## **Excise as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Excise" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “excise” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A tax levied on certain goods and commodities produced or sold within a country and on licences granted for certain activities.*
- *A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate).*

- duty** A payment levied on the transfer of property, for licences, and for the legal recognition of documents.  
*A **duty** nurse.*
- excise tax** A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate).
- levy** A tax raised by levying.

- tariff** A list of import or export tariffs.  
*The reduction of trade barriers and import **tariffs**.*
- tax** Charge against a citizen's person or property or activity for the support of government.  
*A **tax** bill.*
- tithe** A tenth of a specified thing.  
*He hadn't said a **tithe** of the prayers he knew.*



**toll**

The adverse effect of something.  
*She heard the distant **toll** of church bells.*

- *The rate of excise duty on spirits.*

## Excise as a Verb

### Definitions of "Excise" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "excise" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Remove by cutting.*
- *Remove by erasing or crossing out or as if by drawing a line.*
- *Levy an excise tax on.*

- Charge excise on (goods).

## Synonyms of "Excise" as a verb (3 Words)

- expunge** Remove by erasing or crossing out or as if by drawing a line.  
*The kind of man that could **expunge** an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.*
- scratch** Play a record using the scratch technique.  
*The lovers **scratched** their names into the bark of the tree.*
- strike** Undertake strike action against an employer.  
*If they do **strike** oil there will be another test well in a year s time.*

## Usage Examples of "Excise" as a verb

- The surgeon excised the tumor.

## Associations of "Excise" (30 Words)

- abolitionism** The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
- bowdlerize** Edit by omitting or modifying parts considered indelicate.  
***Bowdlerize** a novel.*
- cutout** A photograph from which the background has been cut away.
- delete** Remove or make invisible.  
*Their EMI release has already been **deleted**.*
- discharge** Go off or discharge.  
***Discharge** liquids.*
- efface** Cause (a memory or emotion) to disappear completely.  
*With time the words are **effaced** by the rain.*
- eject** Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule.  
*He was **ejected** from office in July.*
- elimination** The exclusion of someone or something from consideration or further participation.  
*The treatment promotes the **elimination** of toxins.*
- eradicate** Kill in large numbers.  
*This disease has been **eradicated** from the world.*
- erase** Remove recorded material from (a magnetic tape or medium); delete (data) from a computer's memory.  
*Who **erased** the files from my hard disk.*

<b>evict</b>	Expel or eject without recourse to legal process. <i>A single mother and her children have been <b>evicted</b> from their home.</i>
<b>exclude</b>	Remove from consideration. <i>The public were <b>excluded</b> from the board meeting.</i>
<b><u>exclusion</u></b>	The state of being excommunicated. <i>He had a hand in my <b>exclusion</b> from the committee.</i>
<b><u>expel</u></b>	Eliminate (a substance). <i>She <b>expelled</b> a shuddering breath.</i>
<b>expulsion</b>	The action of forcing someone to leave an organization. <i>The child s <b>expulsion</b> from school.</i>
<b><u>expunge</u></b>	Obliterate or remove completely (something unwanted or unpleasant). <i>The kind of man that could <b>expunge</b> an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.</i>
<b>expurgate</b>	Edit by omitting or modifying parts considered indelicate. <i>Editors heavily <b>expurgated</b> the novel before its initial publication.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>She didn t <b>get</b> the joke.</i>
<b>irreducible</b>	Incapable of being made smaller or simpler. <i>Literature is often <b>irreducible</b> to normative ideas.</i>
<b>liquidate</b>	Kill (someone), typically by violent means. <i>A plan to <b>liquidate</b> 1 billion worth of property over seven years.</i>
<b>liquidation</b>	The clearing of a debt. <i>The company went into <b>liquidation</b>.</i>
<b><u>obliterate</u></b>	Make undecipherable or imperceptible by obscuring or concealing. <i>The memory was so painful that he <b>obliterated</b> it from his mind.</i>
<b>oust</b>	Remove from a position or office. <i>The reformists were <b>ousted</b> from power.</i>
<b>reductive</b>	Characterized by or causing diminution or curtailment – R.H.Rovere. <i>The <b>reductive</b> elimination of acetyl iodide.</i>
<b>remove</b>	Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove something abstract. <i>At this <b>remove</b> the whole incident seems insane.</i>
<b>riddance</b>	The act of forcing out someone or something. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not <b>riddance</b> or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
<b>rout</b>	Defeat and cause to retreat in disorder. <i>A <b>rout</b> of strangers ought not to be admitted.</i>

**rub**

An act of rubbing.  
*He **rubbed** at the earth on his jeans.*

**scratch**

An act or spell of scratching oneself to relieve itching.  
*My sweater **scratches**.*

**shorten**

Become short or shorter.  
***Shorten** the skirt.*
