Associations of "Expected" (30 Words)

advanced	Ahead in development; complex or intricate. <i>An advanced degree.</i>
anticipation	Anticipating with confidence of fulfillment. <i>They manned the telephones in anticipation of a flood of calls.</i>
anticipatory	(of a breach of contract) taking the form of an announcement or indication that a contract will not be honoured. <i>An anticipatory flash of excitement.</i>
aspirant	An ambitious and aspiring young person. <i>A lofty aspirant.</i>
aspiring	Directing one’s hopes or ambitions towards becoming a specified type of person. <i>An aspiring artist.</i>
assume	Take on as one’s own the expenses or debts of another person. <i>She assumed indifference even though she was seething with anger.</i>
assuming	Excessively forward. <i>On a subject like this it would be too assuming for me to decide.</i>
assumption	(Christianity) the taking up of the body and soul of the Virgin Mary when her earthly life had ended. <i>The assumption of an active role in regional settlements.</i>
conjecture	(in textual criticism) propose (a reading). <i>A matter for conjecture.</i>
effrontery	Insolent or impertinent behaviour. <i>One juror had the effrontery to challenge the coroner s decision.</i>
expect	Consider obligatory request and expect. <i>I m expecting a full explanation as to why these files were destroyed.</i>
expectation	A belief that someone will or should achieve something. <i>Reality had not lived up to expectations.</i>

future	Effective in or looking toward the future. <i>MPs will debate the future of the railways.</i>
guess	Put forward of a guess in spite of possible refutation. <i>I guess she is angry at me for standing her up.</i>
<u>imagine</u>	Form a mental image or concept of. <i>I imagine she earned a lot of money with her new novel.</i>
lifespan	The period during which something is functional (as between birth and death). <i>The human lifespan.</i>
<u>maybe</u>	By chance. <i>No ifs buts or maybes.</i>
preconception	An opinion formed beforehand without adequate evidence. <i>He did not even try to confirm his preconceptions.</i>
predict	Make a prediction about tell in advance. <i>He predicts that the trend will continue.</i>
<u>predictable</u>	Capable of being foretold. <i>The market is volatile and never predictable.</i>
premise	State or presuppose something as a premise. <i>If the premise is true then the conclusion must be true.</i>
<u>presumably</u>	Used to convey that what is asserted is very likely though not known for certain. <i>It was not yet ten o'clock so presumably the boys were still at the pub.</i>
<u>presume</u>	Take upon oneself; act presumptuously, without permission. <i>A restaurant bill presumes the consumption of food.</i>
<u>presumption</u>	Audacious (even arrogant) behavior that you have no right to. <i>He lifted her off the ground and she was enraged at his presumption.</i>
<u>probably</u>	Almost certainly; as far as one knows or can tell. <i>He will probably win the election.</i>
prognosis	A forecast of the likely outcome of a situation. <i>It is very difficult to make an accurate prognosis.</i>
<u>suppose</u>	Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand. <i>I m quite a good actress I suppose.</i>
<u>supposedly</u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
supposition	A hypothesis that is taken for granted. <i>Their outrage was based on supposition and hearsay.</i>
