serious	Acting or speaking sincerely and in earnest, rather than in a joking or half-hearted manner. Actors who are <b>serious</b> about their work.	
significant	Suggesting a meaning or message that is not explicitly stated. A <b>significant</b> change in tax laws.	
weighty	Of great gravity or crucial import; requiring serious thought. <i>Weighty</i> problems.

imminent	Overhanging. In <b>imminent</b> danger.
<u>impending</u>	(of an event regarded as threatening or significant) about to happen; forthcoming. A fortune teller with dire warnings about <b>impending</b> doom.
<u>imperative</u>	A verb or phrase in the imperative mood. Immediate action was <b>imperative</b> .
<u>impromptu</u>	Done without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. An <b>impromptu</b> press conference.
<u>improvise</u>	Perform without preparation. I <b>improvise</b> d a costume for myself out of an old blue dress.
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>We slept on <b>improvised</b> beds.</i>
impulsion	The act of applying force suddenly. <i>Attitudes changed under the <b>impulsion</b> of humanitarian considerations.</i>
impulsively	In an impulsive or impetuous way; without taking cautions. I <b>impulsively</b> grabbed her wrist.
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. Your letter of the 6th <b>instant</b> .
instantaneous	Existing or measured at a particular instant. Modern methods of <b>instantaneous</b> communication.
<u>instantly</u>	Without any delay. She fell asleep almost <b>instantly</b> .
now	In these times. We can hardly send her back <b>now</b> can we.
offhand	With little or no preparation or forethought. I can t think of a better answer <b>offhand</b> .
pressing	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. A <b>pressing</b> invitation.
<u>prioritize</u>	Designate or treat (something) as being very or most important. The department has failed to <b>prioritize</b> safety within the oil industry.



prompt	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>I set off at three thirty</i> <b>prompt</b> .
<u>promptly</u>	At once (usually modifies an undesirable occurrence. <i>The rescue squad arrived <b>promptly</b>.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. Children like to see <b>quick</b> results from their efforts.
<u>swift</u>	Swiftly. A remarkably <b>swift</b> recovery.
urgency	An earnest and persistent quality; insistence. The discovery of the ozone hole gave <b>urgency</b> to the issue of CFCs.
urgent	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. An <b>urgent</b> demand for more state funding.
