<b>man about town</b>	Someone who serves in the armed forces; a member of a military force.
<b>rake</b>	An implement similar to a rake used for other purposes e.g. by a croupier drawing in money at a gaming table. <i>Giving the lawn a <b>rake</b>.</i>



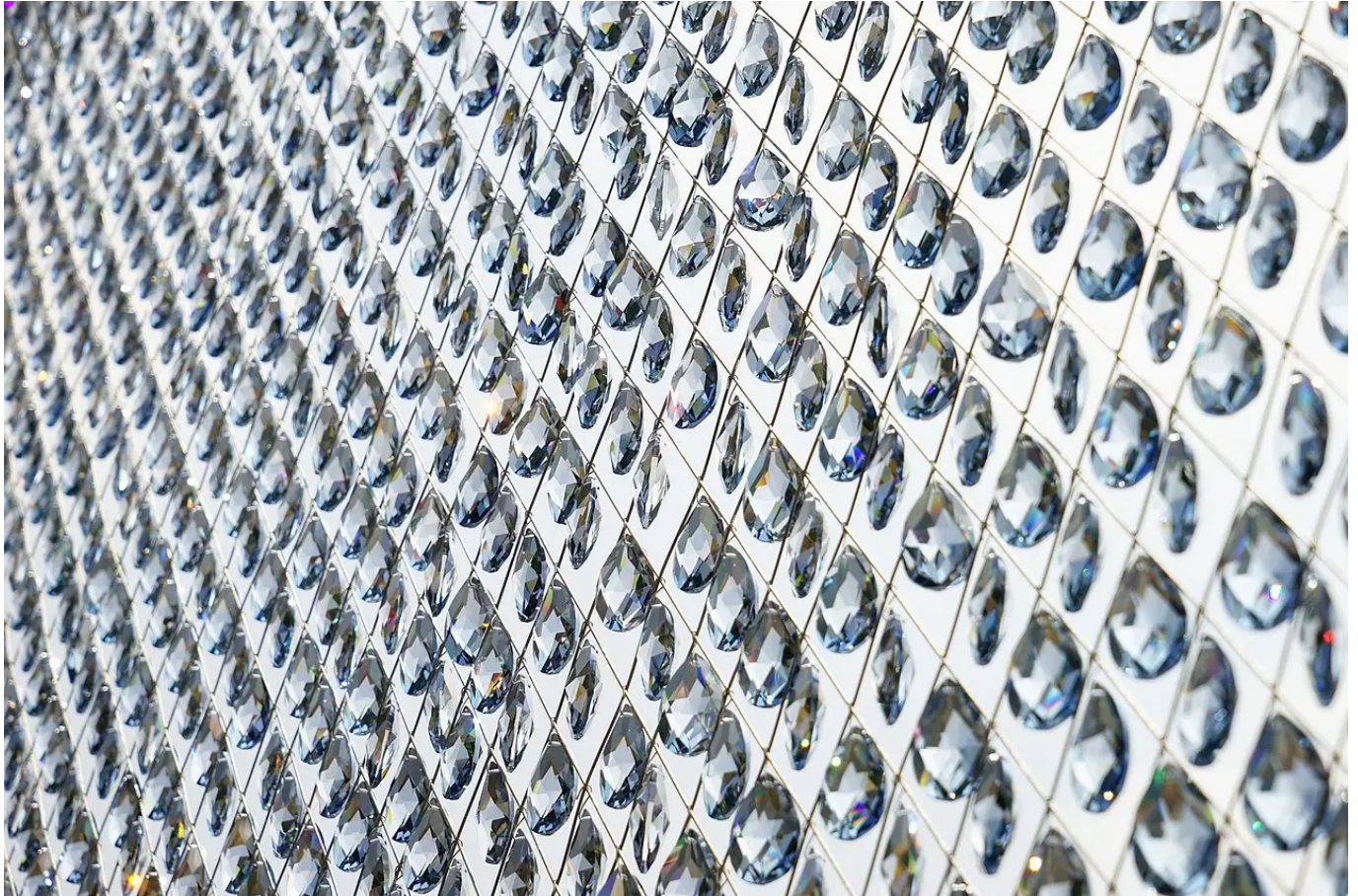
## Exquisite as an Adjective

Affectedly dainty or refined.

