### **Definitions of "Export" as a noun**

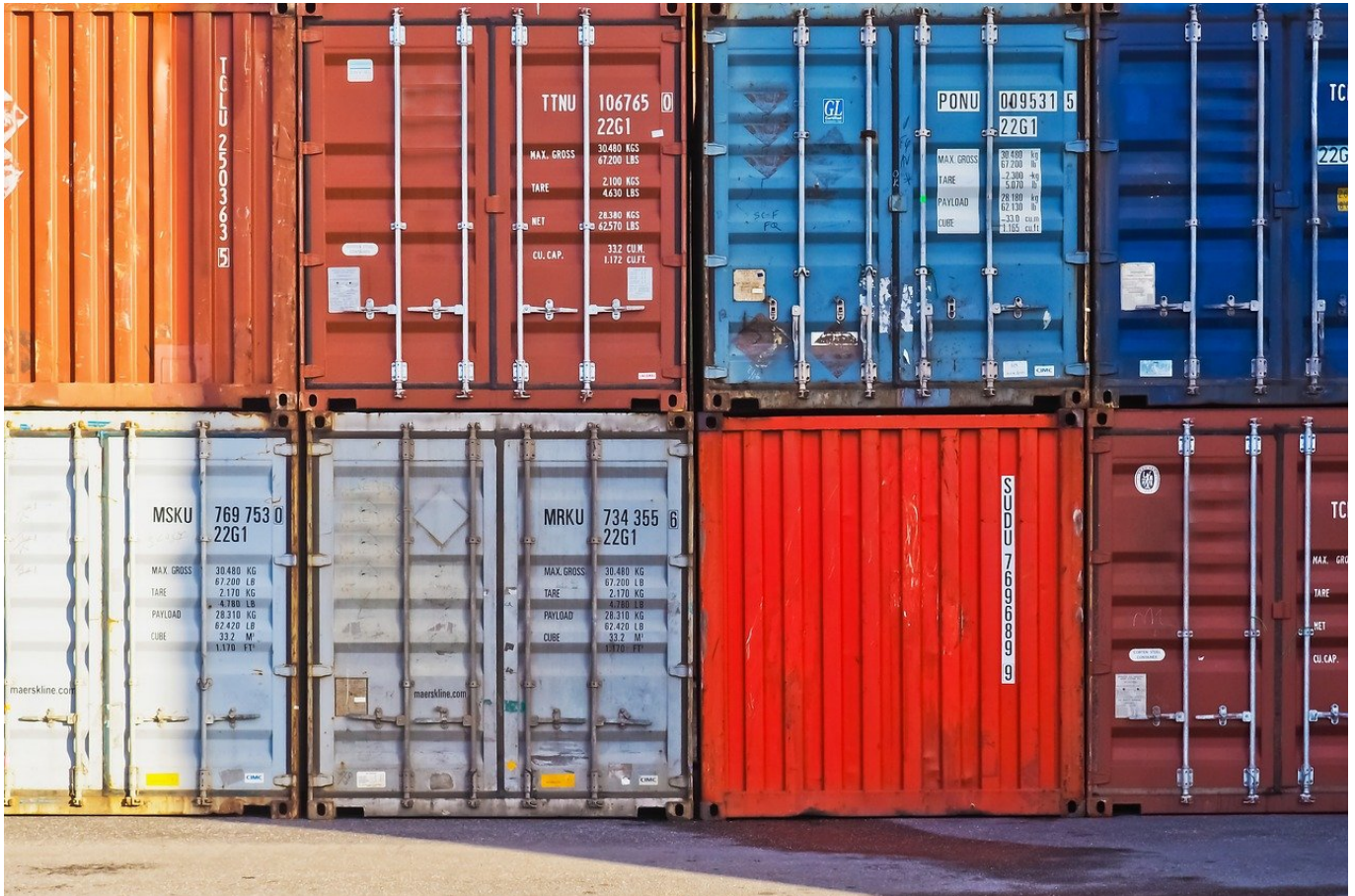
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “export” as a noun can have the following definitions:

### Definitions of "Export" as a verb

- *Transfer (data) in a format that can be used by other programs.*
- *Cause to spread in another part of the world.*
- *Send (goods or services) to another country for sale.*
- *Spread or introduce (ideas and beliefs) to another country.*
- *Sell or transfer abroad.*
- *Transfer (electronic data) out of a database or document in a format that can be used by other programs.*

Accept or judge as acceptable.

