<b>charge up</b>	Place a heraldic bearing on.
<b>commove</b>	Change the arrangement or position of.
<b>electrify</b>	Charge with electricity; pass an electric current through. <i>After locking the farm gate I had switched on the power to <b>electrify</b> the fence.</i>
<b><u>elicit</u></b>	Evoke or draw out (a reaction, answer, or fact) from someone. <b>Elicit</b> a solution.
<b>energise</b>	Cause to be alert and energetic.
<b><u>energize</u></b>	Raise to a higher energy level. <i>People were <b>energized</b> by his ideas.</i>
<b><u>enliven</u></b>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. <i>The visit had clearly <b>enlivened</b> my mother.</i>
<b>exhilarate</b>	Make (someone) feel very happy, animated, or elated. <i>She was <b>exhilarated</b> by the day s events.</i>
<b>fire the enthusiasm of</b>	Terminate the employment of; discharge from an office or position.
<b>fire the imagination of</b>	Terminate the employment of; discharge from an office or position.
<b>foment</b>	Bathe with warm water or medicated lotions. <i>His legs should be <b>fomented</b>.</i>
<b><u>galvanize</u></b>	Stimulate (muscles) by administering a shock. <i>They promised they would <b>galvanize</b> the iron railings to prevent rusting.</i>
<b><u>incite</u></b>	Urge on; cause to act. <b>Incite</b> a riot.
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>High fines further <b>inflamed</b> public feelings.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Incite someone to do something, especially something bad. <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>kindle</u></b>	Cause to start burning. <i>The dried grass of the prairie <b>kindled</b> spreading the flames for miles.</i>

**make someone feel sexually excited**

To compose or represent.

**move**

Change location move travel or proceed also metaphorically.  
*The school **moved** over to the new course in 1987.*

**provoke**

Evoke or provoke to appear or occur.  
*Her behavior **provoked** a quarrel between the couple.*

**rouse**

Cause to be agitated excited or roused.  
*He was **roused** by the drunken men in the street.*

**shake**

Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state.  
*She was visibly **shaken** and upset when she returned.*

**shake up**

Undermine or cause to waver.

**spark off**

Put in motion or move to act.

**stimulate**

Stir the feelings, emotions, or peace of.  
*Coffee and tea **stimulate** me.*

**stir**

Stir the feelings emotions or peace of.  
*Nothing **stirred** except the wind.*

**stir up**

To begin moving.

**thrill**

Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input.  
***Thrill** to the magic of the world s greatest guitarist.*

**titillate**

Excite pleasurably or erotically.  
*The press are paid to **titillate** the public.*

**touch off**

Comprehend.

**trigger**

Release or pull the trigger on.  
*The death of Helen s father **triggered** her to follow a childhood dream and become a falconer.*

**trigger off**

Put in motion or move to act.

**turn on**

Cause to move around or rotate.

**wind up**

Raise or haul up with or as if with mechanical help.

<b>arousal</b>	The action or fact of arousing or being aroused. <i>Sexual <b>arousal</b> in dreams is common.</i>

<b><u>energize</u></b>	Give vitality and enthusiasm to. <i>Floor sensors are <b>energized</b> by standing passengers.</i>
<b>enkindle</b>	Arouse or inspire (an emotion). <i>The glare from its <b>enkindled</b> roof illumined its innermost recesses.</i>
<b>fizz</b>	The quality of being fizzy effervescence. <i>The champagne had lost its <b>fizz</b>.</i>
<b>foment</b>	Bathe with warm water or medicated lotions. <i>They accused him of <b>fomenting</b> political unrest.</i>
<b>froth</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>Leave the yeast until there is a good head of <b>froth</b>.</i>
<b><u>incite</u></b>	Urge or persuade (someone) to act in a violent or unlawful way. <i>They conspired to <b>incite</b> riots.</i>
<b><u>induce</u></b>	Cause (radioactivity) by bombardment with radiation. <i>Carol was <b>induced</b> just four days before her baby s due date.</i>
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The repetitive motion <b>inflamed</b> her joint.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Heighten or intensify. <i>The film was successful enough to <b>inspire</b> a sequel.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Incite someone to do something, especially something bad. <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Summon (a spirit) by charms or incantation. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely <b>invoked</b> in England.</i>
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Cause (someone) to have interest in or enthusiasm for something. <i>He said he would <b>motivate</b> funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
<b><u>provocative</u></b>	Intended or intending to arouse sexual desire or interest. <i>A <b>provocative</b> article.</i>
<b><u>provoke</u></b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Rachel refused to be <b>provoked</b>.</i>



<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Once the enemy camp was <b>roused</b> they would move on the castle.</i>
<b>spur</b>	Goad with spurs. <i>Governments cut interest rates to <b>spur</b> demand.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>The book <b>stimulated</b> her imagination.</i>
<b>stir</b>	Stir feelings in. <i><b>Stir</b> the soup.</i>
<b>wake</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>There s no weeping at an Irish <b>wake</b>.</i>
<b>waken</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>She knew he would <b>waken</b> in an hour or so.</i>
