### barring

The act of excluding someone by a negative vote or veto.

### censure

Harsh criticism or disapproval.  
*Despite episcopal **censures** the practice continued.*

### debarment

The state of being debarred (excluded from enjoying certain possessions or rights or practices).  
*They achieved his **debarment** from holding public office.*

### ejection

The action of forcing someone to leave a place or position; expulsion.  
*The **ejection** of troublemakers by the police.*

### elimination

The complete removal or destruction of something.  
*After the initial **elimination** rounds 16 boys qualified for the final.*

### elision

An omission of a passage in a book, speech, or film.  
*Conversational **elisions**.*

### embargo

An official ban on any activity.  
*An **embargo** laid by our Emperor upon all vessels whatsoever.*

### exception

Grounds for adverse criticism.  
*With the **exception** of the children everyone was told the news.*

### excommunication

The state of being excommunicated.  
*He appealed against the papal sentence of **excommunication**.*

<b>expulsion</b>	The act of expelling or projecting or ejecting. <i>The child s <b>expulsion</b> from school.</i>
<b>factoring out</b>	An independent variable in statistics.
<b>keeping out</b>	The main tower within the walls of a medieval castle or fortress.
<b>prohibition</b>	The period from 1920 to 1933 when the sale of alcoholic beverages was prohibited in the United States by a constitutional amendment. <i><b>Prohibitions</b> on insider dealing.</i>
<b>removal</b>	The forcing of individuals or communities to leave their place of residence, especially to move to ethnically homogeneous rural settlements. <i><b>Removal</b> men.</i>
<b>riddance</b>	The action of getting rid of a troublesome or unwanted person or thing. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not <b>riddance</b> or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
<b>ruling out</b>	The reason for a court's judgment (as opposed to the decision itself.
<b>throwing out</b>	Bedclothes consisting of a lightweight cloth covering (an afghan or bedspread) that is casually thrown over something.

<b>abolition</b>	The action of abolishing a system, practice, or institution. <i>The <b>abolition</b> of the death penalty.</i>
<b>abolitionism</b>	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
<b>abolitionist</b>	A person who favours the abolition of a practice or institution, especially capital punishment or (formerly) slavery. <i>The <b>abolitionist</b> movement.</i>
<b>banish</b>	Ban from a place of residence, as for punishment. <i><b>Banish</b> gloom.</i>
<b>barring</b>	The act of excluding someone by a negative vote or veto.
<b>besides</b>	In addition. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more <b>besides</b>.</i>

<b>deport</b>	Behave in a certain manner. <i>He has <b>deported</b> himself with great dignity.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>He <b>discharged</b> his resentment in the harmless form of memoirs.</i>
<b>eject</b>	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>He was <b>ejected</b> from office in July.</i>
<b>elimination</b>	The bodily process of discharging waste matter. <i>The <b>elimination</b> of extreme poverty is a key objective.</i>
<u><b>erase</b></u>	Wipe out digitally or magnetically recorded information. <i>Over twenty years the last vestiges of a rural economy were <b>erased</b>.</i>
<b>evict</b>	Expel (someone) from a property, especially with the support of the law. <i>The landlord <b>evicted</b> the tenants after they had not paid the rent for four months.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>
<b>exception</b>	An instance that does not conform to a rule or generalization. <i>All her children were brilliant the only <b>exception</b> was her last child.</i>
<u><b>excise</b></u>	Charge excise on goods. <i>The rate of <b>excise</b> duty on spirits.</i>
<b>exclude</b>	Prevent from entering; shut out. <i>One cannot <b>exclude</b> the possibility of a fall in house prices.</i>
<b>exemption</b>	An act exempting someone. <i>Additional <b>exemptions</b> are allowed for each dependent.</i>
<b>exile</b>	The act of expelling a person from their native land. <i>Men in <b>exile</b> dream of hope.</i>
<u><b>expel</b></u>	Force to leave or move out. <i>Eight diplomats were <b>expelled</b> from Norway for espionage.</i>
<b>expulsion</b>	The action of forcing someone to leave an organization. <i>The <b>expulsion</b> of pus from the pimple.</i>
<u><b>expunge</b></u>	Obliterate or remove completely (something unwanted or unpleasant). <i>The kind of man that could <b>expunge</b> an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.</i>
<b>irreducible</b>	Not able to be reduced or simplified. <i>Literature is often <b>irreducible</b> to normative ideas.</i>
<b>liquidate</b>	(of a business) go into liquidation. <i>The mafia <b>liquidated</b> the informer.</i>

<b>liquidation</b>	The killing of someone, typically by violent means. <i>The company went into <b>liquidation</b>.</i>
<b>oust</b>	Remove and replace. <i>The word processor has <b>ousted</b> the typewriter.</i>
<b>reductive</b>	Characterized by or causing diminution or curtailment. <i>He combines his <b>reductive</b> abstract shapes with a rippled surface.</i>
<b>riddance</b>	The act of removing or getting rid of something. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not <b>riddance</b> or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
<b>rout</b>	Make a groove in. <i>A <b>rout</b> of wolves consumed the last of the carcass.</i>
