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## Associations of "Exerted" (30 Words)

<b>belabor</b>	To work at or to absurd length. <i>She was <b>belabored</b> by her fellow students.</i>
<a href="#"><u>catalyze</u></a>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<a href="#"><u>clout</u></a>	A long distance shot that hits a clout. <i>I <b>clouted</b> him round the head.</i>
<b>extrude</b>	Thrust or force out. <i>Lava was being <b>extruded</b> from the volcano.</i>
<b>gavel</b>	Bring a hearing or person to order by use of a gavel. <i>He <b>gavelled</b> the convention to order.</i>
<b>hit</b>	Hit with a missile from a weapon. <i>It was still night when we <b>hit</b> the outskirts of London.</i>
<b>impact</b>	The violent interaction of individuals or groups entering into combat. <i>The book had an important <b>impact</b> on my thinking.</i>
<b>impinge</b>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>Several factors <b>impinge</b> on market efficiency.</i>
<b>implication</b>	Something that is inferred (deduced or entailed or implied). <i>He was suspected of <b>implication</b> in several robberies.</i>
<a href="#"><u>impression</u></a>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>Her courtesy had made a good <b>impression</b>.</i>
<b>influence</b>	Have an influence on. <i>The <b>influence</b> of television violence.</i>
<b>jostle</b>	The action of jostling. <i>People <b>jostled</b> against us.</i>
<b>leverage</b>	Mechanical advantage gained by leverage. <i>We need to <b>leverage</b> this company.</i>
<b>maintain</b>	Maintain by writing regular records. <i>The need to <b>maintain</b> close links between industry and schools.</i>

<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>The skills needed to <b>manage</b> a young dynamic team.</i>
<b>militate</b>	Have force or influence; bring about an effect or change. <i>These fundamental differences will <b>militate</b> against the two communities coming together.</i>
<b>moderating</b>	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<u><b>pierce</b></u>	14th President of the United States (1804-1869). <i>I <b>pierced</b> my nose and ears.</i>
<b>predispose</b>	Make someone liable or inclined to a specified attitude, action, or condition. <i>This illness <b>predisposes</b> you to gain weight.</i>
<b>press</b>	Press from a plastic. <i>The incident was not reported in the <b>press</b>.</i>
<b>pressure</b>	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>The compressed gas exerts an increased <b>pressure</b>.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>I <b>punched</b> the button to summon the lift.</i>
<u><b>push</b></u>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>The Dean is <b>pushing</b> for his favorite candidate.</i>
<b>pushing</b>	The act of applying force in order to move something away. <i>The <b>pushing</b> is good exercise.</i>
<u><b>shove</b></u>	The act of shoving (giving a push to someone or something). <i>I should have told the boss to <b>shove</b> it.</i>
<b>suggestible</b>	Open to suggestion; easily swayed. <i>A <b>suggestible</b> client would comply.</i>
<u><b>systemic</b></u>	(of an insecticide, fungicide, or similar substance) entering the plant via the roots or shoots and passing through the tissues. <i>The disease is localized rather than <b>systemic</b>.</i>
<b>wangle</b>	An act or an instance of obtaining something by persuasion or clever manipulation. <i>A rather clever <b>wangle</b> on the part of some of the folk at the office.</i>
<b>wield</b>	Have and exercise. <i>A masked raider <b>wielding</b> a handgun.</i>
