<b>pleasure trip</b>	A formal expression. (in American square dancing) a figure in which partners circle each other by taking sideways steps.
<b>sashay</b>	<i>After cautious <b>sashays</b> into the field.</i>
<b><u>tour</u></b>	A short trip to or through a place in order to view or inspect something. <i>A <b>tour</b> of duty in Northern Ireland.</i>
<b>trip</b>	A catch mechanism that acts as a switch. <i>He recited the whole poem without a single <b>trip</b>.</i>

<b>explanatory</b>	Serving or intended to explain or make clear. <i>An <b>explanatory</b> paragraph.</i>
<b>exploration</b>	A systematic consideration. <i>Some changes in the care giving situation may need <b>exploration</b>.</i>
<b><u>flight</u></b>	Shoot a bird in flight. <i><b>Flights</b> of whooper swans.</i>
<b><u>hike</u></b>	A long walk or walking tour. <i>Roy <b>hiked</b> up his trousers to reveal his socks.</i>
<b>itinerate</b>	Travel from place to place, as for work. <i>Regular use of <b>itinerating</b> magistrates was made.</i>
<b>jaunt</b>	A journey taken for pleasure. <i>Her regular <b>jaunts</b> to Europe.</i>
<b>journey</b>	Undertake a journey or trip. <i>An eight hour train <b>journey</b>.</i>
<b>junket</b>	A trip taken by an official at public expense. <i>The latest row over city council <b>junkets</b>.</i>
<b><u>leisure</u></b>	Freedom to choose a pastime or enjoyable activity. <i>He lacked the <b>leisure</b> for golf.</i>
<b>navigate</b>	Act as the navigator in a car, plane, or vessel and plan, direct, plot the path and position of the conveyance. <i>I used a browser to <b>navigate</b> around the Web.</i>
<b><u>odyssey</u></b>	A Greek epic poem (attributed to Homer) describing the journey of Odysseus after the fall of Troy. <i>His <b>odyssey</b> from military man to politician.</i>
<b>outing</b>	An appearance in something, especially a sporting event or film. <i>LGBT organizations strongly condemn the <b>outing</b> of a transgender person before they are ready to tell their own story.</i>
<b>peregrination</b>	A journey, especially a long or meandering one. <i>She kept Aunt Ilsa company on her <b>peregrinations</b>.</i>
<b>picnic</b>	Have or take part in a picnic. <i>We <b>picnicked</b> near the lake on this gorgeous Sunday.</i>
<b>recreational</b>	Of or relating to recreation. <i><b>Recreational</b> golfers.</i>

<b>sail</b>	A sailing ship. <i>The ferry caught fire <b>sailing</b> between Caen and Portsmouth.</i>
<b>sailing</b>	The action of sailing in a ship or boat. <i>The company operates five <b>sailings</b> a day from Ramsgate to Dunkirk.</i>
<b>tour</b>	Take a performer production etc on tour. <i>Ireland s eight match <b>tour</b> of New Zealand.</i>
<b>transatlantic</b>	Crossing the Atlantic. <i>A <b>transatlantic</b> flight.</i>
<b>travel</b>	The action of travelling. <i><b>Travel</b> the oceans.</i>
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>The questions on the test <b>tripped</b> him up.</i>
<b>voyage</b>	Go on a voyage. <i>His <b>voyage</b> to America.</i>
<b>wayfarer</b>	A person who travels on foot.
