- *Excluding or not admitting other things.*
- *Not divided or shared with others.*
- *(of terms) excluding all but what is specified.*
- *(of an item or story) not published or broadcast elsewhere.*
- *Not divided among or brought to bear on more than one object or objective.*
- *Not including.*
- *Catering for or available to only a few, select customers; high class and expensive.*
- *Restricted to the person, group, or area concerned.*
- *(of a commodity) not obtainable elsewhere.*

premier	Of earliest creation. <i>He holds the premier barony in the UK created in 1269.</i>
private	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i>Private education.</i>
select	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i>Select peaches.</i>
single	Being or characteristic of a single thing or person. <i>The kingdom was ruled over by a single family.</i>
sole	Not divided or shared with others. <i>Sole rights of publication.</i>
special	For a special service or occasion. <i>A special or specific role in the mission.</i>
stylish	Having elegance or taste or refinement in manners or dress. <i>A stylish range of jewellery.</i>
total	Constituting the full quantity or extent; complete. <i>A total stranger.</i>

- undivided** Not separated into parts or shares constituting an undivided unit.
*I can now give you my **undivided** attention.*
- unique** Applying exclusively to a given category or condition or locality.
*The situation was **unique** in British politics.*
- unshared** Not shared with or by another or others.
*Most of those placed in hostels would prefer **unshared** independent accommodation.*
- whole** Acting together as a single undiversified whole.
*A **whole** wardrobe for the tropics.*

authority	The power or right to give orders or make decisions. <i>A rebellion against those in authority.</i>
choice	(of words or language) rude and abusive. <i>My only choice is to refuse.</i>
choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>I always choose the fish over the meat courses in this restaurant.</i>
circumscribed	Subject to limits or subjected to limits.
classified	(of newspaper or magazine advertisements) organized in categories according to what is being advertised. <i>The classified columns of the newspaper.</i>

conditional	A conditional clause or conjunction. <i>The conditional sale will not be complete until the full purchase price is paid.</i>

exception	An instance that does not conform to a rule or generalization. <i>All her children were brilliant the only exception was her last child.</i>
extraordinary	Beyond what is ordinary or usual; highly unusual or exceptional or remarkable. <i>Extraordinary authority.</i>
individually	Personally; in an individual capacity. <i>Dublin people dress more individually than people in London.</i>
jurisdiction	The extent of the power to make legal decisions and judgements. <i>Several different tax jurisdictions.</i>
limited	Denoting a limited company used after a company name. <i>I think he is a very limited man.</i>
limiting	Strictly limiting the reference of a modified word or phrase. <i>A limiting factor.</i>
<u>monopoly</u>	A board game in which players try to gain a monopoly on real estate as pieces advance around the board according to the throw of a die. <i>A monopoly on silver.</i>
<u>only</u>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>He was an only child.</i>
option	Buy or sell an option on. <i>His second script will have been optioned by the time you read this.</i>
other	Very unusual; different in character or quality from the normal or expected. <i>Went in the other direction.</i>
<u>pick</u>	Attack with or as if with a pickaxe of ice or rocky ground for example. <i>Laura should have first pick.</i>
purvey	Supply with provisions. <i>We didn't want to purvey gloom and doom.</i>
<u>purview</u>	The range of interest or activity that can be anticipated. <i>Social taboos meant that little information was likely to come within the purview of women generally.</i>

<u>restricted</u>	Restricted in meaning as e.g. man in a tall man. <i>The mechanism of restricted virus replication.</i>
<u>selective</u>	Tending to select; characterized by careful choice. <i>He is very selective in his reading.</i>
selectively	In a way that involves the selection of only particular people or things. <i>He accused state officials of selectively enforcing the law.</i>
<u>sole</u>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i>A big blister on each heel and sole.</i>
<u>supplier</u>	Someone whose business is to supply a particular service or commodity. <i>Every major energy supplier upped their prices.</i>
uniquely	So as to be unique. <i>Uniquely shaped buildings.</i>
unprecedented	Never done or known before. <i>The government took the unprecedented step of releasing confidential correspondence.</i>
