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| extensive | (of agriculture) obtaining a relatively small crop from a large area with a minimum of capital and labour. <i>An extensive Roman settlement in northwest England.</i> |
| full | Constituting the full quantity or extent complete. <i>A full report of the conference.</i> |
| full-scale | Using all available resources. |
| <u>intensive</u> | Denoting a property which is measured in terms of intensity (e.g. concentration) rather than of extent (e.g. volume), and so is not simply increased by addition of one thing to another. <i>The questioning was intensive.</i> |
| profound | Deep and complete. <i>A profound philosopher.</i> |
| <u>sweeping</u> | Wide in range or effect. <i>Sweeping desolate moorlands.</i> |
| <u>thorough</u> | Painstakingly careful and accurate. <i>Officers have made a thorough examination of the wreckage.</i> |
| thoroughgoing | Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Thoroughgoing research.</i> |
| <u>umbrella</u> | Covering or applying simultaneously to a number of similar items or elements or groups. <i>An umbrella organization.</i> |

| accurate | Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>The accounting was accurate.</i> |
| all | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>My ankle's gone all wobbly.</i> |

| exactness | The quality of being exact. <i>It is impossible to calculate with mathematical exactness.</i> |
| <u>flawless</u> | Without any imperfections or defects; perfect. <i>A British accent that was almost flawless.</i> |
| fully | Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>The evidence amply or fully confirms our suspicions.</i> |
| holistic | Emphasizing the organic or functional relation between parts and the whole. |
| inerrancy | Exemption from error. <i>Biblical inerrancy.</i> |
| <u>methodical</u> | (of a person) orderly or systematic in thought or behaviour. <i>A methodical scholar.</i> |
| <u>outright</u> | Wholly and completely. <i>The outright abolition of the death penalty.</i> |
| <u>overall</u> | A loose protective coverall or smock worn over ordinary clothing for dirty work. <i>The overall effect is impressive.</i> |
| perfect | A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed sometimes regarded as perfective aspect. <i>The perfect present for golfers everywhere.</i> |
| perfectible | Capable of becoming or being made perfect. |
| <u>precise</u> | Used to emphasize that one is referring to an exact and particular thing. <i>A precise image.</i> |
| <u>precision</u> | The quality of being reproducible in amount or performance. <i>A precision of six decimal figures.</i> |

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| scrupulous | Very concerned to avoid doing wrong. <i>Less scrupulous producers sent bundles that were deceptive in appearance.</i> |
| successfully | With success; in a successful manner. <i>She has successfully completed her mission.</i> |
| <u>systematic</u> | Characterized by order and planning. <i>A systematic search of the whole city.</i> |
| <u>thorough</u> | Absolute (used to emphasize the degree of something, typically something unwelcome or unpleasant). <i>The child is being a thorough nuisance.</i> |
| thoroughgoing | Performed comprehensively and completely; not superficial or partial. <i>A thoroughgoing reform of the whole economy.</i> |
| <u>total</u> | Complete in extent or degree and in every particular. <i>A total disaster.</i> |
| <u>verity</u> | Conformity to reality or actuality. <i>Irrefutable objective verity.</i> |
| <u>whole</u> | Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>Gave his whole attention.</i> |
