group	<i>The bulbs should be planted in groups.</i>
<u>haste</u>	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>I write in haste.</i>
hastiness	Hasty impulsiveness.
hostile expedition	Troops belonging to the enemy's military forces.
hurriedness	Overly eager speed (and possible carelessness).
jaunt	A short excursion or journey made for pleasure. <i>Her regular jaunts to Europe.</i>
journey	The act of traveling from one place to another. <i>An eight hour train journey.</i>
junket	A journey taken for pleasure. <i>During the junket the actor opened up about his character.</i>
military expedition	The military forces of a nation.
<u>odyssey</u>	A long wandering and eventful journey. <i>His odyssey from military man to politician.</i>
outing	A trip taken for pleasure, especially one lasting a day or less. <i>A family outing to Weston super Mare.</i>
party	A person or people forming one side in an agreement or dispute. <i>Draft the party's election manifesto.</i>
pleasure trip	A fundamental feeling that is hard to define but that people desire to experience.
promptitude	The quality of acting quickly and without delay. <i>He arranges everything with extraordinary promptitude and foresight.</i>
promptness	The characteristic of doing things without delay.
<u>quickness</u>	The quality of a person's temper being easily roused. <i>His quickness of temper involved him in many controversies.</i>
rapidity	The quality of moving or reacting with great speed. <i>Technology spreads with extraordinary rapidity.</i>
run	The act of running traveling on foot at a fast pace. <i>He is raising money for a Senate run.</i>

sashay	(ballet) quick gliding steps with one foot always leading. <i>Roll away with a half sashay then face your original partner.</i>
<u>speed</u>	Distance travelled per unit time. <i>Wish me good speed.</i>
speediness	A rate that is rapid.
<u>squad</u>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>The demolition squad from No 6 Troop were blowing up the guns.</i>
swiftness	A rate (usually rapid) at which something happens. <i>Kay had the upper hand with her agility and swiftness.</i>
team	A cooperative unit (especially in sports). <i>A team of researchers.</i>
<u>tour</u>	A journey for pleasure in which several different places are visited. <i>They took an extended tour of Europe.</i>
trip	A light, lively movement of a person's feet. <i>He heard the trip of women's feet overhead.</i>
troop	A group of soldiers. <i>A troop of children.</i>
velocity	Distance travelled per unit time. <i>The tank shot backwards at an incredible velocity.</i>
<u>voyage</u>	An act of traveling by water. <i>Writing a biography is a voyage of discovery.</i>

circumnavigate	Travel around, either by plane or ship. <i>He undertook to circumnavigate the globe in 80 days or less.</i>
<u>compass</u>	The range or scope of something. <i>This writer attempts more than his talents can compass.</i>

<u>flight</u>	A formation of aircraft in flight. <i>An eagle in flight.</i>
jaunt	A short excursion or journey made for pleasure. <i>Her regular jaunts to Europe.</i>
journey	Undertake a journey or trip. <i>Her spiritual journey towards Roman Catholicism.</i>
junket	An extravagant trip or celebration, in particular one enjoyed by a government official at public expense. <i>A plate of junket.</i>
<u>leisure</u>	Opportunity afforded by free time to do something. <i>His job left him little leisure.</i>
navigate	Act as the navigator in a car, plane, or vessel and plan, direct, plot the path and position of the conveyance. <i>I used a browser to navigate around the Web.</i>
navigation	A navigable inland waterway, especially a canal. <i>Most of the navigation from Wormley to Tottenham was frozen.</i>
<u>odyssey</u>	A long and eventful or adventurous journey or experience. <i>His odyssey from military man to politician.</i>
outing	An appearance in something, especially a sporting event or film. <i>A family outing to Weston super Mare.</i>
peregrination	Traveling or wandering around. <i>She kept Aunt Ilsa company on her peregrinations.</i>
sail	Travel in a ship or boat using sails or engine power. <i>The ship sails on.</i>
sailing	The action of sailing in a ship or boat. <i>The company operates five sailings a day from Ramsgate to Dunkirk.</i>
<u>tour</u>	Make a tour of a certain place. <i>He toured in America and Europe.</i>
transatlantic	Crossing the Atlantic Ocean. <i>A transatlantic flight.</i>

travel	A period of time spent travelling from one place to another typically over long distances. A travel iron.
trip	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>Trips and falls cause nearly half of all accidents.</i>
venture	Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome. <i>Agents for other people s money they do not venture their own capital.</i>
<u>voyage</u>	Go on a voyage. <i>Writing a biography is a voyage of discovery.</i>
<u>wayfarer</u>	A traveler going on a trip.
