overpriced	Too expensive; costing more than it is worth. <b>Overpriced</b> items at resort shops.

billion	Denoting a quantity consisting of one million million items or units in Great Britain.
<u>costly</u>	Causing suffering, loss, or disadvantage. <i>Costly</i> jewelry.
deluxe	Ostentatiously rich and superior in quality. A <b>deluxe</b> car.
exorbitant	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. Some hotels charge <b>exorbitant</b> rates for phone calls.
extravagant	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. <i>Extravagant</i> claims about the merchandise.
immoderate	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i>Immoderate</i> spending.



<u>inefficient</u>	Lacking the ability or skill to perform effectively; inadequate. <i>Inefficient</i> transport systems.
<u>lavish</u>	Give someone generous amounts of. Distributed gifts with a <b>lavish</b> hand.
<u>luxurious</u>	Giving self-indulgent or sensual pleasure. A <b>luxurious</b> wallow in a scented bath.
luxuriously	In a rich manner.
luxury	Luxurious or of the nature of a luxury. They actually had the <b>luxury</b> of a whole day together.
millionaire	A person whose material wealth is valued at more than a million dollars. <i>A millionaire</i> businessman.
opulence	Great wealth or luxuriousness. Rooms of spectacular <b>opulence</b> .
<u>opulent</u>	Ostentatiously costly and luxurious. The <b>opulent</b> comfort of a limousine.
ostentation	A gaudy outward display. The office was spacious but without any trace of <b>ostentation</b> .
outrageously	To an extravagant or immoderate degree. I think Caroline has behaved <b>outrageously</b> .
overpayment	The act of paying too much. <i>He received 20 000 in benefit <b>overpayment</b>s.</i>
prodigal	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. <b>Prodigal</b> in their expenditures.
prosperity	The condition of prospering; having good fortune. A long period of peace and <b>prosperity</b> .
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. What a full <b>rich</b> life you lead.
spending	The act of spending or disbursing money.
spendthrift	Recklessly wasteful. A <b>spendthrift</b> uncle.
splurge	Be showy or ostentatious. We <b>splurge</b> d on T bone steaks.
sumptuary	Regulating or controlling expenditure or personal behavior. <i>Sumptuary</i> laws forbidding gambling.
trillion	One quintillion in Great Britain. In England they call a <b>trillion</b> a billion.



usurious	Relating to or characterized by usury; extortionate. They lend money at <b>usurious</b> rates.
valuable	Worth a great deal of money. A <b>valuable</b> antique.
valued	Held in great esteem for admirable qualities especially of an intrinsic nature. <i>A valued friend</i> .
vile	Morally reprehensible. <i>Vile</i> smells.
<u>wasteful</u>	Laying waste. <b>Wasteful</b> duplication of effort.
