<b>personal</b>	Concerning or affecting a particular person or his or her private life and personality. <i>He has his <b>personal</b> bank account and she has hers.</i>
<b>premier</b>	Of earliest creation. <i>He holds the <b>premier</b> barony in the UK created in 1269.</i>
<u><b>private</b></u>	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i><b>Private</b> education.</i>
<b>select</b>	Selected or chosen for special qualifications. <i><b>Select</b> peaches.</i>
<u><b>single</b></u>	Being or characteristic of a single thing or person. <i>The kingdom was ruled over by a <b>single</b> family.</i>
<u><b>sole</b></u>	Not divided or shared with others. <i><b>Sole</b> rights of publication.</i>

**unique**

Applying exclusively to a given category or condition or locality.  
*The situation was **unique** in British politics.*

**unshared**

Not shared with or by another or others.  
*Most of those placed in hostels would prefer **unshared** independent accommodation.*

**whole**

Acting together as a single undiversified whole.  
*A **whole** wardrobe for the tropics.*
