| <b>model</b>            | A person or thing regarded as an excellent example of a specified quality.<br><i>Wax <b>models</b> were used by sculptors in the lost wax method of bronze casting.</i> |
| <b><u>paragon</u></b>   | A person or thing viewed as a model of excellence.<br><i>It would have taken a <b>paragon</b> of virtue not to feel viciously jealous.</i>                              |
| <b>perfect example</b>  | A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed (sometimes regarded as perfective aspect).   |
| <b>quintessence</b>     | The purest and most concentrated essence of something.<br><i>He was the <b>quintessence</b> of political professionalism.</i>   |
| <b>shining example</b>  | The work of making something smooth and shiny by rubbing or waxing it.  |
| <b>textbook example</b> | A book prepared for use in schools or colleges.   |
| <b>type</b>             | Metal types used in letterpress printing.<br><i>The dolphin is a conventional <b>type</b> of Christ.</i>  |

| <b>herbarium</b>         | A room or building housing a herbarium.   |
| <b>ideal</b>             | Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal.<br><i>In an <b>ideal</b> world we might have made a different decision.</i>  |
| <b><u>instance</u></b>   | An item of information that is typical of a class or group.<br><i>I <b>instanced</b> Bob as someone whose commitment had certainly got things done.</i>   |

| <b><u>paragon</u></b>    | Model of excellence or perfection of a kind; one having no equal.<br><i>Your cook is a <b>paragon</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>photogenic</u></b> | (of an organism or tissue) producing or emitting light.<br><i>A <b>photogenic</b> child.</i>  |

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| <b>prototype</b>    | Make a prototype of a product.<br><i>The construction of bandpass networks from low pass <b>prototypes</b>.</i>   |
| <b>quintessence</b> | (in classical and medieval philosophy) a fifth substance in addition to the four elements, thought to compose the heavenly bodies and to be latent in all things.<br><i>We were all brought up to believe that advertising is the <b>quintessence</b> of marketing.</i> |
| <b>sample</b>       | Take a sample or samples of something for analysis.<br><i><b>Sample</b> some entertaining nights out in Liverpool.</i>  |
| <b>specimen</b>     | An example of something regarded as typical of its class or group.<br><i><b>Specimens</b> of copper ore.</i>  |
