i>Vast chambers were built which outmatched anything to be seen in Europe.</i>
outperform	Perform better than. <i>An experienced employee will outperform the novice.</i>
outshine	Shine more brightly than. <i>It is a shame when a mother outshines a daughter.</i>
outstrip	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>During the morning warm up he once again outstripped the field.</i>
overreach	Try to do more than is possible. <i>Never lean sideways from a ladder or overreach.</i>
<u>overshadow</u>	Tower above and cast a shadow over. <i>An enormous oak tree stood overshadowing the cottage.</i>
overshoot	Exceed (a financial target or limit). <i>The department may overshoot its cash limit.</i>
overstep	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>He has overstepped the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
pass	Come to pass. <i>The freedom to pass along the highway.</i>
put in the shade	Adapt.
put to shame	Attribute or give.
run over	Continue to exist.
<u>surmount</u>	Reach the highest point of. <i>The scarf surmounted the gown.</i>
<u>surpass</u>	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>The organist was surpassing himself.</i>

top

Remove the top of a vegetable or fruit in preparation for cooking.
*A star **tops** the Christmas Tree.*

transcend

Be superior or better than some standard.
*This was an issue **transcending** party politics.*

- *Economic growth exceeded expectations this year.*
- *This exceeds all my expectations.*
- *The Tribunal's decision clearly exceeds its powers under the statute.*
- *She exceeded our expectations.*
- *Their loyalty exceeds their national bonds.*
- *Production costs have exceeded £60,000.*

<u>absenteeism</u>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
<u>ahead</u>	Ahead of time in anticipation. <i>Ahead by two pawns.</i>
beat	A member of the beat generation a nonconformist in dress and behavior. <i>The beat of the swallow s wings as they dive after midges.</i>
better	The better one that which is better. <i>His account can hardly be bettered.</i>
conquer	Gain the love, admiration, or respect of (a person or group of people). <i>They ve conquered new markets in Japan.</i>
defeat	An instance of defeating or being defeated. <i>Don t cheat by allowing your body to droop this defeats the object of the exercise.</i>

excel	Perform exceptionally well. <i>She excelled in math.</i>
<u>inflation</u>	A general increase in prices and fall in the purchasing value of money. <i>The inflation of a balloon.</i>
outdistance	Leave (a competitor or pursuer) far behind. <i>He outdistanced the other runners.</i>
outdo	Get the better of. <i>The men tried to outdo each other in their generosity.</i>
outpace	Go, rise, or improve faster than. <i>Import growth outpaced export growth in the second quarter.</i>
outrun	Go beyond or exceed. <i>Their one chance was to outrun their pursuers.</i>
outstrip	Go far ahead of. <i>During the morning warm up he once again outstripped the field.</i>
outwit	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>Ray had outwitted many an opponent.</i>
<u>over</u>	Over the entire area. <i>The jukebox plays every song twice over.</i>
<u>overcome</u>	Overcome as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>She was obviously overcome with excitement.</i>
overreach	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>Never lean sideways from a ladder or overreach.</i>
overstep	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>He has overstepped the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
<u>overtake</u>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>Her car overtook a line of vehicles.</i>
pass	Pass time in a specific way. <i>Your letter has been passed to Mr Rich for action.</i>
<u>precede</u>	Come before in order or position. <i>He let her precede him through the gate.</i>
rushing	The action of gaining yardage or scoring a touchdown or conversion by running from scrimmage with the ball. <i>Responders attempted to shut off the rushing water.</i>
<u>simplistic</u>	Characterized by extreme and often misleading simplicity. <i>A simplistic theory of the universe.</i>
subdue	Overcome, quieten, or bring under control (a feeling or person). <i>Subdue one's appetites.</i>

surmount	Stand or be placed on top of. <i>All manner of cultural differences were surmounted.</i>
surpass	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>He continued to surpass me at all games.</i>
transcend	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>This was an issue transcending party politics.</i>
transcendent	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>The notion of any transcendent reality beyond thought.</i>
transgress	(of the sea) spread over (an area of land). <i>The sea transgresses along the West coast of the island.</i>
trespass	Entry to a person's land or property without permission. <i>A man who had trespassed against Judaic law.</i>
