### **Definitions of "Explode" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “explode” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Suddenly begin to move or start a new activity.*
- *Burst and release energy as through a violent chemical or physical reaction.*
- *Drive from the stage by noisy disapproval.*
- *Be unleashed; emerge with violence or noise.*
- *Burst outward, usually with noise.*
- *Cause to burst as a result of air pressure; of stop consonants like /p/, /t/, and /k.*
- *Increase rapidly and in an uncontrolled manner.*
- *Show a violent emotional reaction.*
- *(of a violent emotion or a situation) arise or develop suddenly.*

- *Burst or shatter violently and noisily as a result of rapid combustion, excessive internal pressure, or other process.*
- *(of a person) suddenly give expression to violent emotion, especially anger.*
- *Undergo a violent expansion in which much energy is released as a shock wave.*
- *Show (a theory or claim) to be baseless, or refute and make obsolete.*
- *Show (a belief or theory) to be false or unfounded.*
- *Destroy by exploding.*
- *Increase suddenly in size, number, or extent.*
- *Cause to burst with a violent release of energy.*

<b>blow</b>	Be blowing or storming. <i>The aircraft was <b>blown</b> apart by a bomb.</i>
<b>blow up</b>	Cause air to go in, on, or through.
<b>bluster</b>	Show off. <i>I don't care what he says I <b>blustered</b>.</i>
<b>break loose</b>	Crack; of the male voice in puberty.
<b>burgeon</b>	Grow and flourish. <i>The city's suburbs have <b>burgeoned</b> sprawling out from the centre.</i>
<b>burst</b>	Cause to burst. <i>One of the balloons <b>burst</b>.</i>
<b>burst apart</b>	Force out or release suddenly and often violently something pent up.
<b>burst forth</b>	Move suddenly, energetically, or violently.
<b>contradict</b>	Be in contradiction with. <i>He did not <b>contradict</b> what he said last week.</i>
<b>debunk</b>	Reduce the inflated reputation of (someone). <i>She <b>debunks</b> all the usual rubbish about acting.</i>
<b>deflate</b>	Become deflated or flaccid as by losing air. <i>The balloons <b>deflated</b>.</i>
<b>deny</b>	Deny formally an allegation of fact by the opposing party in a legal suit. <i>There was no way that I was going to <b>deny</b> myself ice cream.</i>
<b>detonate</b>	Burst and release energy as through a violent chemical or physical reaction. <i>The bomb <b>detonated</b> at noon.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>She was conditionally <b>discharged</b> for two years at Oxford Crown Court.</i>
<b>discredit</b>	Cause to be distrusted or disbelieved. <i>His explanation for the phenomenon was soon <b>discredited</b>.</i>
<b>disprove</b>	Prove to be false. <i>The physicist <b>disproved</b> his colleagues theories.</i>
<b>erupt</b>	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>Fierce fighting <b>erupted</b> between the army and guerrillas.</i>
<b>escalate</b>	Increase in extent or intensity. <i>The disturbance <b>escalated</b> into a full scale riot.</i>

<b><u>expose</u></b>	Expose to light of photographic film. <i>The situation <b>exposed</b> a conflict within the government.</i>
<b>fire off</b>	Terminate the employment of; discharge from an office or position.
<b>fly apart</b>	Decrease rapidly and disappear.
<b>fly into pieces</b>	Transport by aeroplane.
<b>gainsay</b>	Deny or contradict (a fact or statement). <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>
<b>get angry</b>	Reach and board.
<b>give the lie to</b>	Endure the loss of.
<b>give vent to one's feelings</b>	Perform for an audience.
<b>go berserk</b>	Have a particular form.
<b>go into a rage</b>	Be abolished or discarded.
<b>go off</b>	Progress by being changed.
<b>heighten</b>	Increase. <i>The tension <b>heightened</b>.</i>
<b>increase dramatically</b>	Become bigger or greater in amount.
<b>increase rapidly</b>	Make bigger or more.
<b>increase suddenly</b>	Become bigger or greater in amount.
<b><u>invalidate</u></b>	Deprive (an official document or procedure) of legal validity because it contravenes a regulation or law. <i>A technical flaw in her papers <b>invalidated</b> her nomination.</i>
<b>irrupt</b>	(of a bird or other animal) migrate into an area in abnormally large numbers. <i>The island's rodent population <b>irrupted</b>.</i>
<b>let fly</b>	Leave unchanged.
<b>let off</b>	Leave unchanged.
<b>lose one's temper</b>	Fail to keep or to maintain; cease to have, either physically or in an abstract sense.
<b><u>multiply</u></b>	(of an animal or other organism) increase in number by reproducing. <i><b>Multiply</b> 10 by 15.</i>
<b>mushroom</b>	Pick or gather mushrooms. <i>The problem <b>mushroomed</b>.</i>

