<b>full</b>	Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>A <b>full</b> report of the conference.</i>
<b>full-scale</b>	Using all available resources.
<u><b>intensive</b></u>	Denoting a property which is measured in terms of intensity (e.g. concentration) rather than of extent (e.g. volume), and so is not simply increased by addition of one thing to another. <i>The questioning was <b>intensive</b>.</i>
<b>profound</b>	Deep and complete. <i>A <b>profound</b> philosopher.</i>
<u><b>sweeping</b></u>	Wide in range or effect. <i><b>Sweeping</b> desolate moorlands.</i>
<u><b>thorough</b></u>	Painstakingly careful and accurate. <i>Officers have made a <b>thorough</b> examination of the wreckage.</i>
<b>thoroughgoing</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i><b>Thoroughgoing</b> research.</i>
<u><b>umbrella</b></u>	Covering or applying simultaneously to a number of similar items or elements or groups. <i>An <b>umbrella</b> organization.</i>

<b>accurate</b>	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>The accounting was <b>accurate</b>.</i>
<b>all</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>My ankle's gone <b>all</b> wobbly.</i>
<b>amply</b>	Enough or more than enough; plentifully. <i>These voices were <b>amply</b> represented.</i>

<b>analysis</b>	The identification and measurement of the chemical constituents of a substance or specimen. <i>Samples are sent to the laboratory for <b>analysis</b>.</i>
<b>arrant</b>	Complete, utter. <i>An <b>arrant</b> fool.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Complete or carry out. <i>A <b>complete</b> ban on smoking.</i>
<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. <i>An <b>entire</b> horse.</i>
<b>entirety</b>	The whole of something. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the <b>entirety</b> of the weekend.</i>
<b>exactness</b>	The quality of being exact. <i>It is impossible to calculate with mathematical <b>exactness</b>.</i>
<b><u>flawless</u></b>	Without any imperfections or defects; perfect. <i>A British accent that was almost <b>flawless</b>.</i>
<b>fully</b>	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>The evidence amply or <b>fully</b> confirms our suspicions.</i>
<b>holistic</b>	Emphasizing the organic or functional relation between parts and the whole.
<b>inerrancy</b>	Exemption from error. <i>Biblical <b>inerrancy</b>.</i>
<b><u>methodical</u></b>	(of a person) orderly or systematic in thought or behaviour. <i>A <b>methodical</b> scholar.</i>
<b><u>outright</u></b>	Wholly and completely. <i>The <b>outright</b> abolition of the death penalty.</i>
<b><u>overall</u></b>	A loose protective coverall or smock worn over ordinary clothing for dirty work. <i>The <b>overall</b> effect is impressive.</i>
<b>perfect</b>	A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed sometimes regarded as perfective aspect. <i>The <b>perfect</b> present for golfers everywhere.</i>
<b>perfectible</b>	Capable of becoming or being made perfect.
<b><u>precise</u></b>	Used to emphasize that one is referring to an exact and particular thing. <i>A <b>precise</b> image.</i>
<b><u>precision</u></b>	The quality of being reproducible in amount or performance. <i>A <b>precision</b> of six decimal figures.</i>

<b>scrupulous</b>	Very concerned to avoid doing wrong. <i>Less <b>scrupulous</b> producers sent bundles that were deceptive in appearance.</i>
<b>successfully</b>	With success; in a successful manner. <i>She has <b>successfully</b> completed her mission.</i>
<u><b>systematic</b></u>	Characterized by order and planning. <i>A <b>systematic</b> search of the whole city.</i>
<u><b>thorough</b></u>	Absolute (used to emphasize the degree of something, typically something unwelcome or unpleasant). <i>The child is being a <b>thorough</b> nuisance.</i>
<b>thoroughgoing</b>	Performed comprehensively and completely; not superficial or partial. <i>A <b>thoroughgoing</b> reform of the whole economy.</i>
<u><b>total</b></u>	Complete in extent or degree and in every particular. <i>A <b>total</b> disaster.</i>
<u><b>verity</b></u>	Conformity to reality or actuality. <i>Irrefutable objective <b>verity</b>.</i>
<u><b>whole</b></u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>Gave his <b>whole</b> attention.</i>
