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## Associations of "Exiled" (30 Words)

<b>abolitionism</b>	The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
<b>asylum</b>	A hospital for mentally incompetent or unbalanced person. <i>We provide <b>asylum</b> for those too ill to care for themselves.</i>
<b>banish</b>	Get rid of (something unwanted). <i><b>Banish</b> bad thoughts.</i>
<b>coup</b>	(among some North American Indian peoples) an act of touching an armed enemy in battle as a deed of bravery, or an act of first touching an item of the enemy's in order to claim it. <i>He was overthrown in an army <b>coup</b>.</i>
<b>cutout</b>	A switch that interrupts an electric circuit in the event of an overload.
<b>defrock</b>	Deprive (someone) of professional status or membership of a prestigious group. <i>He had left his diocese one step ahead of a move to <b>defrock</b> him.</i>
<b>demote</b>	Move (someone) to a lower position or rank, usually as a punishment. <i>The head of the army was <b>demoted</b> to deputy defence secretary.</i>
<b>deport</b>	Hand over to the authorities of another country. <i>He was <b>deported</b> for violation of immigration laws.</i>
<b>deportation</b>	The act of expelling a person from their native land. <i>His <b>deportation</b> to a penal colony.</i>
<b>depose</b>	Force to leave (an office). <i>He had been <b>deposed</b> by a military coup.</i>
<b>dispossession</b>	The action of depriving someone of land, property, or other possessions. <i>Reparation for the victims of land <b>dispossession</b>.</i>
<b>downgrade</b>	Rate lower; lower in value or esteem. <i><b>Downgrades</b> by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.</i>

<b>edict</b>	A legally binding command or decision entered on the court record (as if issued by a court or judge). <i>Clovis issued an <b>edict</b> protecting Church property.</i>
<b>eject</b>	Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule. <i>Angry supporters were forcibly <b>ejected</b> from the court.</i>
<b>evict</b>	Expel (someone) from a property, especially with the support of the law. <i>The landlord <b>evicted</b> the tenants after they had not paid the rent for four months.</i>
<b>expatriate</b>	An exile. <i>American <b>expatriates</b> in London.</i>
<b><u>expel</u></b>	Officially make (someone) leave a school or other organization. <i>She <b>expelled</b> a shuddering breath.</i>
<b>extradite</b>	Hand over (a person accused or convicted of a crime) to the jurisdiction of the foreign state in which the crime was committed. <i>Brazil refused to <b>extradite</b> him to Britain.</i>
<b>extradition</b>	The action of extraditing a person accused or convicted of a crime. <i>Emergency <b>extraditions</b>.</i>
<b><u>ghetto</u></b>	An isolated or segregated group or area. <i>The Warsaw <b>ghetto</b>.</i>
<b>intern</b>	Work as an intern. <i>The young doctor is <b>interning</b> at the Medical Center this year.</i>
<b><u>ostracize</u></b>	(in ancient Greece) banish (an unpopular or overly powerful citizen) from a city for five or ten years by popular vote. <i>Ever since I spoke up my colleagues <b>ostracize</b> me.</i>
<b>oust</b>	Deprive of or exclude from possession of something. <i>The word processor has <b>ousted</b> the typewriter.</i>
<b><u>overthrow</u></b>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>Plotting the <b>overthrow</b> of the government.</i>
<b><u>relegate</u></b>	Assign to a class or kind. <i>She likes to <b>relegate</b> difficult questions to her colleagues.</i>
<b>reshuffle</b>	A redistribution of something. <i>The gambler demanded a <b>reshuffle</b>.</i>
<b>riddance</b>	The act of forcing out someone or something. <i>The new movement emphasized discipline not <b>riddance</b> or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.</i>
<b>rout</b>	Make a groove in. <i>In a matter of minutes the attackers were <b>routed</b>.</i>

**transportation** The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966.

***Transportation** on the site includes a monorail.*

**usurp** Take the place of (someone in a position of power) illegally; supplant.  
*Gloom had **usurped** mirth at the party after the news of the terrorist act broke.*
