all-important	Of the greatest importance.
clamant	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>The proper use of biotechnology has become a clamant question.</i>
crying	Shedding tears. <i>A crying shame.</i>
exacting	Making great demands on one's skill, attention, or other resources. <i>Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely exacting in their requirements.</i>
important	Important in effect or meaning. <i>Recited the decree with an important air.</i>
<u>insistent</u>	Demanding attention- H.L.Mencken. <i>A telephone started ringing loud and insistent.</i>
<u>instant</u>	Prepared quickly and with little effort. <i>We can t promise instant solutions.</i>

momentous	Of great importance or significance, especially in having a bearing on future events. <i>A momentous decision.</i>
of great consequence	Of major significance or importance.
profound	(of a state, quality, or emotion) very great or intense. <i>Profound social changes.</i>
serious	Acting or speaking sincerely and in earnest, rather than in a joking or half-hearted manner. <i>Actors who are serious about their work.</i>
significant	Suggesting a meaning or message that is not explicitly stated. <i>A significant change in tax laws.</i>
weighty	Of great gravity or crucial import; requiring serious thought. <i>Weighty problems.</i>

Usage Examples of "Exigent" as an adjective

- *Became more exigent over his pronunciation.*
- *Regarded literary questions as exigent and momentous.*
- *The exigent demands of her contemporaries' music took a toll on her voice.*

<u>ambulance</u>	Convey in an ambulance. <i>We called an ambulance.</i>
<u>emergency</u>	Arising from or used in an emergency. <i>Survival packs were carried in case of emergency.</i>
entreaty	Earnest or urgent request. <i>An entreaty to stop the fighting.</i>
exigency	A pressing or urgent situation. <i>The health care exigency.</i>
extemporaneous	Spoken or done without preparation. <i>An extemporaneous speech.</i>
extempore	Without prior preparation. <i>An extempore speech.</i>
extemporize	Manage in a makeshift way; do with whatever is at hand. <i>He extemporized at the piano.</i>

immediate	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>Coronary thrombosis was the immediate cause of death.</i>
immediately	In direct or very close relation. <i>They would be the states most immediately affected by any such action.</i>
imminent	Overhanging. <i>In imminent danger.</i>
<u>impending</u>	(of an event regarded as threatening or significant) about to happen; forthcoming. <i>A fortune teller with dire warnings about impending doom.</i>
<u>imperative</u>	A verb or phrase in the imperative mood. <i>Immediate action was imperative.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	Done without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. <i>An impromptu press conference.</i>
<u>improvise</u>	Perform without preparation. <i>I improvised a costume for myself out of an old blue dress.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available. <i>We slept on improvised beds.</i>
impulsion	The act of applying force suddenly. <i>Attitudes changed under the impulsion of humanitarian considerations.</i>
impulsively	In an impulsive or impetuous way; without taking cautions. <i>I impulsively grabbed her wrist.</i>
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. <i>Your letter of the 6th instant.</i>
instantaneous	Existing or measured at a particular instant. <i>Modern methods of instantaneous communication.</i>
<u>instantly</u>	Without any delay. <i>She fell asleep almost instantly.</i>
now	In these times. <i>We can hardly send her back now can we.</i>
offhand	With little or no preparation or forethought. <i>I can't think of a better answer offhand.</i>
pressing	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>A pressing invitation.</i>
<u>prioritize</u>	Designate or treat (something) as being very or most important. <i>The department has failed to prioritize safety within the oil industry.</i>

prompt	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>I set off at three thirty prompt.</i>
<u>promptly</u>	At once (usually modifies an undesirable occurrence). <i>The rescue squad arrived promptly.</i>
quick	Moving quickly and lightly. <i>Children like to see quick results from their efforts.</i>
<u>swift</u>	Swiftly. <i>A remarkably swift recovery.</i>
urgency	An earnest and persistent quality; insistence. <i>The discovery of the ozone hole gave urgency to the issue of CFCs.</i>
urgent	Of an action or event done or arranged in response to an urgent situation. <i>An urgent demand for more state funding.</i>
