- *Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts.*
- *Strongly encourage or urge (someone) to do something.*



## Synonyms of "Exhort" as a verb (19 Words)

<b>adjure</b>	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>I <b>adjure</b> you to tell me the truth.</i>
<b>barrack</b>	Lodge in barracks. <i>The granary in which the platoons were <b>barracked</b>.</i>
<b>call on</b>	Assign a specified (usually proper) proper name to.
<b><u>charge</u></b>	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>Wedding planners may <b>charge</b> an hourly fee of up to 150.</i>
<b><u>cheer</u></b>	Become cheerful. <i>MPs rose to <b>cheer</b> the Chancellor.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>His financial success <b>encouraged</b> him to look for a wife.</i>
<b><u>enjoin</u></b>	Instruct or urge (someone) to do something. <i>The charitable deeds <b>enjoined</b> on him by religion.</i>

<b>inspire</b>	Animate someone with (a feeling). <i>The film was successful enough to <b>inspire</b> a sequel.</i>
<b>lean on</b>	Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something; be inclined.
<b>press</b>	Exert pressure or force to or upon. <i>The record was <b>pressed</b> in two runs of 500 copies.</i>
<b>pressure</b>	To cause to do through pressure or necessity by physical moral or intellectual means. <i>She <b>pressured</b> her son to accept a job offer from the bank.</i>
<b>pressurize</b>	Increase the pressure on a gas or liquid. <i>The airplane cabin is <b>pressurized</b>.</i>
<b>push</b>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>Lydia <b>pushed</b> the door shut.</i>
<b>put pressure on</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>root on</b>	Become settled or established and stable in one's residence or life style.
<b>try to persuade</b>	Put on a garment in order to see whether it fits and looks nice.
<b>urge</b>	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>Drawing up outside the house he <b>urged</b> her inside.</i>
<b>urge on</b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts.
<b>use pressure on</b>	Use up, consume fully.

### **advice**

A proposal for an appropriate course of action.  
*The want of fresh **advices** from Europe.*

<b>advise</b>	Inform (someone) about a fact or situation in a formal or official way. <i>He <b>advised</b> caution.</i>
<b><u>animate</u></b>	Endowed with feeling and unstructured consciousness- T.E.Lawrence. <i>The word dog is <b>animate</b>.</i>
<b>catalyst</b>	Something that causes an important event to happen. <i>Chlorine acts as a <b>catalyst</b> promoting the breakdown of ozone.</i>
<b><u>catalyze</u></b>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<b><u>cheer</u></b>	Cause somebody to feel happier or more cheerful. <i>They <b>cheered</b> his emotional speech.</i>
<b>elate</b>	In high spirits; exultant or proud. <i>Their <b>elate</b> and animated faces.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Give support, confidence, or hope to (someone). <i>The intention is to <b>encourage</b> new writing talent.</i>
<b><u>enliven</u></b>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. <i>The visit had clearly <b>enlivened</b> my mother.</i>
<b>hearten</b>	Give encouragement to. <i>She was <b>heartened</b> to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
<b>impel</b>	Drive forward; propel. <i>A lack of equality <b>impelled</b> the oppressed to fight.</i>
<b>incitement</b>	Needed encouragement. <i>The <b>incitement</b> of mutiny.</i>
<b><u>induce</u></b>	Produce (an electric charge or current or a magnetic state) by induction. <i>The ads <b>induced</b> me to buy a VCR.</i>
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were <b>inflamed</b> with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>
<b>infuse</b>	Fill, as with a certain quality. <i>Some physiologists <b>infuse</b> sugar solutions into the veins of animals.</i>
<b><u>input</u></b>	A statement that expresses a personal opinion or belief or adds information. <i>Test results can be <b>inputted</b> by the technician in the laboratory.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Create (a feeling, especially a positive one) in a person. <i>They can expand their lungs and <b>inspire</b> enough gas to satisfy oxygen requirements.</i>
<b><u>inspiring</u></b>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>The scenery is not very <b>inspiring</b>.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Incite someone to do something, especially something bad. <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>

<b><u>instill</u></b>	Fill, as with a certain quality. <i>Her presence <b>instilled</b> faith into the children.</i>
<b><u>invigorate</u></b>	Impart vigor, strength, or vitality to. <i>The cold water <b>invigorated</b> him.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Cause (a procedure) to be carried out. <i>She <b>invoked</b> an ancient law.</i>
<b>monition</b>	A summons issued after the filing of a libel or claim directing all parties concerned to show cause why the judgment asked for should not be granted. <i>A letter of <b>admonition</b> about the dangers of immorality.</i>
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Give an incentive for action. <i>He said he would <b>motivate</b> funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
<b>motivation</b>	A reason or reasons for acting or behaving in a particular way. <i>The following proposal and <b>motivation</b> is submitted for consideration.</i>
<b>spur</b>	Urge a horse forward by digging one's spurs into its sides. <i>The rider <b>spurred</b> his horse.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Encourage or arouse interest or enthusiasm in. <i>The courses <b>stimulate</b> a passion for learning.</i>
<b>stimulation</b>	The raising of levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body or any biological system. <i><b>Stimulation</b> of the vagus nerve slows heart rate.</i>
<b>urge</b>	Encourage (a person or animal) to move more quickly or in a particular direction. <i>Sexual <b>urges</b>.</i>
<b>warning</b>	Cautionary advice about something imminent (especially imminent danger or other unpleasantness). <i>She had only had four days <b>warning</b> before leaving Berlin.</i>
