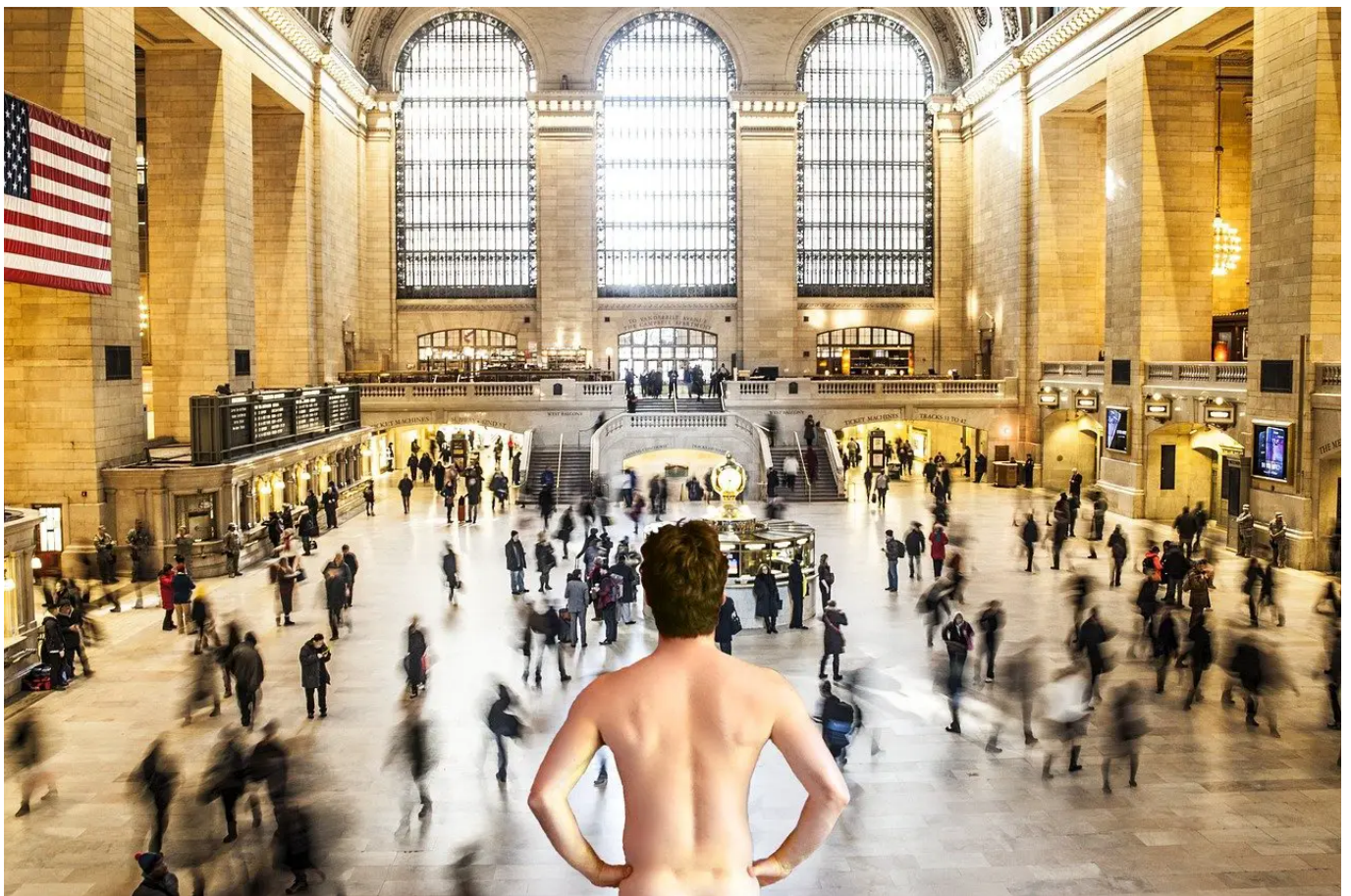

- *To show, make visible or apparent.*
- *Put in a dangerous, disadvantageous, or difficult position.*
- *Reveal to view as by removing a cover.*
- *Disclose to view as by removing a cover.*
- *Make (something embarrassing or damaging) public.*

- *Subject (photographic film) to light when operating a camera.*
- *Leave (a child) in the open to die.*
- *Make (something) visible by uncovering it.*
- *Cause someone to be vulnerable or at risk.*
- *Expose or make accessible to some action or influence.*
- *Publicly and indecently display one's genitals.*
- *Introduce someone to (a subject or area of knowledge.*
- *Abandon by leaving out in the open air.*
- *Remove all or part of one's clothes to show one's body.*
- *Reveal the true, objectionable nature of (someone or something.*
- *Expose to light, of photographic film.*
- *Expose while ridiculing; especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas.*

scupper

Wait in hiding to attack.

show

Show in or as in a picture.

*She **showed** her talent for cooking.*

subject

Bring (a person or country) under one's control or jurisdiction, typically by using force.

*He did not want to **subject** himself to the judgments of his superiors.*

uncover

Remove all or part of one's clothes to show one's body.

*He **uncovered** the face of the dead man.*

unmask

Reveal the true nature of.

*The trial **unmasked** him as a complete charlatan.*

unveil

Remove the cover from.

*The Princess **unveiled** a plaque.*

unwrap

Remove the outer cover or wrapping of.

*I began to **unwrap** my presents.*

authenticate	Establish the authenticity of something. <i>It only accepts commands from users who have authenticated as clients.</i>
<u>confide</u>	Reveal in private tell confidentially. <i>The property of others confided to their care was unjustifiably risked.</i>
conspicuously	In a way that attracts notice or attention. <i>The signs were conspicuously displayed inside the restaurant.</i>
<u>debunk</u>	Reduce the inflated reputation of (someone). <i>Comedy takes delight in debunking heroes.</i>
denudation	The removal of covering.
denude	Strip (something) of its covering, possessions, or assets. <i>Denude a forest.</i>
disclose	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>He cleared away the grass and disclosed a narrow opening descending into the darkness.</i>
disclosed	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The disclosed purpose of their wicked plan.</i>

evinced	Give expression to. <i>The news stories evinced the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
excavation	A site that is being or has been excavated. <i>The methods of excavation have to be extremely rigorous.</i>
exhibit	An exhibition. <i>Many exhibits including the cockpit voice recordings will be produced in court.</i>
expatiate	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>She expatiated on working class novelists.</i>
exposure	A representation of a person or scene in the form of a print or transparent slide or in digital format. <i>She took her life for fear of exposure as a spy.</i>
