<u>expel</u>	Force out (something), especially from the body. <i>He was expelled from his native country.</i>
expend	Spend or use up (a resource such as money or energy). <i>The legislature expended its time on school questions.</i>
fatigue	Cause (someone) to feel exhausted. <i>They were fatigued by their journey.</i>
finish	Finish eating all the food on one's plate or on the table. <i>The carpenter finished the table beautifully.</i>
fritter away	Spend frivolously and unwisely.
go through	Go through in search of something search through someone's belongings in an unauthorized way.
leave nothing left to say about	Make a possibility or provide opportunity for; permit to be attainable or cause to remain.
overtax	Require to pay too much tax. <i>Do athletes overtax their hearts.</i>
overtire	Tire excessively. <i>Walk at a pace that does not overtire you.</i>
play out	Play a role or part.
prostrate	Get into a prostrate position as in submission. <i>She was so prostrated by migraine that she could scarcely totter up the stairs to bed.</i>
release	Release as from one's grip. <i>Release the holdings in the dictator's bank account.</i>
run down	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.

run someone into the ground	Pursue for food or sport (as of wild animals).
run someone ragged	Direct or control; projects, businesses, etc.
run through	Extend or continue for a certain period of time.
sap	Excavate the earth beneath. <i>Our energy is being sapped by bureaucrats and politicians.</i>
sapping	Excavate the earth beneath.
say all there is to say about	Express a supposition.
spend	Spend completely. Spend money.
squander	Allow (an opportunity) to pass or be lost. <i>You squandered the opportunity to get an advanced degree.</i>
tire	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress. <i>The training tired us out.</i>
tire out	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress.
tucker	Exhaust; wear out. <i>He is bewildered and tuckered out with the waiting.</i>
tucker out	To state openly and publicly one's homosexuality.
use up	Use up; consume fully.
wash up	Clean with some chemical process.
waste	Run off as waste. Waste heat.
wear out	Have in one's aspect; wear an expression of one's attitude or personality.
<u>weary</u>	Be distressed; fret. <i>Don't think I'm wearying about not being able to paint any more.</i>
wearying	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress.
wipe out	Rub with a circular motion.

canal	Provide a city with a canal. <i>The alimentary canal.</i>
chimney	A chimney stack. <i>He slid fifty feet down a chimney and became wedged there.</i>
cinder	A fragment of incombustible matter left after a wood or coal or charcoal fire. <i>A cold hearth full of cinders.</i>
conduit	A passage (a pipe or tunnel) through which water or electric wires can pass. <i>The gas pipe should not be close to any electrical conduit.</i>
consume	Serve oneself to or consume regularly. <i>Accounting provides measures of the economic goods and services consumed.</i>
deplete	Diminish in number or quantity. <i>Mansfield started the game with a depleted side.</i>
diesel	A heavy petroleum fraction used as fuel in diesel engines. <i>Eleven litres of diesel.</i>
emission	A substance that is emitted or released. <i>The effects of lead emission on health.</i>
<u>emit</u>	Give off, send forth, or discharge; as of light, heat, or radiation, vapor, etc. <i>Even the best cars emit carbon dioxide.</i>
flue	A channel for conveying heat. <i>No air rises up the chimney usually because the flue is blocked.</i>
<u>fog</u>	Make (a film, negative, or print) obscure or cloudy. <i>A whirling fog of dust.</i>
fume	Treat with fumes expose to fumes especially with the aim of disinfecting or eradicating pests. <i>Clouds of exhaust fumes spewed by cars.</i>
fumes	Gases ejected from an engine as waste products.
<u>gas</u>	A fossil fuel in the gaseous state used for cooking and heating homes. <i>He stepped on the gas.</i>
<u>haze</u>	Obscure with a haze. <i>The cold air has no pollution and very little haze.</i>
inhalation	The inhaling of medicines or anaesthetics in the form of a gas or vapour. <i>The inhalation of airborne particles.</i>
inhale	Breathe in (air, gas, smoke, etc). <i>She took the cigarette and inhaled deeply.</i>
intoxicant	Causing intoxication. <i>Intoxicants and drugs are used by some to escape physical or psychological pain.</i>

methane	A colorless odorless gas used as a fuel.
nicotine	A toxic colourless or yellowish oily liquid which is the chief active constituent of tobacco. It acts as a stimulant in small doses, but in larger amounts blocks the action of autonomic nerve and skeletal muscle cells.
oxygen	A colourless, odourless reactive gas, the chemical element of atomic number 8 and the life-supporting component of the air. <i>An oxygen supply.</i>
pipe	Play on a pipe. <i>A fresh pipe of port.</i>
pipeline	Convey a substance by a pipeline. <i>Chip designers pipeline the instructions given to the hardware.</i>
pollutant	A substance that pollutes something, especially water or the atmosphere. <i>Chemical pollutants.</i>
smog	Air pollution by a mixture of smoke and fog. <i>The fires caused widespread smogs.</i>
smoke	Emit smoke or visible vapour. <i>He went outside for a smoke.</i>
smolder	Burn slowly and without a flame. <i>A smoldering fire.</i>
tobacco	The plant of the nightshade family which yields tobacco native to tropical America It is widely cultivated in warm regions especially in the US and China.
<u>toxic</u>	Denoting securities that are based on toxic debt and for which there is not a healthy or functioning market. <i>The financial system has become clogged with toxic assets.</i>
