- *Covering a wide area in terms of space or scope; extensive.*



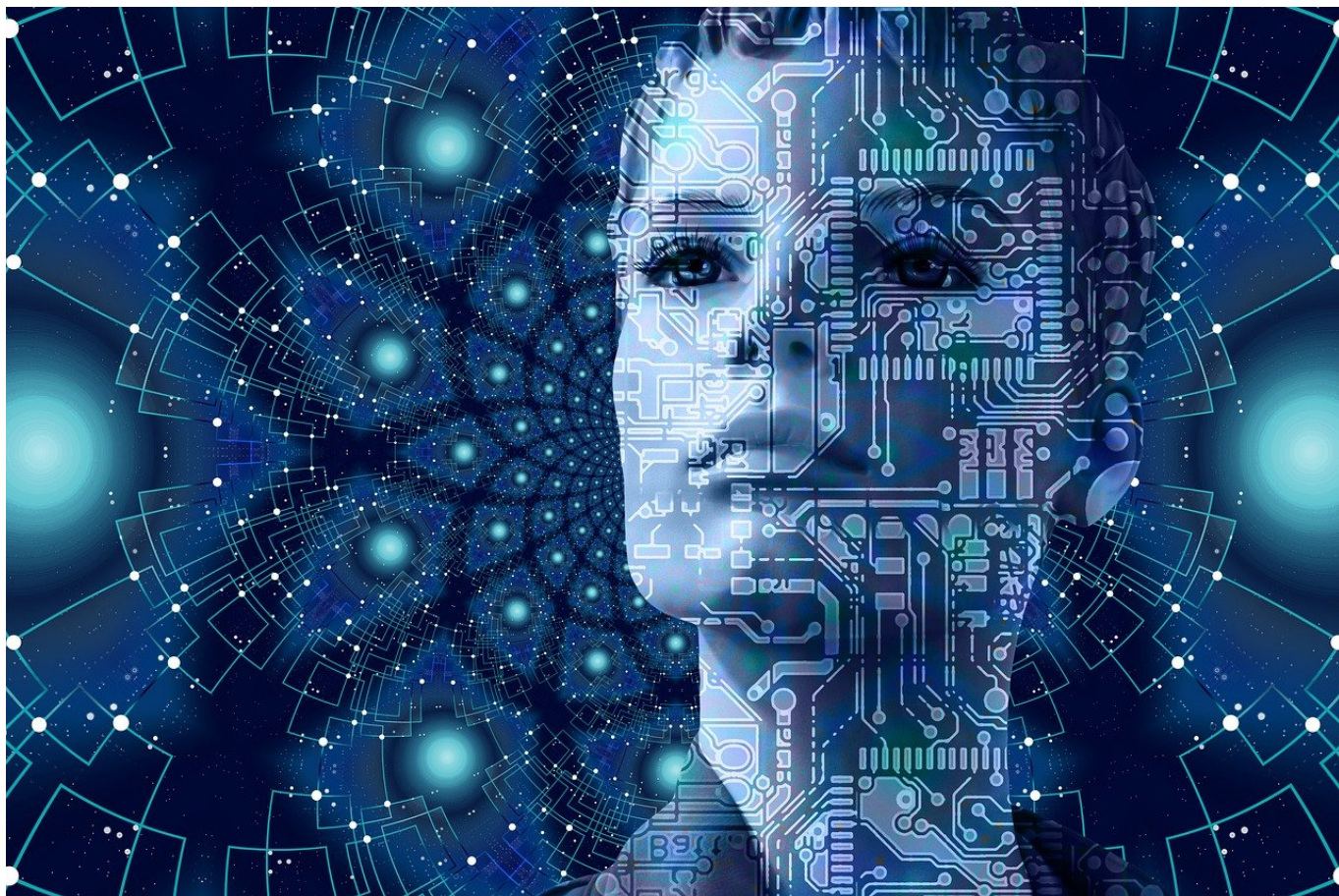

<b>effusive</b>	Extravagantly demonstrative. <i><b>Effusive</b> volcanism.</i>
<b>extensive</b>	Large in amount or scale. <i>An <b>extensive</b> Roman settlement in northwest England.</i>
<b>extrovert</b>	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His <b>extrovert</b> personality made him the ideal host.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	Outgoing and socially confident. <i>She is <b>extroverted</b> confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<b>forthcoming</b>	Willing to divulge information. <i>Financial support was not <b>forthcoming</b>.</i>
<b>friendly</b>	Denoting something that is adapted for or is not harmful to a specified thing. <i>The risk of blowing up <b>friendly</b> forces is minimized.</i>
<b>garrulous</b>	Full of trivial conversation. <i>A <b>garrulous</b> cab driver.</i>
<u><b>genial</b></u>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>Our <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b>grand</b>	Magnificent and imposing in appearance, size, or style. <i>Collecting on a <b>grand</b> scale.</i>
<u><b>heroic</b></u>	Having the characteristics of a hero or heroine; admirably brave or determined. <i>They took <b>heroic</b> measures to save his life.</i>
<b>inclusive</b>	Including all the services or items normally expected or required. <i>His concept of history is modern and <b>inclusive</b>.</i>
<u><b>interdisciplinary</b></u>	Relating to more than one branch of knowledge. <i>An <b>interdisciplinary</b> research programme.</i>
<b>loquacious</b>	Tending to talk a great deal; talkative. <i>Never <b>loquacious</b> Sarah was now totally lost for words.</i>
<u><b>multidisciplinary</b></u>	Combining or involving several academic disciplines or professional specializations in an approach to a topic or problem.
<b>open</b>	Open to or in view of all. <i>I m keeping an <b>open</b> mind about my future.</i>

