Excise as a Noun

Definitions of "Excise" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “excise” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A tax levied on certain goods and commodities produced or sold within a country and on licences granted for certain activities.*
- *A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate).*



Synonyms of "Excise" as a noun (7 Words)

duty	A payment levied on the transfer of property, for licences, and for the legal recognition of documents. A duty nurse.
excise tax	A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate).
levy	A tax raised by levying. <i>The trade union political levy.</i>
tariff	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import tariffs.</i>
<u>tax</u>	Charge against a citizen's person or property or activity for the support of government. A tax bill.
<u>tithe</u>	A tenth of a specified thing. <i>He hadn't said a tithe of the prayers he knew.</i>

toll

The adverse effect of something.
*She heard the distant **toll** of church bells.*



Usage Examples of "Excise" as a noun

- *The rate of excise duty on spirits.*

Excise as a Verb

Definitions of "Excise" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "excise" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Remove by cutting.*
- *Remove by erasing or crossing out or as if by drawing a line.*
- *Levy an excise tax on.*

- Charge excise on (goods).

Synonyms of "Excise" as a verb (3 Words)

- expunge** Remove by erasing or crossing out or as if by drawing a line.
*The kind of man that could **expunge** an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.*
- scratch** Play a record using the scratch technique.
*The lovers **scratched** their names into the bark of the tree.*
- strike** Undertake strike action against an employer.
*If they do **strike** oil there will be another test well in a year s time.*

Usage Examples of "Excise" as a verb

- The surgeon excised the tumor.

Associations of "Excise" (30 Words)

- abolitionism** The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
- bowdlerize** Edit by omitting or modifying parts considered indelicate.
***Bowdlerize** a novel.*
- cutout** A photograph from which the background has been cut away.
- delete** Remove or make invisible.
*Their EMI release has already been **deleted**.*
- discharge** Go off or discharge.
***Discharge** liquids.*
- efface** Cause (a memory or emotion) to disappear completely.
*With time the words are **effaced** by the rain.*
- eject** Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule.
*He was **ejected** from office in July.*
- elimination** The exclusion of someone or something from consideration or further participation.
*The treatment promotes the **elimination** of toxins.*
- eradicate** Kill in large numbers.
*This disease has been **eradicated** from the world.*
- erase** Remove recorded material from (a magnetic tape or medium); delete (data) from a computer's memory.
*Who **erased** the files from my hard disk.*

evict	Expel or eject without recourse to legal process. <i>A single mother and her children have been evicted from their home.</i>
exclude	Remove from consideration. <i>The public were excluded from the board meeting.</i>
<u>exclusion</u>	The state of being excommunicated. <i>He had a hand in my exclusion from the committee.</i>
<u>expel</u>	Eliminate (a substance). <i>She expelled a shuddering breath.</i>
expulsion	The action of forcing someone to leave an organization. <i>The child s expulsion from school.</i>
<u>expunge</u>	Obliterate or remove completely (something unwanted or unpleasant). <i>The kind of man that could expunge an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.</i>
expurgate	Edit by omitting or modifying parts considered indelicate. <i>Editors heavily expurgated the novel before its initial publication.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>She didn t get the joke.</i>
irreducible	Incapable of being made smaller or simpler. <i>Literature is often irreducible to normative ideas.</i>
liquidate	Kill (someone), typically by violent means. <i>A plan to liquidate 1 billion worth of property over seven years.</i>
liquidation	The clearing of a debt. <i>The company went into liquidation.</i>
<u>obliterate</u>	Make undecipherable or imperceptible by obscuring or concealing. <i>The memory was so painful that he obliterated it from his mind.</i>
oust	Remove from a position or office. <i>The reformists were ousted from power.</i>
reductive	Characterized by or causing diminution or curtailment – R.H.Rovere. <i>The reductive elimination of acetyl iodide.</i>
remove	Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove something abstract. <i>At this remove the whole incident seems insane.</i>
riddance	The act of forcing out someone or something. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not riddance or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
rout	Defeat and cause to retreat in disorder. <i>A rout of strangers ought not to be admitted.</i>

rub

An act of rubbing.

He **rubbed** at the earth on his jeans.

scratch

An act or spell of scratching oneself to relieve itching.

My sweater **scratches**.

shorten

Become short or shorter.

Shorten the skirt.
