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Associations of "Exiled" (30 Words)

abolitionism	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
asylum	A hospital for mentally incompetent or unbalanced person. <i>We provide asylum for those too ill to care for themselves.</i>
banish	Get rid of (something unwanted). <i>Banish bad thoughts.</i>
coup	(among some North American Indian peoples) an act of touching an armed enemy in battle as a deed of bravery, or an act of first touching an item of the enemy's in order to claim it. <i>He was overthrown in an army coup.</i>
cutout	A switch that interrupts an electric circuit in the event of an overload.
defrock	Deprive (someone) of professional status or membership of a prestigious group. <i>He had left his diocese one step ahead of a move to defrock him.</i>
demote	Move (someone) to a lower position or rank, usually as a punishment. <i>The head of the army was demoted to deputy defence secretary.</i>
deport	Hand over to the authorities of another country. <i>He was deported for violation of immigration laws.</i>
deportation	The act of expelling a person from their native land. <i>His deportation to a penal colony.</i>
depose	Force to leave (an office). <i>He had been deposed by a military coup.</i>
dispossession	The action of depriving someone of land, property, or other possessions. <i>Reparation for the victims of land dispossession.</i>
downgrade	Rate lower; lower in value or esteem. <i>Downgrades by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>

edict	A legally binding command or decision entered on the court record (as if issued by a court or judge). <i>Clovis issued an edict protecting Church property.</i>
eject	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>Angry supporters were forcibly ejected from the court.</i>
evict	Expel (someone) from a property, especially with the support of the law. <i>The landlord evicted the tenants after they had not paid the rent for four months.</i>
expatriate	An exile. <i>American expatriates in London.</i>
<u>expel</u>	Officially make (someone) leave a school or other organization. <i>She expelled a shuddering breath.</i>
extradite	Hand over (a person accused or convicted of a crime) to the jurisdiction of the foreign state in which the crime was committed. <i>Brazil refused to extradite him to Britain.</i>
extradition	The action of extraditing a person accused or convicted of a crime. <i>Emergency extraditions.</i>
<u>ghetto</u>	An isolated or segregated group or area. <i>The Warsaw ghetto.</i>
intern	Work as an intern. <i>The young doctor is interning at the Medical Center this year.</i>
<u>ostracize</u>	(in ancient Greece) banish (an unpopular or overly powerful citizen) from a city for five or ten years by popular vote. <i>Ever since I spoke up my colleagues ostracize me.</i>
oust	Deprive of or exclude from possession of something. <i>The word processor has ousted the typewriter.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>Plotting the overthrow of the government.</i>
<u>relegate</u>	Assign to a class or kind. <i>She likes to relegate difficult questions to her colleagues.</i>
reshuffle	A redistribution of something. <i>The gambler demanded a reshuffle.</i>
riddance	The act of forcing out someone or something. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not riddance or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
rout	Make a groove in. <i>In a matter of minutes the attackers were routed.</i>

transportation The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966.

***Transportation** on the site includes a monorail.*

usurp Take the place of (someone in a position of power) illegally; supplant.
*Gloom had **usurped** mirth at the party after the news of the terrorist act broke.*
