Exclaim as a Verb

Definitions of "Exclaim" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “exclaim” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cry out suddenly in surprise, strong emotion, or pain.*
- *State or announce.*
- *Utter aloud; often with surprise, horror, or joy.*

Synonyms of "Exclaim" as a verb (12 Words)

blurt out	Utter impulsively.
burst out with	Come open suddenly and violently, as if from internal pressure.
call out	Greet, as with a prescribed form, title, or name.
come out with	Cover a certain distance.
cry	Bring into a particular state by crying. <i>Don't cry it'll be all right.</i>
cry out	Utter a sudden loud cry.
declare	Declare to be. <i>He declared last April.</i>

outcry	Shout louder than.
proclaim	State or announce. <i>He had a rolling gait that proclaimed him a man of the sea.</i>
promulgate	Put a law into effect by formal declaration. <i>In January 1852 the new Constitution was promulgated.</i>
shout	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>I m here the mother shouted when she saw her child looking lost.</i>
utter suddenly	Put into circulation.

Usage Examples of "Exclaim" as a verb

- 'I won!' he *exclaimed*.
- 'Well I never,' she *exclaimed*.
- She looked in the mirror, *exclaiming* in dismay at her appearance.
- 'I am not a Communist,' he *exclaimed*.

Associations of "Exclaim" (30 Words)

amazingly	Very; extremely (usually expressing approval). <i>There are so many amazingly good clarets.</i>
announce	Announce publicly or officially. <i>He announced the winners of the spelling bee.</i>
astonishment	Great surprise. <i>She looked at him in astonishment.</i>
bellow	(of a person or animal) emit a deep loud roar, typically in pain or anger. <i>He bellowed out the order.</i>
caller	A social or business visitor. <i>You need a fiddler and a caller for country dancing.</i>
clamor	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>He ignored the clamor of the crowd.</i>
declamation	Recitation of a speech from memory with studied gestures and intonation as an exercise in elocution or rhetoric. <i>Shakespearean declamation.</i>
declaration	A statement of taxable goods or of dutiable properties. <i>A declaration of independence.</i>

<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>The prime minister declared that the programme of austerity had paid off.</i>
<u>decree</u>	Issue a decree. <i>The king ruled by decree.</i>
gorgeous	Beautiful; very attractive. <i>The weather was gorgeous.</i>
<u>hello</u>	An utterance of hello a greeting. <i>I pressed the phone button and helloed.</i>
<u>herald</u>	Foreshadow or presage. <i>The speech heralded a change in policy.</i>
hi	An expression of greeting.
holler	Give a loud shout or cry. <i>The audience responded with whoops and hollers.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>Manifesto commitments.</i>
oh	A midwestern state in north central United States in the Great Lakes region.
outcry	Shout louder than. <i>The public outcry over the bombing.</i>
<u>predicate</u>	Make the grammatical predicate in a proposition. <i>Socrates is a man predicates manhood of Socrates.</i>
<u>proclaim</u>	Announce officially or publicly. <i>He had a rolling gait that proclaimed him a man of the sea.</i>
profess	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>The terrorists professed allegiance to their country.</i>
promulgate	State or announce. <i>These objectives have to be promulgated within the organization.</i>
pronouncement	A formal or authoritative announcement or declaration. <i>Distrust of the pronouncements of politicians was endemic.</i>
say	Communicate or express nonverbally. <i>The registrar says that I owe the school money.</i>
<u>scream</u>	Make a loud, piercing sound. <i>The screams of the seagulls.</i>
<u>shout</u>	Prevent someone from speaking or being heard by shouting. <i>The angry mother shouted at the teacher.</i>

wow	A joke that seems extremely funny. <i>The speaker wowed the audience.</i>
yeah	Not only so, but.
<u>yell</u>	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>You don't have to yell I can hear you just fine.</i>
<u>yes</u>	An affirmative. <i>Answering with assured and ardent yeses.</i>
