better	Changed for the better in health or fitness. <i>A better coat.</i>
calibre	The diameter of a bullet, shell, or rocket. <i>A small calibre revolver.</i>
exalted	In a state of extreme happiness. <i>An exalted ideal.</i>
exceed	Be better than; surpass. <i>The Tribunal s decision clearly exceeds its powers under the statute.</i>
excellent	Extremely good; outstanding. <i>Made an excellent speech.</i>
exemplary	(of damages) exceeding the amount needed for simple compensation. <i>An exemplary jail sentence.</i>
fine	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>A fine gentleman.</i>
innately	As an inborn characteristic; naturally. <i>He says females are innately predisposed to learn about people and their emotions.</i>
outdistance	Go far ahead of. <i>She could maintain a fast enough pace to outdistance any pursuers.</i>
outdo	Be superior to in action or performance. <i>Not to be outdone Vicky and Laura reached the same standard.</i>
outpace	Go, rise, or improve faster than. <i>Malthus believed that population increase would outpace increases in the means of subsistence.</i>

outrun	Run faster than. <i>It s harder than anyone imagines to outrun destiny.</i>
outstanding	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>The team s outstanding performance.</i>
outstrip	Exceed. <i>During the morning warm up he once again outstripped the field.</i>
outwit	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>Ray had outwitted many an opponent.</i>
overreach	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>The Church overreached itself in securing a territory that would prove impossible to hold.</i>
overstep	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>You must not overstep your borrowing limit.</i>
<u>overtake</u>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>He overtook in the face of oncoming traffic.</i>
<u>phenomenal</u>	Perceptible by the senses or through immediate experience. <i>The phenomenal world.</i>
rushing	The action of gaining yardage or scoring a touchdown or conversion by running from scrimmage with the ball. <i>He is becoming the best rushing quarterback in NFL history.</i>
superb	Used in names of birds with attractive or colourful plumage e g superb lyrebird. <i>A superb performance.</i>
superior	A superior letter figure or symbol. <i>A superior officer.</i>
<u>surpass</u>	Distinguish oneself. <i>One line of soldiers surpassed the other.</i>
surpassing	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>A picture of surpassing beauty.</i>
transcend	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>This was an issue transcending party politics.</i>
transcendent	(of God) existing apart from and not subject to the limitations of the material universe. <i>The notion of any transcendent reality beyond thought.</i>
<u>transgress</u>	Act in disregard of laws, rules, contracts, or promises. <i>Each continent has been transgressed by continental seas.</i>

unsurpassed Not capable of being improved on.
*The quality of workmanship is **unsurpassed**.*

victor A code word representing the letter V, used in radio communication.
*There were many dead on the field but no clear **victor**.*
