<b>excellent</b>	Extremely good; outstanding. <i>Made an <b>excellent</b> speech.</i>
<a href="#">exemplary</a>	(of damages) exceeding the amount needed for simple compensation. <i>An <b>exemplary</b> jail sentence.</i>
<b>fine</b>	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>A <b>fine</b> gentleman.</i>
<b>innately</b>	As an inborn characteristic; naturally. <i>He says females are <b>innately</b> predisposed to learn about people and their emotions.</i>
<b>outdistance</b>	Go far ahead of. <i>She could maintain a fast enough pace to <b>outdistance</b> any pursuers.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Be superior to in action or performance. <i>Not to be <b>outdone</b> Vicky and Laura reached the same standard.</i>
<b>outpace</b>	Go, rise, or improve faster than. <i>Malthus believed that population increase would <b>outpace</b> increases in the means of subsistence.</i>

<b>outrun</b>	Run faster than. <i>It s harder than anyone imagines to <b>outrun</b> destiny.</i>
<b>outstanding</b>	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>The team s <b>outstanding</b> performance.</i>
<b>outstrip</b>	Exceed. <i>During the morning warm up he once again <b>outstripped</b> the field.</i>
<b>outwit</b>	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>Ray had <b>outwitted</b> many an opponent.</i>
<b>overreach</b>	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>The Church <b>overreached</b> itself in securing a territory that would prove impossible to hold.</i>
<b>overstep</b>	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>You must not <b>overstep</b> your borrowing limit.</i>
<b><u>overtake</u></b>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>He overtook in the face of oncoming traffic.</i>
<b><u>phenomenal</u></b>	Perceptible by the senses or through immediate experience. <i>The <b>phenomenal</b> world.</i>
<b>rushing</b>	The action of gaining yardage or scoring a touchdown or conversion by running from scrimmage with the ball. <i>He is becoming the best <b>rushing</b> quarterback in NFL history.</i>
<b>superb</b>	Used in names of birds with attractive or colourful plumage e g superb lyrebird. <i>A <b>superb</b> performance.</i>
<b>superior</b>	A superior letter figure or symbol. <i>A <b>superior</b> officer.</i>
<b><u>surpass</u></b>	Distinguish oneself. <i>One line of soldiers <b>surpassed</b> the other.</i>
<b>surpassing</b>	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>A picture of <b>surpassing</b> beauty.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>This was an issue <b>transcending</b> party politics.</i>
<b>transcendent</b>	(of God) existing apart from and not subject to the limitations of the material universe. <i>The notion of any <b>transcendent</b> reality beyond thought.</i>
<b><u>transgress</u></b>	Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises. <i>Each continent has been <b>transgressed</b> by continental seas.</i>

*The quality of workmanship is **unsurpassed**.*

**victor** A code word representing the letter V, used in radio communication.  
*There were many dead on the field but no clear **victor**.*
