Associations of "Executed" (30 Words)

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| airway | A duct that provides ventilation (as in mines. <i>He kept the man s airway clear and blood circulating.</i> |
| apprehend | Arrest (someone) for a crime. <i>He is a man that apprehends death no more dreadfully but as a drunken sleep.</i> |
| arrest | Attract and fix. <i>They placed her under arrest.</i> |
| capture | Capture as if by hunting snaring or trapping. <i>The island was captured by Australian forces in 1914.</i> |
| choke | Cause a person or animal to choke. <i>Many guns may not have the right choke.</i> |
| clutter | An untidy state. <i>The attic is full of clutter.</i> |
| convict | A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. <i>The man was convicted of fraud and sentenced.</i> |
| criminal | Relating to crime as opposed to civil matters. <i>Criminal in the sight of God and man.</i> |
| death | The personification of death. <i>He seemed more content in death than he had ever been in life.</i> |
| drown | Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>The noise drowned out her speech.</i> |
| garrote | Strangle with an iron collar. |
| hanging | The act of suspending something hanging it from above so it moves freely. <i>There was a small ceremony for the hanging of the portrait.</i> |
| imprison | Put or keep in prison or a place like a prison. <i>The suspects were imprisoned without trial.</i> |

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| ligature | Bind or connect with a ligature. <i>He ligatured the duodenum below the pylorus.</i> |
| muffle | Cover or wrap up (a source of sound) to reduce its loudness. <i>The trade unions fear their voice within the party is being muffled.</i> |
| obstruct | (in various sports) impede (a player in the opposing team) in a manner which constitutes an offence. <i>The appellants were arrested and later convicted of obstructing the police.</i> |
| oppress | Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>The government oppresses political activists.</i> |
| prison | A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. <i>The young man was prisoned behind the doors.</i> |
| prisoner | A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war. <i>A prisoner serving a life sentence.</i> |
| smother | Kill (someone) by covering their nose and mouth so that they suffocate. <i>I dreamt a stranger was trying to kill me by smothering me with a pillow.</i> |
| stifle | Restrain (a reaction) or stop oneself acting on (an emotion). <i>She stifled a giggle.</i> |
| strangle | Die from strangulation. <i>The victim was strangled with a scarf.</i> |
| suffocate | Struggle for breath; have insufficient oxygen intake. <i>The child suffocated under the pillow.</i> |
| suffocation | Difficulty in breathing. <i>The country's slow suffocation under the ever increasing weight of red tape.</i> |
| throttle | Control an engine or vehicle with a throttle. <i>The pitch of the engine fell as the driver throttled back.</i> |
| torture | Subject to torture. <i>Confessions extracted under torture.</i> |
| trial | Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>A trial of progesterone failed to relieve the pain.</i> |
| valve | Each of the halves of the hinged shell of a bivalve mollusc or brachiopod or of the parts of the compound shell of a barnacle. <i>The aortic valve.</i> |
