- *To show, make visible or apparent.*
- *Disclose to view as by removing a cover.*
- *Expose or make accessible to some action or influence.*
- *Reveal to view as by removing a cover.*
- *Expose while ridiculing; especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas.*
- *Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret.*
- *Remove all or part of one's clothes to show one's body.*
- *Expose to light, of photographic film.*

- exhibit** Give an exhibition of to an interested audience.  
*No foreign painters were **exhibited**.*
- give away** Bestow, especially officially.
- let on** Leave unchanged.
- let out** Leave unchanged.
- peril** Expose to danger; threaten.  
*Jonathon **perilled** his life for love of David.*
- reveal** Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret.  
*The clouds were breaking up to **reveal** a clear blue sky.*
- scupper** Wait in hiding to attack.
- uncover** Remove all or part of one's clothes to show one's body.  
*He stopped short reverentially **uncovered** and stood bare headed till the line of mourners had passed.*
- unwrap** Remove the outer cover or wrapping of.  
***Unwrap** the evidence in the murder case.*



### **Usage Examples of "Exposes" as a verb**

- *The man exposed himself in the subway.*
- *Expose the blanket to sunshine.*

<b>disclose</b>	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>They <b>disclosed</b> her name to the press.</i>
<b>disclosed</b>	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The <b>disclosed</b> purpose of their wicked plan.</i>
<b><u>disclosure</u></b>	A fact, especially a secret, that is made known. <i>A judge ordered the <b>disclosure</b> of the government documents.</i>
<b>display</b>	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Pressing the F1 key will <b>display</b> a help screen.</i>
<b><u>divulge</u></b>	Make known (private or sensitive information). <i>I do not want to <b>divulge</b> my plans at the moment.</i>
<b>evince</b>	Give expression to. <i>The news stories <b>evinced</b> the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
<b>excavation</b>	The action of excavating something, especially an archaeological site. <i>The methods of <b>excavation</b> have to be extremely rigorous.</i>
<b>exhibit</b>	An exhibition. <i>She was invited to <b>exhibit</b> at several French museums.</i>
<b>expatiate</b>	Speak or write in detail about. <i>She <b>expatiated</b> on working class novelists.</i>
<b>exposure</b>	The state of having no protection from something harmful. <i><b>Exposure</b> to the weather.</i>
<b>express</b>	By express. <i>He <b>expressed</b> complete satisfaction.</i>
<b>expressionism</b>	A style of painting, music, or drama in which the artist or writer seeks to express the inner world of emotion rather than external reality.
<b>giveaway</b>	A television or radio program in which contestants compete for awards. <i>The shape of the parcel was a dead <b>giveaway</b>.</i>
<b><u>impart</u></b>	Bestow a quality on. <i><b>Impart</b> a new skill to the students.</i>
<b>overexposure</b>	The act of exposing film to too much light or for too long a time. <i>People are urged to avoid <b>overexposure</b> to the sun.</i>
<b>reveal</b>	(in a film or television programme) a final revelation of information that has previously been kept from the characters or viewers. <i>He <b>revealed</b> that he had received death threats.</i>

<b>revealing</b>	Making interesting or significant information known, especially of a personal nature. <i>A <b>revealing</b> glance.</i>
<b><u>revelation</u></b>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i><b>Revelations</b> about his personal life.</i>
<b>shallowness</b>	Lack of depth of character, insight, or serious thought. <i>Increased <b>shallowness</b> of breath.</i>
<b><u>uncover</u></b>	Discover (something previously secret or unknown). <i><b>Uncover</b> your belly.</i>
<b>unveil</b>	Remove the cover from. <i>The Princess <b>unveiled</b> a plaque.</i>
<b>unwrap</b>	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>Let s <b>unwrap</b> the gifts.</i>
