Exhale as a Verb

Definitions of "Exhale" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “exhale” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Expel air.*
- *Give out (breath or an odor).*
- *Breathe out.*
- *Give off (vapour or fumes).*



Synonyms of "Exhale" as a verb (10 Words)

blow out Show off.

breathe out Manifest or evince.

discharge Go off or discharge.
*The overflow should **discharge** in an obvious place.*

emanate Originate from; be produced by.
*Water **emanates** from this hole in the ground.*

emit Express audibly; utter sounds (not necessarily words).
*Even the best cars **emit** carbon dioxide.*

expire (of a period of time) come to an end.
*His driving licence **expired**.*

give forth Give (as medicine).

give off Leave with; give temporarily.

puff out Praise extravagantly.

send forth Broadcast over the airwaves, as in radio or television.



Usage Examples of "Exhale" as a verb

- *The chimney exhales a thick smoke.*
- *The jungle exhaled mists of early morning.*
- *He exhaled the smoke towards the ceiling.*
- *She sat back and exhaled deeply.*



Associations of "Exhale" (30 Words)

airway	A commercial enterprise that provides scheduled flights for passengers. <i>He kept the man's airway clear and blood circulating.</i>
asthma	Respiratory disorder characterized by wheezing; usually of allergic origin.
breath	The power of breathing life. <i>There wasn't a breath of air in the room.</i>

breathe	Reach full flavor by absorbing air and being let to stand after having been uncorked. <i>Adult amphibians also breathe through their skin.</i>
cough	Force something especially blood out of the lungs or throat by coughing. <i>She gave a discreet cough.</i>
emit	Expel (gases or odors). <i>She emitted a sound like laughter.</i>
exhalation	The process or action of exhaling. <i>The nocturnal exhalation of vapours from decaying vegetable matter.</i>
expiration	A coming to an end of a contract period. <i>The expiration of three years.</i>
exude	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. <i>Sir Thomas exuded goodwill.</i>
fume	Treat with fumes expose to fumes especially with the aim of disinfecting or eradicating pests. <i>He breathed fumes of wine into her face.</i>
halitosis	Offensive breath.
inhale	Draw in (air). <i>Later on I inhale a box of chocolate cookies while watching cable TV.</i>
inhaler	A dispenser that produces a chemical vapor to be inhaled in order to relieve nasal congestion.
lung	Each of the pair of organs situated within the ribcage, consisting of elastic sacs with branching passages into which air is drawn, so that oxygen can pass into the blood and carbon dioxide be removed. Lungs are characteristic of vertebrates other than fish, though similar structures are present in some other animal groups. <i>The city had to be given lungs in the shape of open spaces squares parks and gardens.</i>
nasal	A nasal speech sound. <i>A whining nasal voice.</i>
nostril	Either of two external openings of the nasal cavity in vertebrates that admit air to the lungs and smells to the olfactory nerves.
oxygen	A colourless, odourless reactive gas, the chemical element of atomic number 8 and the life-supporting component of the air. <i>If breathing stops there is no oxygen getting to the brain and the cells begin to die.</i>
pant	Run or go in a specified direction while panting. <i>I felt the quick pant of my bosom.</i>

puff	A light inflated pastry or puff shell. <i>The fire breathed out a puff of blue smoke.</i>
release	The action or process of releasing or being released. <i>The movie will be on release from Christmas.</i>
respiration	A single breath. <i>Observation of the patient's respirations will gradually be decreased.</i>
respire	Undergo the biomedical and metabolic processes of respiration by taking up oxygen and producing carbon monoxide. <i>Lichens respire at lower levels of temperature and moisture.</i>
resuscitate	Cause to regain consciousness. <i>Measures to resuscitate the ailing economy.</i>
resuscitated	Restored to life or consciousness.
scuba	Scuba diving. <i>Scuba gear.</i>
smoke	Inhale and exhale the smoke produced by burning a narcotic drug. <i>He went outside for a smoke.</i>
sniff	An amount of air or other substance taken up by sniffing. <i>Sniff the perfume.</i>
stifler	A person who stifles or smothers or suppresses. <i>He is a real conversation stifler.</i>
whiff	A trace or hint of something bad, menacing, or exciting. <i>I found my inhaler and took a deep whiff.</i>
