<b>budget</b>	Provide a sum of money for a particular purpose from a budget. <i>A <b>budget</b> guitar.</i>
<b>budgetary</b>	Of or relating to a budget. <i>A coalition to prevent <b>budgetary</b> cuts to schools.</i>
<b>cash</b>	Exchange for cash. <i>The bank <b>cached</b> her cheque.</i>
<b>consumer</b>	A person or thing that eats or uses something. <i>Understanding what motivates <b>consumers</b> is more crucial than ever.</i>
<b>cost</b>	Be priced at. <i>The tunnel has been built at no <b>cost</b> to the state.</i>
<b>cutback</b>	A reduction in quantity or rate. <i><b>Cutbacks</b> in defence spending.</i>
<b>disbursement</b>	A payment, especially one made by a solicitor to a third party and then claimed back from the client. <i>They established a committee to supervise the <b>disbursement</b> of aid.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Charge something to an expense account. <i>I can <b>expense</b> the refreshments.</i>
<b>fee</b>	Give a tip or gratuity to in return for a service, beyond the compensation agreed on. <i>An annual membership <b>fee</b>.</i>
<b>fund</b>	Provide a fund for the redemption of principal or payment of interest. <i>A vast <b>fund</b> of information.</i>
<b>funding</b>	The action or practice of providing funding. <i><b>Funding</b> for the project was provided by the Housing Corporation.</i>
<b>funds</b>	Assets in the form of money.
<b>installment</b>	A part of a published serial.
<b>invoice</b>	Send an invoice to someone. <i>She <b>invoiced</b> the company for her expenses.</i>
<b>mortgage</b>	The amount of money borrowed in a mortgage. <i>Some people worry that selling off state assets <b>mortgages</b> the country's future.</i>
<b>outlay</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money. <i>A modest <b>outlay</b> on local advertising.</i>
<b>price</b>	Attach price labels or tickets to an item for sale. <i>The <b>price</b> of gasoline.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).



<b>receipt</b>	Report the receipt of. <i>One copy can be <b>receipted</b> and returned to you.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>spending</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money.
<b>spree</b>	Take part in a spree. <i>A shopping <b>spree</b>.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>A <b>taxation</b> system.</i>
