Exerts as a Verb

Definitions of "Exerts" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “exerts” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Have and exercise.*
- *Put to use.*
- *Make a great effort at a mental or physical task.*



Synonyms of "Exerts" as a verb (3 Words)

- exercise** Cause an animal to take exercise.
*Control is **exercised** by the Board.*
- maintain** Maintain by writing regular records.
*The Department for Transport is responsible for **maintaining** the main roads in England.*
- wield** Have and be able to use (power or influence).
***Wield** power and authority.*



Usage Examples of "Exerts" as a verb

- *Exert one's power or influence.*
- *Exert oneself.*



Associations of "Exerts" (30 Words)

belabor	To work at or to absurd length. <i>Belabor the obvious.</i>
<u>catalyze</u>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<u>clout</u>	A long distance shot that hits a clout. <i>A clout round the ear.</i>
extrude	Form or shape by forcing through an opening. <i>Lava was being extruded from the volcano.</i>
gavel	Bring a hearing or person to order by use of a gavel. <i>He gavelled the convention to order.</i>
hit	Hit with a missile from a weapon. <i>His career hit rock bottom.</i>
impact	Come into forcible contact with. <i>Bullets which expand and cause devastating injury on impact.</i>

impinge	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>The proposed fencing would impinge on a public bridleway.</i>
implication	A relation implicated by virtue of involvement or close connection (especially an incriminating involvement). <i>Our implication in the problems.</i>
<u>impression</u>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>The events left a permanent impression in his mind.</i>
influence	Have an influence on. <i>I was still under the influence of my parents.</i>
jostle	Make one's way by jostling, pushing, or shoving. <i>A jumble of images jostled for attention.</i>
leverage	Supplement with leverage. <i>Use a metal bar to increase the leverage.</i>
maintain	Maintain by writing regular records. <i>Agricultural prices will have to be maintained.</i>
manage	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>He could not manage 24 March after all.</i>
militate	Have force or influence; bring about an effect or change. <i>Politeness militated against this opinion being expressed.</i>
moderating	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<u>pierce</u>	Make a hole in (the ears or other part of the body) so as to wear jewellery in them. <i>A splinter had pierced the skin.</i>
predispose	Make someone liable or inclined to a specified attitude, action, or condition. <i>Lack of exercise may predispose an individual to high blood pressure.</i>
press	Exert pressure or force to or upon. <i>The crowds pressed along the street.</i>
pressure	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. <i>The sensitivity of his skin to pressure and temperature was normal.</i>
punch	An iced mixed drink usually containing alcohol and prepared for multiple servings normally served in a punch bowl. <i>I punched the button to summon the lift.</i>
<u>push</u>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>Now push hard said the doctor to the woman.</i>
pushing	The act of applying force in order to move something away. <i>The pushing is good exercise.</i>

- shove** Put (something) somewhere carelessly or roughly.
*She **shoved** the books into her briefcase.*
- suggestible** Open to suggestion; easily swayed.
*A **suggestible** client would comply.*
- systemic** Affecting an entire system.
*The disease is localized rather than **systemic**.*
- wangle** An act or an instance of obtaining something by persuasion or clever manipulation.
*A rather clever **wangle** on the part of some of the folk at the office.*
- wield** Have and be able to use (power or influence).
*The burglar **wielded** an axe.*
