<b>appreciably</b>	To a noticeable degree. <i>Profits have grown <b>appreciably</b> over the last four years.</i>
<b>considerably</b>	By a notably large amount or to a notably large extent; greatly. <i>Painting the room white made it seem <b>considerably</b> or substantially larger.</i>
<b>deathly</b>	To an extreme degree. <i>The night was <b>deathly</b> cold.</i>
<b>decidedly</b>	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>He looked <b>decidedly</b> uncomfortable.</i>

<b>distinctly</b>	In a distinct and distinguishable manner. <i>It s <b>distinctly</b> possible.</i>
<b>especially</b>	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>An <b>especially</b> or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
<b>exceptionally</b>	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The weather was <b>exceptionally</b> mild for the time of the year.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i><b>Extremely</b> unpleasant.</i>
<b>greatly</b>	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him <b>greatly</b>.</i>
<b>immensely</b>	To an exceedingly great extent or degree. <i>Was <b>immensely</b> more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
<b>indeed</b>	Used in a response to express interest, surprise, or contempt. <i>It is very cold <b>indeed</b>.</i>
<b>most</b>	Almost. <i>What she wanted <b>most</b> of all.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not <b>really</b> my aunt and uncle.</i>
<b>super</b>	Especially; particularly. <i>He s been <b>super</b> understanding.</i>
<b>supremely</b>	Very well; excellently. <i>A <b>supremely</b> talented actor.</i>
<b>tremendously</b>	To a very great extent. <i>I have been helped <b>tremendously</b> by my family.</i>
<b>truly</b>	In actual fact or without doubt; really. <i>It is <b>truly</b> a privilege to be here.</i>
<b>very</b>	Precisely so. <i>She was <b>very</b> gifted.</i>

<b>also</b>	In addition. <i><b>Also</b> a car is very expensive to run.</i>

<b><u>either</u></b>	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like 'likewise' or 'also'.

<b>exaggerated</b>	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>An <b>exaggerated</b> opinion of oneself.</i>

<b>excessively</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To an extreme degree. <i><b>Extremely</b> unpleasant.</i>
<b><u>fulsome</u></b>	Of large size or quantity; generous or abundant. <i>The <b>fulsome</b> details of the later legend.</i>
<b><u>furthermore</u></b>	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.</i>
<b><u>highly</u></b>	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>A <b>highly</b> dangerous substance.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i><b>Immoderate</b> laughter.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	Having or showing a lack of self-control; immoderate. <i>An <b>intemperate</b> climate.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i><b>Intense</b> emotion.</i>

<b>likewise</b>	In a like manner; similarly. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age <b>likewise</b> the attainment targets.</i>
<b>over</b>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>The jukebox plays every song twice <b>over</b>.</i>
<b>overdo</b>	Overcook. <i>She rather <b>overdoes</b> the early cockney scenes.</i>
<b>overly</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>praising</b>	Full of or giving praise.
<b>prohibitively</b>	To a prohibitive degree. <i>Most of the products are priced <b>prohibitively</b>.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>Editing a <b>prolix</b> manuscript.</i>
<b>similarly</b>	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>A <b>similarly</b> priced property.</i>
<b>super</b>	A superintendent. <i>He s been <b>super</b> understanding.</i>
<b>too</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>He wore suits that seemed a size <b>too</b> small for him.</i>
<b>ultimate</b>	The finest or most superior quality of its kind. <i>The <b>ultimate</b> insult.</i>
<b>unbearably</b>	To an unbearable degree. <i>The men and their families have suffered <b>unbearably</b>.</i>
<b>undue</b>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn t want to show <b>undue</b> excitement.</i>
<b>very</b>	Used to emphasize that the following description applies without qualification. <i>The river rose <b>very</b> quickly.</i>
