According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "exclusive" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Unable to exist or be true if something else exists or is true.
- Excluding much or all; especially all but a particular group or minority.
- Excluding or not admitting other things.
- Not divided or shared with others.
- (of terms) excluding all but what is specified.
- (of an item or story) not published or broadcast elsewhere.
- Not divided among or brought to bear on more than one object or objective.
- Not including.
- Catering for or available to only a few, select customers; high class and expensive.
- Restricted to the person, group, or area concerned.
- (of a commodity) not obtainable elsewhere.

<u>chic</u>	Elegant and stylish. <i>Chic</i> elegance.
choice	(of words or language) rude and abusive. He had a few choice words at his command.
complete	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A</i> complete ban on smoking.
elegant	Graceful and stylish in appearance or manner. <i>Elegant</i> handwriting.
elite	Selected as the best. <i>Elite</i> colleges.



entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. An ideological system with which he is in entire agreement.
especial	For or belonging chiefly to one person or thing. Her outburst was for my especial benefit.

full	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>Gives full measure.</i>
high-class	Pretentiously elegant.
<u>incompatible</u>	Not compatible with other facts. She declined the offer because it was incompatible with her values.
individual	Characteristic of a particular person or thing. <i>Individual</i> tiny flowers.
irreconcilable	(of people) implacably hostile to each other. These two views of the economy are irreconcilable .
<u>only</u>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. The only medal we had ever won.
personal	Concerning or affecting a particular person or his or her private life and personality. <i>He has his personal bank account and she has hers.</i>
premier	Of earliest creation. He holds the premier barony in the UK created in 1269.
<u>private</u>	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i>Private</i> education.
select	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i>Select peaches.</i>
<u>single</u>	Being or characteristic of a single thing or person. The kingdom was ruled over by a single family.
<u>sole</u>	Not divided or shared with others. Sole rights of publication.
special	For a special service or occasion. A special or specific role in the mission.
<u>stylish</u>	Having elegance or taste or refinement in manners or dress. A stylish range of jewellery.
<u>total</u>	Constituting the full quantity or extent; complete. A total stranger.



<u>undivided</u>	Not separated into parts or shares constituting an undivided unit. I can now give you my undivided attention.
unique	Applying exclusively to a given category or condition or locality. <i>The situation was unique in British politics.</i>
unshared	Not shared with or by another or others. Most of those placed in hostels would prefer unshared independent accommodation.
whole	Acting together as a single undiversified whole.

jurisdiction	The extent of the power to make legal decisions and judgements. Several different tax jurisdiction s.
limited	Denoting a limited company used after a company name. I think he is a very limited man.
limiting	Strictly limiting the reference of a modified word or phrase. A limiting factor.
<u>monopoly</u>	A board game in which players try to gain a monopoly on real estate as pieces advance around the board according to the throw of a die. <i>A monopoly on silver.</i>
<u>only</u>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>He was an only child.</i>
option	Buy or sell an option on. His second script will have been option ed by the time you read this.
other	Very unusual; different in character or quality from the normal or expected. <i>Went in the other direction.</i>
<u>pick</u>	Attack with or as if with a pickaxe of ice or rocky ground for example. <i>Laura should have first pick.</i>
purvey	Supply with provisions. We didn t want to purvey gloom and doom.
<u>purview</u>	The range of interest or activity that can be anticipated. Social taboos meant that little information was likely to come within the purview of women generally.
