- *Act as a stimulant.*
- *Stimulate sexually.*



Synonyms of "Excites" as a verb (15 Words)

- agitate** Cause to be agitated excited or roused.
*The thought of questioning Toby **agitated** him extremely.*
- arouse** Evoke or awaken (a feeling, emotion, or response).
*An ability to influence the audience and to **arouse** the masses.*
- charge** Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on.
*He **charged** her with cleaning up all the files over the weekend.*
- charge up** Enter a certain amount as a charge.
- commove** Cause to be agitated, excited, or roused.
- energise** Cause to be alert and energetic.
- energize** Cause to be alert and energetic.
*People were **energized** by his ideas.*
- rouse** Cause to be agitated excited or roused.
***Rouse** the cable out.*

- shake** Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state.
*My faith has been **shaken**.*
- shake up** Shake (a body part) to communicate a greeting, feeling, or cognitive state.
- stimulate** Cause to occur rapidly.
*The book **stimulated** her imagination.*
- stir** Stir the feelings emotions or peace of.
*Francis was always **stirring** trying to score off people.*
- turn on** Become officially one year older.
- wind up** Arrange or or coil around.



Usage Examples of "Excites" as a verb

agitate	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The thought of questioning Toby agitated him extremely.</i>
agitative	Causing or tending to cause anger or resentment.
<u>animate</u>	Endowed with feeling and unstructured consciousness. <i>Gods in a wide variety of forms both animate and inanimate.</i>
arousal	A state of heightened physiological activity. <i>Sexual arousal in dreams is common.</i>
arouse	To begin moving. <i>I was surprised to find that this look aroused me.</i>
awaken	Rouse from sleep; cause to stop sleeping. <i>He sighed but did not awaken.</i>
<u>brace</u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>A neck brace.</i>

<u>bubble</u>	Rise in bubbles or as if in bubbles. <i>They are not on tour packages seeing foreign ports from a bubble.</i>
effervescence	Bubbles in a liquid; fizz. <i>The effervescence of sparkling wine.</i>
encourage	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>We were encouraged by the success of this venture.</i>
<u>energize</u>	Give vitality and enthusiasm to. <i>Floor sensors are energized by standing passengers.</i>
enkindle	Cause to start burning. <i>The glare from its enkindled roof illumined its innermost recesses.</i>
fizz	The quality of being fizzy effervescence. <i>Carbide lamps fizzed in the darkness.</i>
foment	Bathe with warm water or medicated lotions. <i>His legs should be fomented.</i>
froth	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>The froth of party politics.</i>
<u>incite</u>	Provoke or stir up. <i>Incite a riot.</i>
<u>induce</u>	Cause to arise. <i>The ads induced me to buy a VCR.</i>
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>High fines further inflamed public feelings.</i>
inspire	Give rise to. <i>He inspired his students with a vision of freedom.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Incite someone to do something, especially something bad. <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>invoke</u>	Call earnestly for. <i>He invoked the law that would save him.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Give an incentive for action. <i>He was primarily motivated by the desire for profit.</i>
<u>provocative</u>	Intentionally arousing sexual desire. <i>Provocative Irish tunes which compel the hearers to dance.</i>
<u>provoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>Rachel refused to be provoked.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The crowds were roused to fever pitch by the drama of the race.</i>

spur	Strike with a spur. <i>Spur horses.</i>
stimulate	Stir the feelings, emotions, or peace of. <i>The courses stimulate a passion for learning.</i>
stir	An act of stirring food or drink. <i>Desmond stirred his tea and ate a biscuit.</i>
wake	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>He was attending a friend s wake.</i>
waken	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>She wakened the child and dressed her.</i>
