buildout	The growth, development, or expansion of something. <i>The rapid buildout of digital technology.</i>
continuation	The state of remaining in a particular position or condition. <i>The continuation of discussions about a permanent peace.</i>
deferral	Act of putting off to a future time. <i>They agreed to a deferral of industrial action.</i>
delay	The action of delaying or being delayed. <i>A two hour delay.</i>
denotation	The object or concept to which a term refers, or the set of objects of which a predicate is true. <i>Beyond their immediate denotation the words have a connotative power.</i>
development	(biology) the process of an individual organism growing organically; a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level. <i>The slow development of her skill as a writer.</i>
elongation	The angular separation of a planet from the sun or of a satellite from a planet, as seen by an observer. <i>An elongation of the crater in the impact direction.</i>
enlargement	The state of being enlarged. <i>Talks on the enlargement of the EU.</i>
escalation	An increase in the intensity or seriousness of something; an intensification. <i>Cost escalations.</i>

expansion	A function expressed as a sum or product of terms. <i>The book is an expansion of a lecture given last year.</i>
extension phone	An addition that extends a main building.
extension service	An addition that extends a main building.
file name extension	Office furniture consisting of a container for keeping papers in order.
filename extension	An addition that extends a main building.
furtherance	Encouragement of the progress or growth or acceptance of something. <i>The court held that the union's acts were not in furtherance of a trade dispute.</i>
headway	Forward movement of a ship or boat, especially when this is slow or difficult. <i>The ship was making very little headway against heavy seas.</i>
improvement	A thing that makes something better or is better than something else. <i>Home improvements.</i>
increase	A change resulting in an increase. <i>Some increase in inflation is expected.</i>
lengthening	The act of prolonging something.
lengthiness	Amount or degree or range to which something extends.
perpetuation	The continuation or preservation of a situation, idea, etc. <i>We criticized the perpetuation of racial stereotypes.</i>
postponement	Act of putting off to a future time. <i>The postponement of the elections.</i>
progress	Development towards an improved or more advanced condition. <i>He listened for the progress of the troops.</i>

telephone extension	Electronic equipment that converts sound into electrical signals that can be transmitted over distances and then converts received signals back into sounds.
university extension	Establishment where a seat of higher learning is housed, including administrative and living quarters as well as facilities for research and teaching.

duration	The time during which something continues. <i>Bicycle hire for the duration of your holiday.</i>
<u>enlarge</u>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>They have renovated and enlarged the four storey building.</i>
expand	Expand the influence of. <i>The dough expands.</i>
expanded	Being or having been enlarged or extended. <i>The curved soffit is finished with a strip of expanded metal mesh.</i>
expansion	A function expressed as a sum or product of terms. <i>A small expansion of industry.</i>
<u>extend</u>	Extend in scope or range or area. <i>Her generosity did not extend to all adults.</i>