<b><u>outgoing</u></b>	Going out or away from a particular place. <i>Incoming and <b>outgoing</b> calls.</i>
<b>rolling</b>	Uttered with a trill. <i>She used <b>rolling</b> r s as in Spanish.</i>
<b><u>sociable</u></b>	Inclined to or conducive to companionship with others. <i>Being a <b>sociable</b> person Eva loved entertaining.</i>
<b><u>sweeping</u></b>	Ignoring distinctions. <i>A smooth <b>sweeping</b> motion.</i>
<b>talkative</b>	Friendly and open and willing to talk. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn t stopped chatting.</i>

<b>loquacious</b>	Full of trivial conversation. <i>Never <b>loquacious</b> Sarah was now totally lost for words.</i>
<b>loquacity</b>	The quality of talking a great deal; talkativeness. <i>He was renowned for <b>loquacity</b>.</i>

<b>rhapsodize</b>	Say (something) with great enthusiasm. <i>He began to <b>rhapsodize</b> about Gaby's beauty and charm.</i>
<b>speak</b>	Utter (a word, message, etc). <i>In his agitation he was unable to <b>speak</b>.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Exchange thoughts talk with. <i>We need to <b>talk</b> Maggie.</i>

<b>talkative</b>	Full of trivial conversation. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn't stopped chatting.</i>
<b>verbose</b>	Using or expressed in more words than are needed. <i><b>Verbose</b> and ineffective instructional methods.</i>
<b>verbosity</b>	The fact or quality of using more words than needed; wordiness. <i>A critic with a reputation for <b>verbosity</b>.</i>
<u><b>vocal</b></u>	Having or using the power to produce speech or sound. <i>The <b>vocal</b> apparatus.</i>
<b>volubility</b>	The quality of talking fluently, readily, or incessantly; talkativeness. <i>Her legendary <b>volubility</b> deserted her.</i>
<b>voluble</b>	(of a person) talking fluently, readily, or incessantly. <i>An excited and <b>voluble</b> discussion.</i>
<b>wordy</b>	Using or expressed in rather too many words. <i>Newspapers of the day printed long <b>wordy</b> editorials.</i>