<b>elegant</b>	(of a scientific theory or solution to a problem) pleasingly ingenious and simple. <i>An <b>elegant</b> mathematical solution simple and precise and lucid.</i>
<u>excruciating</u>	Intensely painful. <i><b>Excruciating</b> back pain.</i>
<u>fastidious</u>	Very attentive to and concerned about accuracy and detail. <i>The child seemed <b>fastidious</b> about getting her fingers dirty.</i>
<u>graceful</u>	Having or showing grace or elegance. <i>She was a tall girl slender and <b>graceful</b>.</i>
<b>harrowing</b>	Acutely distressing. <i>A <b>harrowing</b> film about racism and violence.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>Enemy fire was <b>intense</b>.</i>
<b>keen</b>	(of prices) very low; competitive. <i>John was <b>keen</b> to help.</i>
<b>lovely</b>	Appealing to the emotions as well as the eye. <i>How <b>lovely</b> to see you.</i>
<u>piercing</u>	(of a sound) extremely high or loud. <i>Her <b>piercing</b> analysis.</i>
<b>racking</b>	Causing great physical or mental suffering.
<b>recherche</b>	Lavishly elegant and refined.
<b>searing</b>	Extremely hot or intense. <i>A <b>searing</b> pain.</i>
<u>selective</u>	Relating to or involving the selection of the most suitable or best qualified. <i>Modern pesticides are more <b>selective</b> in effect.</i>
<u>sensitive</u>	Being susceptible to the attitudes, feelings, or circumstances of others. <i><b>Sensitive</b> to the local community and its needs.</i>
<u>severe</u>	Severely simple. <i><b>Severe</b> pain.</i>
<u>sharp</u>	Having or made by a thin edge or sharp point suitable for cutting or piercing. <i>A pencil with a <b>sharp</b> point.</i>
<b>tormenting</b>	Inflicting severe physical or mental suffering. <i>Peace from his <b>tormenting</b> thoughts.</i>
<u>torturous</u>	Extremely painful. <i>A <b>torturous</b> five days of fitness training.</i>

<b>affectation</b>	A deliberate pretense or exaggerated display. <i>She called the room her boudoir which he thought an <b>affectation</b>.</i>
<b>artistry</b>	Creative skill or ability. <i>The <b>artistry</b> of the pianist.</i>
<b>beautiful</b>	Delighting the senses or exciting intellectual or emotional admiration. <i>What a <b>beautiful</b> day.</i>
<b>bravura</b>	Great technical skill and brilliance shown in a performance or activity. <i>A <b>bravura</b> performance.</i>

<b><u>craft</u></b>	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>A beautifully <b>crafted</b> object.</i>
<b>craftsmanship</b>	The quality of design and work shown in something made by hand; artistry. <i>A piece of fine <b>craftsmanship</b>.</i>
<b>creativity</b>	The use of imagination or original ideas to create something; inventiveness. <i>Firms are keen to encourage <b>creativity</b>.</i>
<b>cultivated</b>	Refined and well educated. <i><b>Cultivated</b> speech.</i>
<b>elegant</b>	Displaying effortless beauty and simplicity in movement or execution. <i>The grand unified theory is compact and <b>elegant</b> in mathematical terms.</i>
<b>enchantingly</b>	In a bewitching manner.
<b>fine</b>	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>I was <b>fined</b> for parking on the wrong side of the street.</i>
<b><u>grace</u></b>	In Greek mythology three beautiful goddesses Aglaia Thalia and Euphrosyne believed to personify and bestow charm grace and beauty. <i>Ms Pasco has <b>graced</b> the front pages of magazines like Elle and Vogue.</i>
<b>mincing</b>	Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>I don t have to go through the rest of my life with that <b>mincing</b> voice of yours.</i>
<b>pecuniary</b>	Relating to or involving money. <i>He admitted obtaining a <b>pecuniary</b> advantage by deception.</i>



<b><u>prowess</u></b>	Skill or expertise in a particular activity or field. <i>Her culinary <b>prowess</b>.</i>
<b>recherche</b>	Lavishly elegant and refined.
<b><u>refined</u></b>	Showing a high degree of refinement and the assurance that comes from wide social experience. <i>Her voice was very low and <b>refined</b>.</i>
<b>rococo</b>	The rococo style of art decoration or architecture. <i>An exquisite gilded <b>rococo</b> mirror.</i>
<b>skill</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>Training firms are already seeing a boost from companies looking to <b>skill</b> employees in cloud technologies.</i>
<b>skilled</b>	(of work) requiring special abilities or training. <i>A <b>skilled</b> surgeon has many years of training and experience.</i>
<b><u>sophisticated</u></b>	Appealing to or frequented by people who are sophisticated. <i>A <b>sophisticated</b> drama.</i>
<b><u>tasteful</u></b>	Having or showing or conforming to good taste. <i>A <b>tasteful</b> lounge bar.</i>
<b><u>technical</u></b>	(basketball) a foul that can be assessed on a player or a coach or a team for unsportsmanlike conduct; does not usually involve physical contact during play. <i><b>Technical</b> terms.</i>
<b>technique</b>	A way of carrying out a particular task, especially the execution or performance of an artistic work or a scientific procedure. <i>He has excellent <b>technique</b>.</i>
<b>toolmaker</b>	Someone skilled in making or repairing tools.
<b>virtuosity</b>	Great skill in music or another artistic pursuit. <i>A performance of considerable <b>virtuosity</b>.</i>
<b>workmanlike</b>	Worthy of a good workman. <i>A steady <b>workmanlike</b> approach.</i>
<b>workmanship</b>	Skill in an occupation or trade. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor <b>workmanship</b>.</i>
