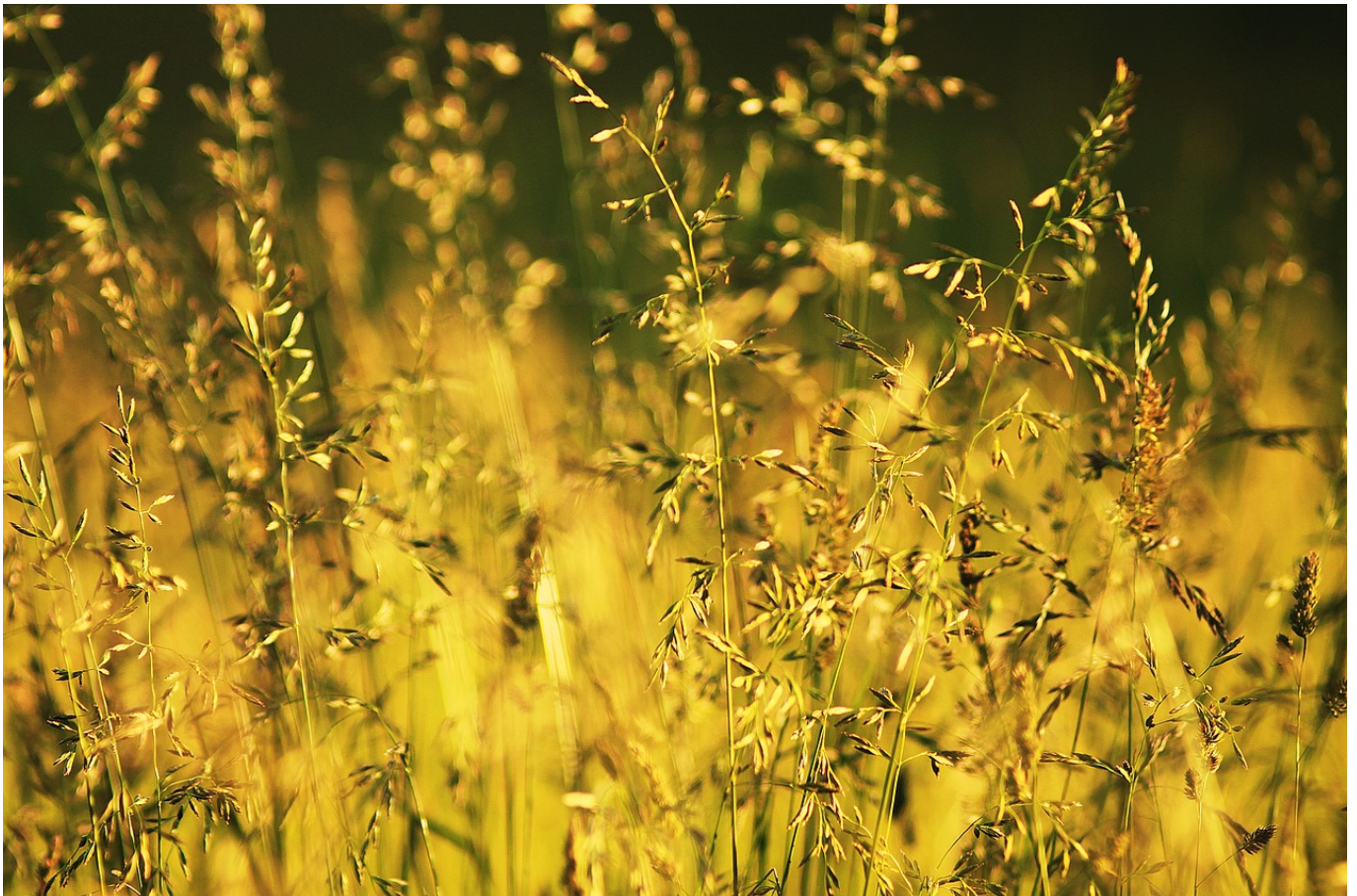
- *A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation.*

- bliss** A state of extreme happiness.  
*The **bliss** of heaven.*
- delight** Something or someone that provides a source of happiness.  
*She took great **delight** in telling your story.*
- ecstasy** A state of being carried away by overwhelming emotion.  
*There was a look of **ecstasy** on his face.*
- elation** Great happiness and exhilaration.  
*Richard s **elation** at regaining his health was short lived.*
- euphoria** A feeling or state of intense excitement and happiness.  
*In his **euphoria** he had become convinced he could defeat them.*
- exaltation** The action of elevating someone in rank or power.  
*What a sound an **exaltation** of larks must make.*
- excitement** Something that arouses a feeling of excitement.  
*His face was flushed with **excitement** and his hands trembled.*

