Extant as an Adjective

Definitions of "Extant" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “extant” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost.*
- *Still in existence; surviving.*
- *Still in existence; not extinct or destroyed or lost- Edward Clodd.*



Synonyms of "Extant" as an adjective (9 Words)

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| abiding | (of a feeling or memory) lasting a long time; enduring. <i>He had an abiding respect for her.</i> |
| enduring | Lasting a long time. <i>He formed a number of enduring relationships with women.</i> |
| existent | Having reality or existence. <i>The technique has been existent for some years.</i> |
| in existence | Currently fashionable. |
| present | Temporal sense; intermediate between past and future; now existing or happening or in consideration. <i>The murderer is present in this room.</i> |
| remaining | Still to happen; future. <i>They advertised for any remaining creditors to come forward.</i> |
| still existing | Not sparkling. |

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| surviving | Continuing to exist; remaining intact. <i>The only surviving frontier blockhouse in Pennsylvania.</i> |
| undestroyed | Not destroyed; preserved. <i>Forests and undestroyed habitats.</i> |

| <u>coexist</u> | Coexist peacefully as of nations. <i>Dwarf mammoths may have survived in north east Siberia to coexist with the Egyptian pharaohs.</i> |
| <u>creature</u> | A person or organization considered to be under the complete control of another. <i>A creature from outer space.</i> |
| <u>empirical</u> | Relying on medical quackery. <i>An empirical treatment of a disease about which little is known.</i> |
| <u>eternally</u> | For a limitless time. <i>He was prattling on eternally.</i> |
| exist | Have an existence be extant. <i>He could barely exist on such a low wage.</i> |
| existence | Everything that exists anywhere. <i>Laws in existence for centuries.</i> |
| existing | Existing in something specified. <i>Opponents of the existing political system.</i> |
| <u>here</u> | In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>Come here please.</i> |
| heretofore | Before now. <i>Diseases that heretofore were usually confined to rural areas.</i> |

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| hitherto | Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i>Hitherto part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i> |
| hypostasis | Any of the three persons of the Godhead constituting the Trinity especially the person of Christ in which divine and human natures are united. |
| <u>lifelong</u> | Continuing through life. <i>A lifelong Conservative.</i> |
| live | Remain alive. <i>Live entertainment involves performers actually in the physical presence of a live audience.</i> |
| <u>living</u> | People who are still living. <i>Flowers were for the living.</i> |
| now | (in a narrative or account of past events) at the time spoken of or referred to. <i>Where are you living now.</i> |
| outlast | Live or last longer than. <i>The kind of beauty that will outlast youth.</i> |
| <u>pertain</u> | Be appropriate, related, or applicable to. <i>Matters pertaining to the organization of government.</i> |
| populate | Fill with inhabitants. <i>Populate the forest with deer and wild boar for hunting.</i> |
| <u>presence</u> | The state of being present; current existence. <i>My presence in the flat made her happy.</i> |
| present | Formally present a debutante a representative of a country etc. <i>She did not expect to find herself in her present situation.</i> |
| <u>remaining</u> | Still existing, present, or in use; surviving. <i>England have forbidden him to play in the remaining fixtures.</i> |
| <u>reproduction</u> | Made to imitate the style of an earlier period or of a particular craftsman. <i>Reproduction French classical beds.</i> |
| somewhere | In or at or to some place someplace is used informally for somewhere. <i>They moved to somewhere in Spain.</i> |
| subsist | Support oneself. <i>The court may treat a contract as still subsisting.</i> |
| <u>subsistence</u> | The state of remaining in force or effect. <i>Social security provided only a bare subsistence.</i> |

A natural process resulting in the evolution of organisms best adapted to the environment.

*The animal's chances of **survival** were pretty low.*

survive

Live longer than.

*He **survived** the cancer against all odds.*

sustain

An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released.

*The money will **sustain** our good cause.*
