appreciably	To a noticeable degree. <i>Profits have grown appreciably over the last four years.</i>
considerably	By a notably large amount or to a notably large extent; greatly. <i>Painting the room white made it seem considerably or substantially larger.</i>
deathly	To an extreme degree. <i>The night was deathly cold.</i>
decidedly	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>He looked decidedly uncomfortable.</i>

distinctly	In a distinct and distinguishable manner. <i>It s distinctly possible.</i>
especially	To a distinctly greater extent or degree than is common. <i>An especially or specially cautious approach to the danger.</i>
exceptionally	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The weather was exceptionally mild for the time of the year.</i>
extremely	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>Extremely unpleasant.</i>
greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him greatly.</i>
immensely	To an exceedingly great extent or degree. <i>Was immensely more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
indeed	Used in a response to express interest, surprise, or contempt. <i>It is very cold indeed.</i>
most	Almost. <i>What she wanted most of all.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not really my aunt and uncle.</i>
super	Especially; particularly. <i>He s been super understanding.</i>
supremely	Very well; excellently. <i>A supremely talented actor.</i>
tremendously	To a very great extent. <i>I have been helped tremendously by my family.</i>
truly	In actual fact or without doubt; really. <i>It is truly a privilege to be here.</i>
very	Precisely so. <i>She was very gifted.</i>

additionally	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>Brokers finance themselves additionally by short term borrowing.</i>
also	In addition. <i>Also a car is very expensive to run.</i>

either	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like 'likewise' or 'also.'
enormously	Extremely. <i>She has been enormously successful.</i>
exaggerated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>An exaggerated opinion of oneself.</i>
excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>Excessive charges.</i>

highly	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>A highly dangerous substance.</i>
immoderate	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i>Immoderate laughter.</i>
inordinate	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.</i>
intemperate	Having or showing a lack of self-control; immoderate. <i>An intemperate climate.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>Intense emotion.</i>

likewise	In a like manner; similarly. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age likewise the attainment targets.</i>
over	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>The jukebox plays every song twice over.</i>
overdo	Overcook. <i>She rather overdoes the early cockney scenes.</i>
overly	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
praising	Full of or giving praise.
prohibitively	To a prohibitive degree. <i>Most of the products are priced prohibitively.</i>
prolix	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. <i>Editing a prolix manuscript.</i>
similarly	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>A similarly priced property.</i>
super	A superintendent. <i>He s been super understanding.</i>
too	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>He wore suits that seemed a size too small for him.</i>
ultimate	The finest or most superior quality of its kind. <i>The ultimate insult.</i>
unbearably	To an unbearable degree. <i>The men and their families have suffered unbearably.</i>
undue	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>I didn t want to show undue excitement.</i>
very	Used to emphasize that the following description applies without qualification. <i>The river rose very quickly.</i>
