| <b>abolition</b>              | The action of abolishing a system, practice, or institution.<br><i>The <b>abolition</b> of capital punishment.</i>   |
| <b>abolitionism</b>           | The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.  |
| <b>abolitionist</b>           | A reformer who favors abolishing slavery.<br><i>The <b>abolitionist</b> movement.</i>  |
| <b>banish</b>                 | Send (someone) away from a country or place as an official punishment.<br><i>A number of people were <b>banished</b> to Siberia for political crimes.</i>                              |
| <b>cancellation</b>           | A mark made on a postage stamp to show that it has been used.<br><i>Covers showing stamps and special <b>cancellations</b>.</i>  |
| <b><a href="#">coup</a></b>   | An instance of successfully achieving something difficult.<br><i>He was overthrown in an army <b>coup</b>.</i>   |
| <b>cutout</b>                 | A part that is cut out or is intended to be cut out.   |
| <b><a href="#">delete</a></b> | (of a section of genetic code, or its product) be lost or excised from a nucleic acid or protein sequence.<br><i>Their EMI release has already been <b>deleted</b>.</i>                |
| <b>deport</b>                 | Exile (a native) to another country.<br><i>He has <b>deported</b> himself with great dignity.</i>  |
| <b>depose</b>                 | Remove from office suddenly and forcefully.<br><i>He had been <b>deposed</b> by a military coup.</i>   |
| <b>discharge</b>              | A substance that has been discharged.<br><i>Machinery to rehabilitate the bankrupt through the process of <b>discharge</b>.</i>  |
| <b>eject</b>                  | Leave an aircraft rapidly using an ejection seat or capsule.<br><i>He put the plane in a nosedive and <b>ejected</b>.</i>  |
| <b>elimination</b>            | The generation of a simple substance as a product in the course of a reaction involving larger molecules.<br><i>A 1 1 draw confirmed their <b>elimination</b> from the tournament.</i> |

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| <b>erase</b>       | Remove recorded material from (a magnetic tape or medium); delete (data) from a computer's memory.<br><i>Who <b>erased</b> the files from my hard disk.</i>   |
| <b>evict</b>       | Expel or eject without recourse to legal process.<br><i>A single mother and her children have been <b>evicted</b> from their home.</i>  |
| <b>excise</b>      | Charge excise on goods.<br><i>The surgeon <b>excised</b> the tumor.</i>   |
| <b>exclude</b>     | Put out or expel from a place.<br><i>The bad results were <b>excluded</b> from the report.</i>  |
| <b>exclusion</b>   | The state of being excommunicated.<br><i><b>Exclusions</b> can be added to your policy.</i>   |
| <b>exile</b>       | Expel from a country.<br><i>A corrupt dictator who had been <b>exiled</b> from his country.</i>   |
| <b>expatriate</b>  | Move away from one's native country and adopt a new residence abroad.<br><i>The poet was then <b>expatriated</b> from France.</i>   |
| <b>expulsion</b>   | The act of expelling or projecting or ejecting.<br><i>The child s <b>expulsion</b> from school.</i>   |
| <b>expunge</b>     | Remove by erasing or crossing out or as if by drawing a line.<br><i>The kind of man that could <b>expunge</b> an unsatisfactory incident from his memory.</i>   |
| <b>extradite</b>   | Hand over (a person accused or convicted of a crime) to the jurisdiction of the foreign state in which the crime was committed.<br><i>They <b>extradited</b> the fugitive to his native country so he could be tried there.</i> |
| <b>ghetto</b>      | An isolated or segregated group or area.<br><i>The Warsaw <b>ghetto</b>.</i>  |
| <b>liquidate</b>   | Wind up the affairs of (a business) by ascertaining liabilities and apportioning assets.<br><i>If the company was <b>liquidated</b> there would be enough funds released to honour the debts.</i>                               |
| <b>manumission</b> | The formal act of freeing from slavery.<br><i>A leading advocate of <b>manumission</b>.</i>   |
| <b>ostracize</b>   | Expel from a community or group.<br><i>Ever since I spoke up my colleagues <b>ostracize</b> me.</i>   |
| <b>oust</b>        | Take away (a court's jurisdiction) in a matter.<br><i>The chairman was <b>ousted</b> after he misappropriated funds.</i>  |

- riddance**      The act of removing or getting rid of something.  
*The new movement emphasized discipline not **riddance** or punishment as a method of solving the criminal problem.*
- rout**             A disorderly retreat of defeated troops.  
*A **rout** of wolves consumed the last of the carcass.*
