## Exhale as a Verb

### Definitions of "Exhale" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “exhale” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Expel air.*
- *Give out (breath or an odor).*
- *Breathe out.*
- *Give off (vapour or fumes).*



## Synonyms of "Exhale" as a verb (10 Words)

**blow out** Show off.

**breathe out** Manifest or evince.

**discharge** Go off or discharge.  
*The overflow should **discharge** in an obvious place.*

**emanate** Originate from; be produced by.  
*Water **emanates** from this hole in the ground.*

**emit** Express audibly; utter sounds (not necessarily words).  
*Even the best cars **emit** carbon dioxide.*

**expire** (of a period of time) come to an end.  
*His driving licence **expired**.*

**give forth** Give (as medicine).

**give off** Leave with; give temporarily.

**puff out** Praise extravagantly.

**send forth** Broadcast over the airwaves, as in radio or television.



## Usage Examples of "Exhale" as a verb

- *The chimney exhales a thick smoke.*
- *The jungle exhaled mists of early morning.*
- *He exhaled the smoke towards the ceiling.*
- *She sat back and exhaled deeply.*



## Associations of "Exhale" (30 Words)

<b>airway</b>	A commercial enterprise that provides scheduled flights for passengers. <i>He kept the man's <b>airway</b> clear and blood circulating.</i>
<b>asthma</b>	Respiratory disorder characterized by wheezing; usually of allergic origin.
<b>breath</b>	The power of breathing life. <i>There wasn't a <b>breath</b> of air in the room.</i>

<b>breathe</b>	Reach full flavor by absorbing air and being let to stand after having been uncorked. <i>Adult amphibians also <b>breathe</b> through their skin.</i>
<b>cough</b>	Force something especially blood out of the lungs or throat by coughing. <i>She gave a discreet <b>cough</b>.</i>
<b>emit</b>	Expel (gases or odors). <i>She <b>emitted</b> a sound like laughter.</i>
<b>exhalation</b>	The process or action of exhaling. <i>The nocturnal <b>exhalation</b> of vapours from decaying vegetable matter.</i>
<b>expiration</b>	A coming to an end of a contract period. <i>The <b>expiration</b> of three years.</i>
<b>exude</b>	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. <i>Sir Thomas <b>exuded</b> goodwill.</i>
<b>fume</b>	Treat with fumes expose to fumes especially with the aim of disinfecting or eradicating pests. <i>He breathed <b>fumes</b> of wine into her face.</i>
<b>halitosis</b>	Offensive breath.
<b>inhale</b>	Draw in (air). <i>Later on I <b>inhale</b> a box of chocolate cookies while watching cable TV.</i>
<b>inhaler</b>	A dispenser that produces a chemical vapor to be inhaled in order to relieve nasal congestion.
<b>lung</b>	Each of the pair of organs situated within the ribcage, consisting of elastic sacs with branching passages into which air is drawn, so that oxygen can pass into the blood and carbon dioxide be removed. Lungs are characteristic of vertebrates other than fish, though similar structures are present in some other animal groups. <i>The city had to be given <b>lungs</b> in the shape of open spaces squares parks and gardens.</i>
<b>nasal</b>	A nasal speech sound. <i>A whining <b>nasal</b> voice.</i>
<b>nostril</b>	Either of two external openings of the nasal cavity in vertebrates that admit air to the lungs and smells to the olfactory nerves.
<b>oxygen</b>	A colourless, odourless reactive gas, the chemical element of atomic number 8 and the life-supporting component of the air. <i>If breathing stops there is no <b>oxygen</b> getting to the brain and the cells begin to die.</i>
<b>pant</b>	Run or go in a specified direction while panting. <i>I felt the quick <b>pant</b> of my bosom.</i>

<b>puff</b>	A light inflated pastry or puff shell. <i>The fire breathed out a <b>puff</b> of blue smoke.</i>
<b>release</b>	The action or process of releasing or being released. <i>The movie will be on <b>release</b> from Christmas.</i>
<b>respiration</b>	A single breath. <i>Observation of the patient's <b>respirations</b> will gradually be decreased.</i>
<b>respire</b>	Undergo the biomedical and metabolic processes of respiration by taking up oxygen and producing carbon monoxide. <i>Lichens <b>respire</b> at lower levels of temperature and moisture.</i>
<b>resuscitate</b>	Cause to regain consciousness. <i>Measures to <b>resuscitate</b> the ailing economy.</i>
<b>resuscitated</b>	Restored to life or consciousness.
<b>scuba</b>	Scuba diving. <i><b>Scuba</b> gear.</i>
<b>smoke</b>	Inhale and exhale the smoke produced by burning a narcotic drug. <i>He went outside for a <b>smoke</b>.</i>
<b>sniff</b>	An amount of air or other substance taken up by sniffing. <i><b>Sniff</b> the perfume.</i>
<b>stifler</b>	A person who stifles or smothers or suppresses. <i>He is a real conversation <b>stifler</b>.</i>
<b>whiff</b>	A trace or hint of something bad, menacing, or exciting. <i>I found my inhaler and took a deep <b>whiff</b>.</i>
