Definitions of "Exhort" as a verb

- *Force or impel in an indicated direction.*
- *Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts.*
- *Strongly encourage or urge (someone) to do something.*



Synonyms of "Exhort" as a verb (19 Words)

adjure	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>I adjure you to tell me the truth.</i>
barrack	Lodge in barracks. <i>The granary in which the platoons were barracked.</i>
call on	Assign a specified (usually proper) proper name to.
<u>charge</u>	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>Wedding planners may charge an hourly fee of up to 150.</i>
<u>cheer</u>	Become cheerful. <i>MPs rose to cheer the Chancellor.</i>
encourage	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>His financial success encouraged him to look for a wife.</i>
<u>enjoin</u>	Instruct or urge (someone) to do something. <i>The charitable deeds enjoined on him by religion.</i>

inspire	Animate someone with (a feeling). <i>The film was successful enough to inspire a sequel.</i>
lean on	Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something; be inclined.
press	Exert pressure or force to or upon. <i>The record was pressed in two runs of 500 copies.</i>
pressure	To cause to do through pressure or necessity by physical moral or intellectual means. <i>She pressured her son to accept a job offer from the bank.</i>
pressurize	Increase the pressure on a gas or liquid. <i>The airplane cabin is pressurized.</i>
<u>push</u>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>Lydia pushed the door shut.</i>
put pressure on	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
root on	Become settled or established and stable in one's residence or life style.
try to persuade	Put on a garment in order to see whether it fits and looks nice.
urge	Recommend (something) strongly. <i>Drawing up outside the house he urged her inside.</i>
urge on	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts.
use pressure on	Use up, consume fully.



Usage Examples of "Exhort" as a verb

- *'Come on, you guys,' exhorted Linda.*
- *I exhorted her to be a good child.*

advice

A proposal for an appropriate course of action.
*The want of fresh **advices** from Europe.*

advise	Inform (someone) about a fact or situation in a formal or official way. <i>He advised caution.</i>
<u>animate</u>	Endowed with feeling and unstructured consciousness- T.E.Lawrence. <i>The word dog is animate.</i>
catalyst	Something that causes an important event to happen. <i>Chlorine acts as a catalyst promoting the breakdown of ozone.</i>
<u>catalyze</u>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<u>cheer</u>	Cause somebody to feel happier or more cheerful. <i>They cheered his emotional speech.</i>
elate	In high spirits; exultant or proud. <i>Their elate and animated faces.</i>
encourage	Give support, confidence, or hope to (someone). <i>The intention is to encourage new writing talent.</i>
<u>enliven</u>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. <i>The visit had clearly enlivened my mother.</i>
hearten	Give encouragement to. <i>She was heartened to observe that the effect was faintly comic.</i>
impel	Drive forward; propel. <i>A lack of equality impelled the oppressed to fight.</i>
incitement	Needed encouragement. <i>The incitement of mutiny.</i>
<u>induce</u>	Produce (an electric charge or current or a magnetic state) by induction. <i>The ads induced me to buy a VCR.</i>
inflamm	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were inflamed with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>
infuse	Fill, as with a certain quality. <i>Some physiologists infuses sugar solutions into the veins of animals.</i>
<u>input</u>	A statement that expresses a personal opinion or belief or adds information. <i>Test results can be inputted by the technician in the laboratory.</i>
inspire	Create (a feeling, especially a positive one) in a person. <i>They can expand their lungs and inspire enough gas to satisfy oxygen requirements.</i>
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>The scenery is not very inspiring.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Incite someone to do something, especially something bad. <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>

<u>instill</u>	Fill, as with a certain quality. <i>Her presence instilled faith into the children.</i>
<u>invigorate</u>	Impart vigor, strength, or vitality to. <i>The cold water invigorated him.</i>
<u>invoke</u>	Cause (a procedure) to be carried out. <i>She invoked an ancient law.</i>
monition	A summons issued after the filing of a libel or claim directing all parties concerned to show cause why the judgment asked for should not be granted. <i>A letter of admonition about the dangers of immorality.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Give an incentive for action. <i>He said he would motivate funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>
motivation	A reason or reasons for acting or behaving in a particular way. <i>The following proposal and motivation is submitted for consideration.</i>
spur	Urge a horse forward by digging one's spurs into its sides. <i>The rider spurred his horse.</i>
stimulate	Encourage or arouse interest or enthusiasm in. <i>The courses stimulate a passion for learning.</i>
stimulation	The raising of levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body or any biological system. <i>Stimulation of the vagus nerve slows heart rate.</i>
urge	Encourage (a person or animal) to move more quickly or in a particular direction. <i>Sexual urges.</i>
warning	Cautionary advice about something imminent (especially imminent danger or other unpleasantness). <i>She had only had four days warning before leaving Berlin.</i>
