### Definitions of "Exhibition" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “exhibition” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A public display of works of art or items of interest, held in an art gallery or museum or at a trade fair.*
- *A display or demonstration of a skill.*
- *A scholarship awarded to a student at a school or university, usually after a competitive examination.*
- *A collection of things (goods or works of art etc.) for public display.*
- *(in sport) a game whose outcome does not affect a team's standing, typically one played before the start of a regular season.*
- *The act of exhibiting.*
- *A display of a quality or emotion.*

### award

A prize or other mark of recognition given in honour of an achievement.  
*The **award** of an honorary doctorate.*

### **demonstration**

A practical exhibition and explanation of how something works or is performed.

*His **demonstration** of the need for computer corpora in language study is convincing.*

### **display**

Something shown to the public.

*A **display** of courage.*

### **endowment**

An income or form of property given or bequeathed to someone.

*His natural **endowments** were his height and intelligence.*

### **expo**

A large international exhibition.

### exposition

An account that sets forth the meaning or intent of a writing or discourse.

*We would have understood the play better if there had been some initial **exposition** of the background.*

<b>expression</b>	Expression without words. <i>She accepted his <b>expressions</b> of sympathy.</i>
<b>grant</b>	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. <i>A <b>grant</b> of probate.</i>
<b>indication</b>	A reading given by a gauge or meter. <i>The barometer gave clear <b>indications</b> of an approaching storm.</i>
<b><u>manifestation</u></b>	A clear appearance. <i>A <b>manifestation</b> of disease.</i>
<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its <b>mounting</b>.</i>
<b>payment</b>	The act of paying money. <i>A compensation <b>payment</b> of 2500.</i>
<b>presentation</b>	A visual representation of something. <i>He prepared his <b>presentation</b> carefully in advance.</i>
<b>public display</b>	A body of people sharing some common interest.
<b>show</b>	An event or competition involving the public display of animals, plants, or products. <i>Spectacular <b>shows</b> of bluebells.</i>
<b>showcase</b>	A setting in which something can be displayed to best effect. <i>The gallery will provide a <b>showcase</b> for Scotland's young photographers.</i>
<b>showing</b>	The action of showing something or the fact of being shown. <i>Alsation dog championship quality excellent results in <b>showing</b>.</i>
<b>spectacle</b>	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The tragic <b>spectacle</b> of cripples trying to escape.</i>

- arcade** A series of arches supporting a wall, or set along it.  
*A shopping **arcade**.*
- archives** Collection of records especially about an institution.
- array** Especially fine or decorative clothing.  
*There is a vast **array** of literature on the topic.*
- curator** A person who selects acts to perform at a music festival.  
*The **curator** of drawings at the National Gallery.*
- decal** A design prepared on special paper for durable transfer on to another surface such as glass or porcelain.
- demonstrate** Clearly show the existence or truth of (something) by giving proof or evidence.  
*Thousands **demonstrated** in favour of the government.*

<b>display</b>	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Pressing the F1 key will <b>display</b> a help screen.</i>
<b>easel</b>	A wooden frame for holding an artist's work while it is being painted or drawn.
<b>exhibit</b>	Give an exhibition of to an interested audience. <i>People flocked to the <b>exhibit</b> in record breaking numbers.</i>
<b>exhibitor</b>	A person who displays works of art or other items of interest at an exhibition. <i>The trade fair attracted 89 <b>exhibitors</b> and 37 000 visitors.</i>
<b>expatiate</b>	Speak or write in detail about. <i>She <b>expatiated</b> on working class novelists.</i>
<b>expo</b>	A large international exhibition.
<u><b>expose</b></u>	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>Students were <b>exposed</b> to statistics in high school.</i>
<u><b>exposition</b></u>	The part of a movement, especially in sonata form, in which the principal themes are first presented. <i>The <b>exposition</b> will feature exhibits by 165 companies.</i>
<b>expound</b>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>He declined to <b>expound</b> on his decision.</i>
<u><b>flaunt</b></u>	The act of displaying something ostentatiously. <i>His behavior was an outrageous <b>flaunt</b>.</i>
<u><b>gallery</b></u>	A long usually narrow room used for some specific purpose. <i>In the minstrels <b>gallery</b> a string orchestra plays themes from film soundtracks.</i>
<b>homily</b>	A tedious moralizing lecture. <i>She delivered her <b>homily</b> about the need for patience.</i>
<u><b>layout</b></u>	A thing arranged or set out in a particular way. <i>A model railway <b>layout</b>.</i>
<b>mannequin</b>	A life-size dummy used to display clothes. <i>She was too fat to be a <b>mannequin</b>.</i>
<u><b>museum</b></u>	A building in which objects of historical, scientific, artistic, or cultural interest are stored and exhibited. <i>The <b>museum</b> is noted for its fine fossil collection.</i>
<u><b>preach</b></u>	Deliver a sermon or religious address to an assembled group of people, typically in church. <i>He <b>preached</b> the word of God.</i>

- proudly** With a feeling of deep pleasure or satisfaction in one's own achievements, qualities, or possessions or those of someone with whom one is closely associated.  
*She **proudly** displayed her newest creations.*
- pterodactyl** Extinct flying reptile.
- publicly** So as to be seen by other people; in public.  
*She admitted **publicly** to being a communist.*
- screening** A showing of a film, video, or television programme.  
*Prenatal **screening** for Down s syndrome.*
- sermon** A moralistic rebuke.  
*He understood that if he said any more he would have to listen to another lengthy **sermon**.*
- showcase** Exhibit; display.  
*The albums **showcase** his production skills.*
- showing** The action of showing something or the fact of being shown.  
*Alsatian dog championship quality excellent results in **showing**.*
- tripod** A three-legged stand for supporting a camera or other apparatus.