- exultation** The utterance of sounds expressing great joy.  
*She laughs in **exultation**.*
- happiness** Emotions experienced when in a state of well-being.  
*She struggled to find **happiness** in her life.*
- joy** A thing that causes joy.  
*A **joy** to behold.*
- joyousness** The emotion of great happiness.
- jubilation** A feeling of great happiness and triumph.  
*Unbelievable scenes of **jubilation**.*
- rapture** Expressions of intense pleasure or enthusiasm about something.  
*Leonora listened with **rapture**.*
- rhapsody** An effusively enthusiastic or ecstatic expression of feeling.  
*Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsodies.*

## Associations of "Exhilaration" (30 Words)

- amusement** A roundabout, game machine, etc. for providing entertainment at a fairground or resort.  
*We looked with **amusement** at our horoscopes.*
- badinage** Humorous or witty conversation.  
*He developed a nice line in **badinage** with the Labour leader.*
- banter** The playful and friendly exchange of teasing remarks.  
*The men **bantered** with the waitresses.*
- buffoonery** Behaviour that is ridiculous but amusing.  
*The film is full of wordplay and **buffoonery**.*

<b>comedy</b>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. <i>Advertising people see the <b>comedy</b> in their work.</i>
<b>derisive</b>	Expressing contempt or ridicule. <i><b>Derisive</b> laughter.</i>
<b>entertaining</b>	Agreeably diverting. <i>Films should be <b>entertaining</b>.</i>
<b>fun</b>	A source of fun. <i>He became a figure of <b>fun</b>.</i>
<b>funny</b>	Used to emphasize that something is serious or should be taken seriously. <i>Are you okay You look a bit <b>funny</b>.</i>
<b>glad</b>	Grateful. <i>A <b>glad</b> smile.</i>
<b>hilarious</b>	Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>The meal was noisy and <b>hilarious</b>.</i>
<b>hilarity</b>	Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>By midnight the <b>hilarity</b> had increased.</i>
<b>humor</b>	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>The <b>humors</b> are blood and phlegm and yellow and black bile.</i>
<b>humorous</b>	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. <i><b>Humorous</b> cartoons.</i>
<b>humour</b>	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>She was always <b>humouring</b> him to prevent trouble.</i>
<b>jest</b>	Speak in a joking way. <i>He laughed unpleasantly at his own <b>jest</b>.</i>
<b>jesting</b>	The action of saying or doing something for amusement. <i>A <b>jesting</b> commentary on world affairs.</i>
<b>jocose</b>	Characterized by jokes and good humor. <i>A <b>jocose</b> allusion.</i>
<b>jocular</b>	Fond of or characterized by joking; humorous or playful. <i>They tried to deal with this painful subject <b>jocularly</b>.</i>
<b>joke</b>	Tell a joke speak humorously. <i>He was pretending to <b>joke</b> his daughter.</i>
<b>jollity</b>	The quality of being cheerful. <i>A night of riotous <b>jollity</b>.</i>
<b>jolly</b>	Happy and cheerful. <i>They were trying to <b>jolly</b> her out of her torpor.</i>

<b><u>jovial</u></b>	Full of or showing high-spirited merriment- Wordsworth. <i>She was in a <b>jovial</b> mood.</i>
<b>laugh</b>	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. <i>He <b>laughed</b> unpleasantly at his own jest.</i>
<b>laughing</b>	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i><b>Laughing</b> children.</i>
<b><u>merry</u></b>	(of an occasion or season) characterized by festivity and enjoyment. <i>A <b>merry</b> chase.</i>
<b>repartee</b>	Conversation or speech characterized by quick, witty comments or replies. <i>Quick fire <b>repartee</b>.</i>
<b>slapstick</b>	Comedy based on deliberately clumsy actions and humorously embarrassing events. <i><b>Slapstick</b> style of humor.</i>
<b>witticism</b>	A witty remark. <i>Maurice roared with laughter at his own <b>witticisms</b>.</i>
<b><u>witty</u></b>	Combining clever conception and facetious expression. <i>Marlowe was charming and <b>witty</b>.</i>
