<b>clamant</b>	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>The proper use of biotechnology has become a <b>clamant</b> question.</i>
<b>crying</b>	Shedding tears. <i>A <b>crying</b> shame.</i>
<b>exacting</b>	Making great demands on one's skill, attention, or other resources. <i>Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely <b>exacting</b> in their requirements.</i>
<b>important</b>	Important in effect or meaning. <i>Recited the decree with an <b>important</b> air.</i>
<b><u>insistent</u></b>	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>A telephone started ringing loud and <b>insistent</b>.</i>
<b><u>instant</u></b>	Prepared quickly and with little effort. <i>We can t promise <b>instant</b> solutions.</i>

<b>momentous</b>	Of great importance or significance, especially in having a bearing on future events. <i>A <b>momentous</b> decision.</i>
<b>of great consequence</b>	Of major significance or importance.
<b>profound</b>	(of a state, quality, or emotion) very great or intense. <i><b>Profound</b> social changes.</i>
<b>serious</b>	Acting or speaking sincerely and in earnest, rather than in a joking or half-hearted manner. <i>Actors who are <b>serious</b> about their work.</i>
<b>significant</b>	Suggesting a meaning or message that is not explicitly stated. <i>A <b>significant</b> change in tax laws.</i>
<b>weighty</b>	Of great gravity or crucial import; requiring serious thought. <i><b>Weighty</b> problems.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Exigent" as an adjective

- *Became more exigent over his pronunciation.*
- *Regarded literary questions as exigent and momentous.*
- *The exigent demands of her contemporaries' music took a toll on her voice.*

<b><u>ambulance</u></b>	Convey in an ambulance. <i>We called an <b>ambulance</b>.</i>
<b><u>emergency</u></b>	Arising from or used in an emergency. <i>Survival packs were carried in case of <b>emergency</b>.</i>
<b>entreaty</b>	Earnest or urgent request. <i>An <b>entreaty</b> to stop the fighting.</i>
<b>exigency</b>	A pressing or urgent situation. <i>The health care <b>exigency</b>.</i>
<b>extemporaneous</b>	Spoken or done without preparation. <i>An <b>extemporaneous</b> speech.</i>
<b>extempore</b>	Without prior preparation. <i>An <b>extempore</b> speech.</i>
<b>extemporize</b>	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>He <b>extemporized</b> at the piano.</i>

<b>immediate</b>	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>Coronary thrombosis was the <b>immediate</b> cause of death.</i>
<b>immediately</b>	In direct or very close relation. <i>They would be the states most <b>immediately</b> affected by any such action.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	Overhanging. <i>In <b>imminent</b> danger.</i>
<b><u>impending</u></b>	(of an event regarded as threatening or significant) about to happen; forthcoming. <i>A fortune teller with dire warnings about <b>impending</b> doom.</i>
<b><u>imperative</u></b>	A verb or phrase in the imperative mood. <i>Immediate action was <b>imperative</b>.</i>
<b><u>impromptu</u></b>	Done without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. <i>An <b>impromptu</b> press conference.</i>
<b><u>improvise</u></b>	Perform without preparation. <i>I <b>improvised</b> a costume for myself out of an old blue dress.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>We slept on <b>improvised</b> beds.</i>
<b>impulsion</b>	The act of applying force suddenly. <i>Attitudes changed under the <b>impulsion</b> of humanitarian considerations.</i>
<b>impulsively</b>	In an impulsive or impetuous way; without taking cautions. <i>I <b>impulsively</b> grabbed her wrist.</i>
<b><u>instant</u></b>	Instant coffee. <i>Your letter of the 6th <b>instant</b>.</i>
<b>instantaneous</b>	Existing or measured at a particular instant. <i>Modern methods of <b>instantaneous</b> communication.</i>
<b><u>instantly</u></b>	Without any delay. <i>She fell asleep almost <b>instantly</b>.</i>
<b>now</b>	In these times. <i>We can hardly send her back <b>now</b> can we.</i>
<b>offhand</b>	With little or no preparation or forethought. <i>I can't think of a better answer <b>offhand</b>.</i>
<b>pressing</b>	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>A <b>pressing</b> invitation.</i>
<b><u>prioritize</u></b>	Designate or treat (something) as being very or most important. <i>The department has failed to <b>prioritize</b> safety within the oil industry.</i>

<b>prompt</b>	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>I set off at three thirty <b>prompt</b>.</i>
<b><u>promptly</u></b>	At once (usually modifies an undesirable occurrence). <i>The rescue squad arrived <b>promptly</b>.</i>
<b>quick</b>	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>Children like to see <b>quick</b> results from their efforts.</i>
<b><u>swift</u></b>	Swiftly. <i>A remarkably <b>swift</b> recovery.</i>
<b>urgency</b>	An earnest and persistent quality; insistence. <i>The discovery of the ozone hole gave <b>urgency</b> to the issue of CFCs.</i>
<b>urgent</b>	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>An <b>urgent</b> demand for more state funding.</i>