<b>negate</b>	Make (a clause, sentence, or proposition) negative in meaning. <i>This action will <b>negate</b> the effect of my efforts.</i>
<b>puncture</b>	Be pierced or punctured. <i>The tire <b>punctured</b>.</i>
<b>quash</b>	Declare invalid. <i>A hospital executive <b>quashed</b> rumours that nursing staff will lose jobs.</i>
<b>rage</b>	Be violent; as of fires and storms. <i>He <b>raged</b> at the futility of it all.</i>
<b>rant and rave</b>	Talk in a noisy, excited, or declamatory manner.
<b>rebut</b>	Drive back or repel (a person or attack). <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
<b>refute</b>	Prove (a statement or theory) to be wrong or false; disprove. <i>His voice challenging his audience to rise and <b>refute</b> him.</i>
<b>repudiate</b>	(in the past or in non-Christian religions) disown or divorce (one's wife). <i>She <b>repudiated</b> the accusations.</i>
<b>ridicule</b>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>The satirists <b>ridiculed</b> the plans for a new opera house.</i>
<b>rocket</b>	Propel with a rocket. <i>The city was <b>rocketed</b> and bombed from the air.</i>
<b>set off</b>	Decide upon or fix definitely.
<b>shatter</b>	Break into many pieces. <i><b>Shatter</b> the plate.</i>
<b>shoot up</b>	Measure the altitude of by using a sextant.
<b>snowball</b>	Throw snowballs at. <i>I made sure the other kids stopped <b>snowballing</b> Celia.</i>
<b>storm</b>	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>Don't patronize me she <b>stormed</b>.</i>
<b>touch off</b>	To extend as far as.
<b>trigger</b>	Release or pull the trigger on. <i>An allergy can be <b>triggered</b> by stress or overwork.</i>
<b>trigger off</b>	Put in motion or move to act.

### ammunition

Information that can be used to attack or defend a claim or argument or viewpoint.

Guns **ammunition** and explosives.

### **anthracite**

Coal of a hard variety that contains relatively pure carbon and burns with little flame and smoke.

A wide range of colours from **anthracite** to blush pink.

### atomic

Weapons deriving destructive energy from the release of atomic energy.

The **atomic** age required a new way of political thinking.

<b>blast</b>	A strong current of air used in smelting. <i>The car was <b>blasted</b> thirty feet into the sky.</i>
<b>bomb</b>	Attack a place or object with a bomb or bombs. <i>It just became another big budget film that <b>bombed</b>.</i>
<b>burst</b>	Burst outward usually with noise. <i>She <b>burst</b> on to the British art scene in 1985.</i>
<b>cannon</b>	Make a cannon. <i>The couple behind almost <b>cannoned</b> into us.</i>
<b>coke</b>	Convert coal into coke. <i>Petroleum oils <b>coke</b> after distillation.</i>
<b>decompression</b>	The process of expanding computer data to its normal size so that it can be read by a computer. <i>This disk contains a number of utilities which require <b>decompression</b>.</i>
<b>detonate</b>	Explode or cause to explode. <i>Two other bombs failed to <b>detonate</b>.</i>
<b>detonation</b>	The action of causing a bomb or explosive device to explode. <i>She was in a control building at the time of <b>detonation</b>.</i>
<b>erupt</b>	Erupt or intensify suddenly. <i>Fierce fighting <b>erupted</b> between the army and guerrillas.</i>
<b>eruption</b>	A sudden violent spontaneous occurrence (usually of some undesirable condition). <i>Irritable skin <b>eruptions</b>.</i>
<b>explosion</b>	The noise caused by an explosion. <i>Three <b>explosions</b> damaged buildings at the barracks.</i>
<b>explosive</b>	A substance which can be made to explode, especially any of those used in bombs or shells. <i>The idea was politically <b>explosive</b>.</i>
<b>firearm</b>	A portable gun. <i>He wore his <b>firearm</b> in a shoulder holster.</i>
<b>firework</b>	An outburst of anger, or a display of great skill or energy. <i>A <b>firework</b> display.</i>
<b>flak</b>	Anti-aircraft fire. <i>You must be strong enough to take the <b>flak</b> if things go wrong.</i>
<b>fulminate</b>	A salt or ester of fulminic acid. <i>Thunder <b>fulminated</b> around the house.</i>



<b>grenade</b>	A glass receptacle containing chemicals which are released when the receptacle is thrown and broken, used for testing drains and extinguishing fires.
<b>implode</b>	Collapse or cause to collapse violently inwards. <i>He lost money when the market <b>imploded</b>.</i>
<b>kindle</b>	Cause to start burning. <i>The setting sun <b>kindled</b> the sky with oranges and reds.</i>
<b>nuclear</b>	Denoting possessing or involving weapons using nuclear energy. <b>Nuclear</b> weapons.
<b>ordnance</b>	Military supplies. <i>The gun was a brand new piece of <b>ordnance</b>.</i>
<b>outburst</b>	A sudden violent disturbance. <i>A wild <b>outburst</b> of applause.</i>
<b>pyrotechnic</b>	Relating to fireworks. <b>Pyrotechnic</b> keyboard virtuosity.
<b>pyrotechnics</b>	A brilliant performance or display of a specified skill. <i>He thrilled his audience with vocal <b>pyrotechnics</b>.</i>
<b>scald</b>	Any of a number of plant diseases which produce an effect similar to that of scalding especially a disease of fruit marked by browning and caused by excessive sunlight bad storage conditions or atmospheric pollution. <b>Scald</b> tomatoes so that they can be peeled.
<b>supernova</b>	A star that explodes and becomes extremely luminous in the process.
<b>thermonuclear</b>	Relating to or involving weapons in which explosive force is produced by thermonuclear reactions. <b>Thermonuclear</b> fusion.
