

exultation The utterance of sounds expressing great joy.

She laughs in **exultation**.

happiness Emotions experienced when in a state of well-being.

She struggled to find **happiness** in her life.

joy A thing that causes joy.

A **joy** to behold.

joyousness The emotion of great happiness.

jubilation A feeling of great happiness and triumph.

Unbelievable scenes of **jubilation**.

rapture Expressions of intense pleasure or enthusiasm about something.

Leonora listened with **rapture**.

rhapsody An effusively enthusiastic or ecstatic expression of feeling.

Liszt's Hungarian Rhapsodies.

humour The ability to express humour or amuse other people.

jocular Fond of or characterized by joking; humorous or playful.

Tell a joke speak humorously.

He was pretending to **joke** his daughter.

jollity The quality of being cheerful.

A night of riotous **jollity**.

They were trying to **jolly** her out of her torpor.

laugh A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing.