<b>sell abroad</b>	Be approved of or gain acceptance.
<b>sell overseas</b>	Give up for a price or reward.
<b>send abroad</b>	To cause or order to be taken, directed, or transmitted to another place.
<b>send overseas</b>	To cause or order to be taken, directed, or transmitted to another place.
<b>spread</b>	Spread out or open from a closed or folded state. <i>I <b>spread</b> a towel on the sand and sat down.</i>
<b>trade internationally</b>	Do business; offer for sale as for one's livelihood.
<b><u>transmit</u></b>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Sexually <b>transmitted</b> diseases.</i>
<b>transport</b>	Transport commercially. <i>She was <b>transported</b> with pleasure.</i>

- *The information can be exported to a database.*
- *The Greeks exported Hellenic culture around the Mediterranean basin.*

- *The Russians exported Marxism to Africa.*
- *We export less than we import and have a negative trade balance.*
- *Nearly all the bananas produced were exported to Britain.*

<b>commercially</b>	In a way that is concerned with buying, selling, and making a profit. <i>He made historical drama appear <b>commercially</b> viable.</i>
<b>credit</b>	Used in the phrase to your credit in order to indicate an achievement deserving praise. <i>She had 15 <b>credit</b> on her account.</i>
<b>dealing</b>	The activity of buying and selling a particular commodity. <i>My <b>dealings</b> with the gentler sex.</i>
<b>debit</b>	Enter as debit. <i>10 000 was <b>debited</b> from their account.</i>
<b>deficit</b>	(in sport) the amount or score by which a team or individual is losing. <i>The balance of payments is again in <b>deficit</b>.</i>
<b>economic</b>	Relating to economics or the economy. <i><b>Economic</b> growth.</i>
<b>emporium</b>	A centre of commerce; a market.
<b>exporter</b>	A person or group spreading or introducing ideas and beliefs to another country. <i>Japan has only begun to be an <b>exporter</b> of culture in the last couple of decades.</i>
<b>financial</b>	Shares in financial companies. <i>An independent <b>financial</b> adviser.</i>
<b>fiscal</b>	Involving financial matters. <i>The budget deficit for <b>fiscal</b> 1996.</i>
<b>importation</b>	The introduction of an idea from a different place or context. <i>The government takes a tough stance on illegal drug <b>importation</b>.</i>
<b>importer</b>	Someone whose business involves importing goods from outside (especially from a foreign country). <i>The EU is the largest <b>importer</b> of agricultural products from developing countries.</i>
<b>international</b>	A player who has taken part in an international game or contest. <i><b>International</b> waters.</i>
<b>investor</b>	A person or organization that puts money into financial schemes, property, etc. with the expectation of achieving a profit. <i>Foreign <b>investors</b> in the British commercial property sector.</i>
<b>market</b>	The free market. <i>The bottom s fallen out of the <b>market</b>.</i>



<b>protectionism</b>	The policy of imposing duties or quotas on imports in order to protect home industries from overseas competition.
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<b>sales</b>	Income (at invoice values) received for goods and services over some given period of time.
<b>statecraft</b>	Wisdom in the management of public affairs. <i>Issues of <b>statecraft</b> require great deliberation.</i>
<b><u>swap</u></b>	Exchange or give (something) in exchange for. <i>Let s do a <b>swap</b>.</i>
<b><u>trade</u></b>	A trade wind. <i>She has <b>traded</b> millions of dollars worth of metals.</i>
<b>trader</b>	A person who buys and sells goods, currency, or shares.
<b>transact</b>	Conduct business. <i>The dealer must know the price at which he is prepared to <b>transact</b>.</i>
<b>transaction</b>	An input message to a computer system dealt with as a single unit of work. <i>No <b>transactions</b> are possible without him.</i>
